Hun School unveils new buildings

RINCETON TOWNSHIP – The Hun School of Princeton recently opened its renovated dining hall and expanded Library/Technology Center to the community during the annual Parents' Day and Alumni Homecoming Weekend.

The \$2.6 million project was funded by the school's capital campaign.

Two highlights of the library are the Mary Jane Ousley Teaching Table for classroom instruction and the Weiner Family Technology Resource Center.

In the library addition, there are 18 computer pods available for cooperative learning and class instruction and 42 networked CD-ROM databases. The new space allows for a private area where faculty can work quietly and areas

for three classes to be conducted concurrently.

The dining hall has a new look, with the student gallery outside reflecting the stone used in the construction of the main building on campus, Russell Hall.

The total seating capacity of the dining hall is 296 throughout three rooms – the main dining room, the alumni dining room and the lower dining room that connects to the expanded Poe Lounge.
