Owatonna formally dedicates Veterans Memorial

espite the cold wind cutting through the crowd of people, it was clear hearts were warm Saturday morning during the formal dedication of the Owatonna Veterans Memorial.

After more than eight long years of planning, advocating and building, the Moonlighters Exchange Club celebrated with the community on Veterans Day alongside the impressive memorial on the corner of 18th Street and Austin Road near the Steele County History Center.

While the program was in fact a celebration, honoring all those who have served in every military branch, it was not without heavy hearts, as the absence of Mike Pierce was noticeable. Pierce, a driving force behind the project, died in July before construction of the monument was complete.

As a United States Army Vietnam War veteran deeply dedicated to honoring all veterans, Pierce championed the project from the very beginning, making it well known the importance of recognizing local veterans.

"American veterans have remained committed to our great country that remains the land of the free and sure-

ly the home of the brave," said Pierce during a 2021 presentation of the monument after the final location had been secured by the Moonlighters. "For many in our country, today is just another day—they may be at home or at work or running errands...but for those of us here today, we know the importance of the day. We're honoring the sacrifice of the few that afford each and every American the opportunity to live free."

During the dedication Saturday, Nicole Wacek with the Moonlighters gave a special, albeit tearful, tribute to Pierce. Wacek worked closely with Pierce on the project throughout the years, and said it is impossible to sum up all Pierce had done for others throughout his lifetime.

"We can start by saying Mike was a champion of many causes, but none were more important than remembering our veterans," Wacek said. "Recognizing the service and sacrifices of our men and women in uniform was a driving force behind many of the project and programs he initiated."

In attendance Saturday Pierce's wife, Trudy, and other members of their family. They all smiled in remembrance of him.

Wacek said while Pierce never wanted to be front and center of the project, he worked diligently behind the scenes to help check items of the to-do list to make the dream of a local monument a reality, working side-byside with Jim Hoffmann.

"Mike embodied the spirit of giving, (Veterans Memorial continued on Page 5)

especially your time. He proved it always, the importance to give back," Wacek said. "He was an honest, honorable and humble man."

Following words from other Moonlighters, including Katie Smith, Annette Duncan and Ben Cass, the crowd moved inside the History Center to view a specially curated video from U.S. Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-MN).

"Amid all the uncertainty in the world right now, we remain grateful for those who put their lives on the line to defend our freedom, but we must never forget that it has come at a significant cost," Klobuchar said. "That's why every year on the 11th day on the 11th month, we pay special tribute to the heroic men and women who fought for and defended our country like Owatonna's own Mike Pierce, who we lost earlier this year."

"He was the embodiment of the Army's principle of selfless service," she continued after listing off the many ways Pierce gave to others. "It didn't just end when his service ended, he

came home and served more. Served Owatonna, our state and our nation."

Klobuchar said the memorial in Owatonna helps honor the promise the country makes to service men and women who put their lives on the line when they enlist, including their families.

"I've always believed that when we ask our service members to sign up to defend our nation, we make a promise that we will give them the support they need when they come home," she said, noting the recently passed PACT Act in Washington, D.C. "We all know there is more to do. When our service member signed up to serve, there was no waiting line, and when they come home and they need a job or education or healthcare, there should never be a waiting line in the United State of America."

State Rep. John Petersburg (R-Waseca) and State Sen. John Jasinski (R-Faribault) also played an important role in the dedication that morning, laying the memorial wreath

on the monument. Jasinski, who is a U.S. Navy veteran and served in the Persian Gulf leading up to Desert Storm, said he was honored to be asked to play a role in the dedication. He's happy to see more and more community creating such spaces.

"It's a great gathered spot for people to come together, share memories and be reminded of the importance of the people who serve in our military," Jasinski said. "It's grassroots, there is no doubt about that. It's our local active military groups that are the force behind these memorials and get these things done, bringing people together."

66I'm happy we have that there now in Owatonna," he added. "I'm happy it's there for people to just remember."
