MARCH 28, 2022

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6TH REGULAR SESSION:

Kenton City Council met in their 6th Regular Session on March 28, 2022, at 7 PM, in Council Chambers. Present: President Joel Althaus, Sue Fox Buroker, David Beazley, Antwillia Davis, Ray Lawrence, Anda Tudor, Law Director John Schwemer, Mayor Lynn Webb, & Safety Service Director Cindy Murray. Absent: Pegg Wren & Robin Jones.

Prayer given by President Althaus and the Pledge of Allegiance recited.

Althaus: Everyone, we're a little short tonight on number of Council persons, so we will get through what we can...I did speak with Pam, and we do not think there is anything on there that can't survive for 2 more weeks. We will take care of our missing Councilmembers in new business, so we'll move on to minutes.

MINUTES:

Althaus: Are there any additions or corrections to those minutes from March 14th? Hearing none, they'll be marked as approved as submitted.

CITIZENS REQUESTING TIME TO SPEAK:

Althaus: As you can see, we have no one on the agenda this evening as far as citizens requesting time to speak.

COMMUNICATIONS:

Althaus: One item of communication we all have is the Kenton Hardin Health Department minutes from 2/22/22. Questions on those? In your packet you'll see a communication from the Dept. of Commerce Liquor Control, and we'll handle that in new business.

PETITIONS:

Althaus: We have none in front of us at this time that I'm aware of.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS:

Althaus: I'm going to change the order here and let Chief Donnelly go first.

Fire - Chief Bruce Donnelly: Just a few things going on this week...the guys are continuing their advanced EMT class on Mondays & Wednesdays of this week so some of the new guys are getting trained out this week because we've got confined space training also for the whole department on Thursday and some of the street, sewer and/or water guys will be there that are able to attend. It's basically a refresher course so we just keep learning how to use our equipment that we've got. We are going to be submitting a grant to the Division of EMS for a training grant. We do have 1 member of our department that's wanting to go to Paramedic school this fall so we're applying for grant money to try to pay for his tuition for that class. Other than that, I don't have too much else going on...we're keeping steady with the run counts right now and we're still waiting to hear back with hopefully some good information on when we might be able to get our ladder truck back. Other than that, everything seems to be going fairly well.

Althaus: Any questions for Chief Donnelly? Thanks Chief, I know you've got somewhere you have to be, so we appreciate it. Judge...

Municipal Court - Judge Greg Grimslid: You've gotten copies of our annual report for 2021 presented in 2022. Copies of this has been sent to the villages, all the mayors in the county, as well as the County Commissioners and the Sheriff's Office. The cover letter indicates where we were with our mask mandates and so forth from COVID. I do want to inform the Council that long time Deputy Clerk Karin Bash recently passed away and we sent our condolences to her family. She lived in Forest, Ohio and worked for a quite a few years as our Civil Clerk. She was there before I came on and I've been Judge now for 16 years, so she was there quite a while. I want to commend my employees...Emily Kissling who is our Chief Clerk, Jenifer Alger who is part-time, Desiree Crabtree, Amanda Norris, Stacey Lutes, and Alex Glauner for their dedication and hard work during the past year. We processed 2,734 new cases and we brought in \$956,021.23. \$208,342.28 of that was from online payments...we've just been doing that for 2 years so that has been a good situation because that doesn't cost us any money. \$59,424.30 was collected by a collection agency we use so that's starting to show some results as well. Our case load was down 154 cases from the year before, but we collected \$36,000.00 more than we had the previous year. Our collections rates are going up a bit, caseload is down due to a couple of things...obviously COVID the last 2 years because law enforcement isn't doing road patrols and things as much as they normally did before hand, because of the type of things and because of their numbers in staffing that they need to do and it's not as high on the totem pole. Like I said, we don't control what comes into the court, whatever

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comes in comes in. It's not like we can go out and make our own business. We're only there for whoever is brought in. We have been seeing quite an uptake recently in case load and I think it's going to get back not to where it was before but a little bit higher. Unfortunately, we've seen a large increase in domestic violence this year. When you look at the money, our cash on hand on 12/31/21 was \$133,208.97, our disbursements is self-explanatory...it says what agency got what. When we collect fines & costs there is a certain amount marked out percentage wise that go to each of these agencies depending on whether or not they wrote the ticket or what code section is being cited whether it's a City ordinance or a State code. Then the City of Kenton indicates a total amount of \$267,126.62 was brought in, but not all of that is City of Kenton because there are some funds in there that are Court controlled funds so not all of that is in the general fund. For example, the Indigent Driver Alcohol Fund, \$3659.79 is set forth by State Statute, or Special Projects and things of that nature, those funds are set separately in the Auditor's group/budget.

Althaus: Do you know which of those are set separately just by looking at them? Can you tell us right now?

Judge Grimslid: Indigent Driver Alcohol Fund, and because we don't have a lot of stuff that they allow you to spend it on, we're helping indigent drivers go to (can't hear) programs. If they're indigent and qualify for court appointed counsel or if they come in & plead and they're indigent, we help them with that fund because we'd rather see people cure their problem than go out & drive drunk again. Court Computerization is separate (both of them), Special Projects (both of them), Court Probation Services isn't separate per se, but it is in her funds that she charges funds for so I guess it is, but it goes to the general fund to cover it.

Chief Dep. Aud. Pam Romanko: It's a separate fund. All of these are basically separate funds...

Judge Grimslid: So basically, from Indigent Driver Alcohol Fund down to Credit Card Fee.

Romanko: Those are all special funds that are within the City's...

Judge Grimslid: They control it in there, but we spend it down there. And we don't spend all of our Court Computerization Fund in a year, nor our Special Projects. We use those funds to do a lot of our improvements if we need updating to our sound system, we had to reupholster our chairs in the jury box because they were getting to be aged like yours. Where yours only get sat on once a week ours get sat on every day and they were actually disintegrating. So those kinds of things are paid through some of those special project funds.

Althaus: So, it's the first 4 lines that really come back or offset the cost the City has.

Judge Grimslid: That's right. So, when you look at those, they go directly into your general which is a little over \$200,000 - \$210,000 out of the \$267,000. Then the Sheriff of Hardin County we disbursed \$14,297.12 and those are basically fees from service...they charge us to serve complaints and stuff, the arresting agency driving under the influence, drug arresting, paid to stay in jail housing...in other words, for certain ones they charge. But then Hardin County itself got \$114,035.63.

Althaus: What comes in from Hardin County?

Judge Grimslid: That is going into them.

Althaus: What comes in here to offset your expenses?

Judge Grimslid: A portion of my salary which is set by Statute...

Althaus: The County actually pays a portion of yours?

Judge Grimslid: Yes, I get 3 paychecks...they're not very big. The City pays me a little bit more than the County does, share wise, and then the State pays the great majority of mine as they do for all.

Althaus: Outside of that...

Judge Grimslid: Outside of that they pay a small portion...

Romanko: Two-Fifths.

Judge Grimslid: Two-Fifths of Emily's salary so that would be somewhere around \$15,000-\$20,000 and then they pay 2/5 of Stacey's which would be just a little bit less than that. So, you can see there's probably around \$35,000 at the max so they're making money off of the court to put it mildly. I mean, that's a pretty good return on their investment so to speak. Then under Misc., Ada Village Ord. fines...they don't write that many Village ordinance fines, except when its underage alcohol consumption, and most of those all get paid because they're college students and they're paid \$35,000-\$40,000 per year so they've got the money to pay those fines. Then Forest...almost every traffic offense in Forest is written under their ordinances and that's generally the work of one officer. Capital Recovery Collection, even though they're getting that, that's not actually reflective of what they paid. They don't get a dime until we're paid off. They can charge a service fee so then they collect extra and then that gets cut back to them. So that's not money out of anyone's budget, that's just extra money that we've collected because that's a fee that's added onto their court costs. That brings me to the last thing this year...I've been the Judge for 16 years and I've never adjusted any of our fees. Just because of what's been said earlier it's not

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probably one of the most financially (can't hear) at this point in time due to our economic situation, but I have adjusted beginning April 1st our court fees/costs have gone up \$25 per case. \$5 is going to Special Projects and another \$5 to Computerization, so the remaining \$15 will go to the General Fund. Then we also have increased by a small margin our speeding, our waiverable offenses like traffic offenses, so those fines will be a little bit increased. That also goes to the General Fund. Then on the criminal cases, depending on the case the fine could be one way or another...if it's your 16th time being in or your 1st. But for general first timer's on a 4th degree misdemeanor everything has gone up \$25, so instead of it being \$150 it's now \$175; and M3 would be \$200 instead of \$175; and M-2 is up to \$225 and an M1 is \$250. So there should be an increase in funds there, but keeping somewhat in-line with the counties surrounding us. I will also state that just because we fine someone doesn't mean that we collect it. We do a lot of work & spend a lot of time on it, but if it gets to the point where we're just totally spinning our wheels, I turn it over to collection. Any questions? Thanks for your time.

Althausen: Thanks, Judge. We appreciate you doing this. It helps us understand. You don't have to stay for the whole meeting if you don't want to. Chief Musser, do you have anything you want to talk about? I did see Chief has his KPD report in here for the month of February.

Police – Chief Dennis Musser: No, I don't have anything tonight.

Parks & Rec - Althausen: The next item is the minutes from Parks & Rec Board meeting were in your packet. Robin was there and I happened to be there that night, and Cindy & the Mayor also were there. As you read through that are there any questions?

Income Tax – Althausen: Emma, is there anything you want to talk about? Okay, Auditor...

Auditor's Officer – Romanko: I didn't put a written report with the Council minutes, but I did email each one of you the monthly reports and they are also posted on the City website. So I encourage you to look at them, to ask questions if you have any...I'll be happy to sit down and explain how we get to on those items. Also, just to let you know, I've gotten my first email from Rob Jacobs and our State Audit will begin soon. The State will be doing it again this year.

Althausen: Thank you. Law Director, anything you want to talk about? I love giving our attorney time.

Law Director – Schwemer: No, nothing.

Althausen: Safety Service, Cindy has a couple of written reports, so we'll let her take that.

Safety Service Director – Murray: Does anybody have any questions on the reports? We did have a bypass at the WWTP due to heavy rain. Two things I want to touch on tonight...the first is pedestrian safety. With the weather warming up there are a lot more people out walking, and I just want to remind everybody around the square that pedestrians have the right-of-way. I just about got took out the other morning coming to work, so everybody needs to pay attention when they're driving. I just saw another person today & she was on her phone and she zoomed around the corner turning right on red. I just want to remind everybody to watch out for pedestrians. The 2nd thing I want to touch on is to remind all of the citizens, and the truck drivers who aren't going to hear this, but during the power outage that every stop light becomes a 4-way stop. So if you come up and you don't see any lights, it's not because all of the lights are out it's because the power is out. I just want to remind everybody that it does become a 4-way stop. When in doubt, stop.

Althausen: Thank you, Cindy. Mayor Webb?

Mayor Lynn Webb: The only thing I have to share tonight is tentatively Spring Cleanup will be April 18th thru 21st. We're trying to get everything locked in on that & it will be exactly the same as in the past out at the Fairgrounds. We'll have hours posted and all of that. And, maybe just a heads up for the paper, we're going to put a little extra push on it so if you have things to get cleaned up now is the time.

STANDING COMMITTEES AND/OR SPECIAL COMMITTEES:

Finance, Beazley: There will be some legislation forthcoming for our next meeting on a couple of items that need to be cleaned up, but nothing of any tremendous significance. We plan to meet again the 2nd meeting of April at 6PM and kind of keep ahead of the game if we can. That's all I have, thank you.

MOP, Althausen: You'll see there was a written report from MOP. They met on March 16th at 2PM here. As far as Councilmembers that are here tonight that were there it would be Sue & Anda. Do you have any questions for either of them? It was the initial discussion of verifying and looking at all of the elected official's salaries. That hasn't been done in literally over a decade. So that was one of the things they began to work on.

Utilities – No report.

Streets, Lawrence: I'm going to send out an email for a meeting on the 7th after Nuisance.

Althausen: It's getting to be your time of the year. Okay, on the 7th after Nuisance.

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Beazley: When is Nuisance?

Davis: The 7th at 4:30PM. It will always be at 4:30PM and we're not going to have that debate no more. Ha. Nuisance & Legislation...we got in a big old fight about that last time.

Lawrence: So Streets will probably be at 5:30PM.

Davis: Is Parks & Rec that night too? I could be wrong...

Lawrence: Parks & Rec is on the 13th and Utilities is on the 14th.

Althausser: Is there any report from Legislation?

Davis: Just what you have in your packet tonight under New Business.

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL MEMBERS:

Regional Planning, Beazley: We did meet since the last time I was here, but not since the last Council meeting, so nothing to report of significance.

Parks & Rec, Althausser: We already noted the minutes that you had an opportunity to review. Robin can add to that when she's here next.

Grove Cemetery, Davis: The next meeting is the 4th.

Shade Tree Commission, Althausser: I know Sue was at that and reported it at our last Council meeting, but you have the minutes in your packet from 3/10/22.

BKP, Althausser: I sent out the minutes from the prior month, but we did meet last Monday...nothing of any real significance other than I brought up again both the City & the BKP Board need to start getting our facts & data together, as far as how many times both departments are affected by calls outside of our area. I guess I think it's something we've got to get too...I suggested to BKP that the Board sign off on all those runs that are done outside of those townships in the City every month. That does trickle down...there's an awful lot of time BKP runs up north somewhere and then we get a call here that normally was their rotation to take and KFD has to take it. So as soon as I get the minutes, which I don't get them until the week before the next meeting, I'll forward them on.

OLD BUSINESS:

None.

NEW BUSINESS:

Althausser: A couple of items. Number 1, we received notice of the annual, well I believe it's annual, but all of your C&D permits expire for liquor. We do have the opportunity we do with any new permit or renewal or change of an individual permit to request a hearing. John has talked about that and several Councilmembers over the years remember. We can either request a hearing or waive that opportunity. If you request hearing let's make sure we have good reason and that we attend. So I'd be looking for a motion to waive a hearing.

Beazley: Mr. President, before such motion, Chief are you aware of anything within our subdivision that would require any attention?

Chief Musser: No.

Motion by Mr. Beazley & second by Mrs. Davis to waive the right of hearing on any of the renewals (Class C&D).

Althausser: Is there any discussion? **(Roll call vote, 5 ayes; motion carried)** Thank you, and I'm certain that Brenda or Emma will pass that on accordingly. Also, as you notice we have 2 Councilmembers absent. Robin & Pegg are both under the weather, so I'd like a motion to excuse their absences.

Beazley: Mr. President, are we entitled to pass legislation on a 3rd read tonight?

Althausser: Yes, we are.

Beazley: Were you going to do that now or...

Althausser: It's under 3rd reading on the back of the agenda.

Beazley: Okay, I misunderstand the old business...that's where it used to be when we read legislation.

Althausser: Right. Let's back up a little bit. On the way I'm doing the agenda now, there are 2 major changes. Number 1, the Administrative Reports...that's when everybody in Administration gets their chance to report. Secondly, Ordinances & Resolutions are under Ordinances & Resolutions. In other words...

Beazley: Old Business & New Business would not include legislation or actions of Council.

Althausser: Well, it would...it would be for votes from Council like we did tonight under New Business...things that Council just has to approve or deny for example Liquor Control. That would be a

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very good example. Anything that is not a Resolution or Ordinance, or anything a Councilmember wants to bring up, that would be the time.

Beazley: Other than a Resolution or Ordinance.

Althaus: Right.

Motion by Mr. Beazley & second by Mr. Lawrence to excuse the absent Councilmembers.

Althaus: Is there any discussion? **(Roll call vote, 5 ayes; motion carried)**

ORDINANCES & RESOLUTIONS:

Althaus: We do have one item up for 3rd reading & that is something you can act on if you so choose.

3RD READING:

RESOLUTION NO. 22-003, TITLE ONLY; A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY NOT NEEDED FOR MUNICIPAL PURPOSES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Althaus: If I remember, there were a couple of pieces of equipment and a vehicle or two...maybe a backhoe...

Murray: Skid loader...

Beazley: There are a total of 7 items listed.

Althaus: Any questions on that? It is a 3rd reading & you can vote on it or if you don't it will die.

Motion by Mr. Beazley & second by Mr. Lawrence to approve Resolution No. 22-003.

Althaus: Is there any discussion on that Resolution?

Beazley: I would note that my motion includes the amended items on the additional schedule.

Althaus: Yes, it is as amended for clarification. **(Roll call vote, 5 ayes; motion carried)**

1ST READING:

RESOLUTION NO. 22-005, TITLE ONLY; A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND/OR SAFETY SERVICE DIRECTOR OF THE CITY OF KENTON, OHIO TO ACCEPT THE BID OF AND ENTER INTO CONTRACT WITH R.D. JONES EXCAVATING LLC FOR CONSTRUCTION SERVICES IN CONNECTION WITH THE ESPY STREET WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT PROJECT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Althaus: I guess my first question would be, Cindy the sooner the better?

Murray: Yeah, this is very, very, very hot because when we put this out for bid the original date for it to be completed by was 8/1/22. Nobody would bid with that date. The reason we wanted 8/1/22 is because we're paving Espy Street with ODOT money this summer. So we had to extend that to 10/1/22 and we got 2 bids. ODOT is about having a fit because they don't like paving in October. So the longer you delay me on doing this the more likely we're not going to be completed in time to have it paved with ODOT.

Althaus: Any questions on this? I want everybody to be prepared in 2 weeks & hopefully we'll have 6 people here.

Mayor Webb: Do you want it sooner?

Murray: Yeah, I don't think we can wait 2 weeks. I hate to say that, but I don't think we can wait 2 weeks. We opened this bid the Thursday before last so that's putting me off like a month.

Althaus: No, we'd be putting you off 2 weeks because we hope there will be 6 people here.

Murray: I know, but we opened the bid on the 17th.

Althaus: I see. We wouldn't have gotten it until tonight anyway. I'd entertain Council to consider a Special Session, and we might have to have 2. What I know about our Councilmembers that are absent, their situations the next 2-3 days I wouldn't want to count on either.

Davis: Pegg is out definitely tomorrow and possibly the day after. There's no way Pegg can be in.

Beazley: How much notice do we have to have prior to a Special Session?

Althaus: Well, we can't do anything tomorrow anyway.

Beazley: So we could schedule Wednesday & Thursday?

Althaus: Well right or we could wait a little later...

Schwemer: But for purposes of scheduling & notice to the press you might want to set both dates. If you don't need the last one you cancel it. Otherwise, if we wait until Wednesday we won't be able to hit Thursday and we'd have to do Friday. So I'd try to set them both and hopefully we can cancel one.

Althaus: If everyone would look at their calendars unless you have it memorized...

Beazley: I have a very limited availability with Wednesday. It would have to be 5PM and be done by 5:30PM.

Althaus: I'd hope we'd be here 5 minutes.

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Beazley: I'd hope so too, but I can't be here later.

Althaus: Who else can be here on Wednesday at 5PM?

Davis: If you can give me until 5:05PM I can be here. I'm going to need that extra...

Beazley: You've done other meetings at 4:30PM, what's wrong with you? Ha.

Davis: Don't make me deal with this in public. Ha.

Lawrence: I can do Wednesday or Thursday.

Althaus: Well, I'd like to set them both.

Davis: Thursday I'm supposed to be at a track meet in Shawnee. Sorry.

Althaus: That's okay...

Schwemer: Well, that would be our 3rd read so we'd only need 5 people...

Althaus: Okay so is 5PM okay for Wednesday & Thursday?

Schwemer: We'd need 1 of these 2 to be here on Thursday to do anything.

Althaus: Right, because Antwillia won't be here.

Beazley: But if we have 6 on Wednesday we're set.

Schwemer: Exactly.

Althaus: Okay, Tim for your information for the paper, we'll say 5PM both days knowing that we may not begin until 5:05PM. Thank you Councilmembers for agreeing to do that & thank you Cindy for making certain we get that done. Okay, the next ordinance goes hand in hand with this...it's one of Pam's.

Beazley: You skipped one. 22-005 is the fireworks.

Althaus: Oh, I did skip one.

ORDINANCE NO. 22-005, TITLE ONLY; AN ORDINANCE OPTING-OUT OF THE PROVISIONS OF HB 172 AND REAFFIRMING THE BAN ON THE DISCHARGING, IGNITING, OR EXPLODING OF FIREWORKS IN THE CITY OF KENTON, AS SET FORTH IN CHAPTER 672.10 OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF KENTON, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Althaus: Just to paraphrase, remember the State changed their regulations and we're choosing to not adopt those if we pass this, which does not change our ordinances. Any questions on that?

Schwemer: I think the plan always was to give this a full 3 reads.

Davis: Yeah, there was no intent of hurrying this one forward.

Althaus: So far, Resolution 22-005 is the only one we'd have on the agenda on Wednesday.

ORDINANCE NO. 22-006, TITLE ONLY; AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE YEAR 2022 FOR THE CITY OF KENTON, OHIO AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Romanko: This Ordinance relates to the bid...the bid came in \$20,383 more than the estimate. Instead of taking it all out of waterworks we actually got \$1710 extra from the Townships & County that didn't take their ARPA Funds, so I utilized that and took the balance out of the waterworks systems. But this is also related to that road project, so we'd need this passed as well.

Althaus: Any questions on that right now?

Beazley: So that would also be included in the Special Session...

Althaus: Yes, we'll include that on the agenda for Wednesday.

ORDINANCE NO. 22-007, TITLE ONLY; AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS AND FOR TRANSFERRING FUNDS FOR THE YEAR 2022 FOR THE CITY OF KENTON, OHIO AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Althaus: A lot of these were explained by Pam in Finance, but she's going to go over them again.

Romanko: I attached a written explanation so you guys all have an idea if you've read it. The IT Support is everyone in the City now has an email address and Microsoft has changed how they bill. It's now an annual bill and we had been paying monthly. So we added addresses and we pay more money so this is the additional that we'll need. Everything that is listed as IT Support is Microsoft Office 365. The Election Expense & Advertising Delinquent Tax List...we had \$1000 in the Election Expense and it was \$1599 and in Advertising Delinquent Tax List we didn't have anything. We take those sometimes out of general Auditor fees. I'm not sure exactly what they are, but they come out of the property tax check that the County gives us for the City's share of the property taxes. They only issue us a net check, they have Auditor & Treasurer Fees, Election Expense & Advertising Delinquent Tax List. So when we get that done in August I will then be able to appropriate the \$600 out of it then. Quarry Maintenance of Equipment...they took some stuff out of their office to the recycle center and they'd like that money put back into maintenance of equipment. So those were my additional appropriations. The transfers...in the budget we listed the OWDA Loan that was taken out in 2016 for the infrastructure study for downtown is now up for a balloon payment and the interest has been capitalized in our annual report. So it will actually show up as principal. So instead of trying to separate and get those numbers correctly I'd just like to take

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what we've appropriated as principal & interest and just put it into the infrastructure payment. So it just transfers it out of principal & interest into one big lump sum and that was split between water & sewer so those are identical transfers.

Beazley: And that is in response to Auditor's findings?

Romanko: Yes. I had not capitalized the interest on my books and the annual report shows it capitalized so I just need to match better.

Beazley: To the County entry.

Romanko: Yes.

Althaus: And Finance Chair, David, what are your recommendations for those who weren't here?

Beazley: Yes, that we go ahead & do that to be better in compliance and make those fine people happier.

Althaus: Well, plus all the legislation...

Beazley: We were aware of those costs ahead of time, we just didn't know exactly what the bottom number was on IT which is the preponderance of the additional appropriations.

Althaus: We can consider this Wednesday if you want to. It's actually a lot of small items and a couple of decent size transfers so we could include that on the agenda if you agree.

Beazley: As long as we don't go past 5:30PM.

Althaus: You don't have to do it, but we can at least get it read again. Okay, any questions for Pam?

SCHEDULING OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS:

Althaus: Real quick we'll go over the committee meetings we know of...Finance is on 4/25/22 at 6PM, Legislation is set for the 7th at 4:30PM, MOP is on the 12th at 2PM, Streets at 5:30PM again on the 7th.

Schwemer: I just want to make sure since there is no representative from WKTN that we notify them of the special meetings.
