Sunday, February 1st

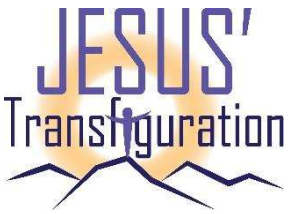
Matthew 5:1-12; Micah 6: 8— "*Kingdom Requirements?*"

"What does the Lord require of you?" is not theoretical; it's personal and practical. God desires a relationship with you. He requires a relationship that transforms your heart and drives you to live in a way that reflects His love and justice in the world. He desires you to be the person of God's own heart.

Sunday, February 8th

Matthew 5:13-20 — "*Life in the Kingdom*"

Our call as Christians is not just to exist but to shine brightly in a dark world. Are we taking the opportunities to share the love of Christ? Are we illuminating the truth in our workplaces, families, and communities? Christians are called to stand against the moral decay in our society. Are we living lives that reflect God's desires for honesty and righteousness? Are we bringing the essence of Christ into our interactions? When people see us, do they see the hope, grace, and peace that only Jesus can provide?



Sunday, February 15th

Matthew 17:1-9— "*While on the Mountaintop*"

In this moment of Transfiguration, Jesus feels the weight of His mission and wonders, "Is it God's will for me?" This passage invites us to reflect on our own lives. Each of us experiences personal mountaintop times of achievement or spiritual awakening. But like the disciples, we must ask ourselves: Are we fully awake to what God is doing in our lives? Are we as alert as we should be? Or are we slumbering, like the disciples, missing the miracles unfolding all around us? What questions do you bring to God?

Sunday, February 22nd

Matthew 4:1-11 — "*Tempted but Not Defeated?*"

The temptation of Jesus reminds that being a Christians does not exempt us from life's trials and tribulations. In fact, it often seems to invite them. We live in a world filled with ceaseless temptations and challenges. Just as Jesus faced temptation, so too will we encounter moments that test our faith, our resolve, and our character. As such, temptation reveals what lies within us. Like gold tested in the fire, we discover where our genuine faith resides. Temptation pushes us to affirm our identity in Christ, reminding us that we are beloved children of God, the truth that the devil seeks to undermine. Perhaps the most comforting aspect of this passage is the understanding that Jesus is not only our example but our ally who is present with us and lifts us up always (Hebrews 4:15).
