

Sermon Titles & summary—November 2025

As we return to the lectionary, the scriptures guide us to reflect on God's purpose, our anticipation of Christ's coming, and our readiness to welcome the promise of salvation.

Sunday, November 2nd

Ephesians 1:11–23 — *"Chosen and sealed"*

All Saints Sunday is a time to remember and honor those who have gone before us in faith. It is a time in which we reflect on God's redemptive plan, His purpose, and the unshakable foundation we have in Christ as chosen people sealed with the Spirit for God. This encourages us to live in the light of the saints as heirs to the riches of God's glory.



Sunday, November 9th

2 Thessalonians 2:1–5, 13–17 — *"Anchored in Truth"*

Paul emphasizes the need to ground ourselves in Biblical truth to combat false teachings. Christians should study Scripture and engage with communities that uphold sound teachings, allowing them to recognize and reject misleading gospels. By anchoring in these truths, we can navigate and remain resilient against false prophecies.

Sunday, November 16th

Luke 21:5–19 — *"Finding Peace in Prophecy"*

As Advent approaches, Scripture guides us in anticipating both Christ's second coming and our readiness to welcome the promise of salvation. Jesus, recognizing His disciples' awe of the temple, offers prophetic insights not to instill fear but to prepare them. And understanding this helps us acknowledge God's sovereignty and find peace that is rooted not in physical manifestations but in spiritual truths.

Sunday, November 23rd

Jeremiah 23:1–6 — *"Restored in God's Care"*

This scripture encourages us to recognize God's active care in our lives today. It urges us to continue meditating on the word of God and cultivate our spiritual health so that we remain grounded in God's word as we serve in every role God has entrusted to us, caring for, loving, and having compassion on those we serve.

Sunday, November 30th

Isaiah 2:1–5 — *"The Mountain of Hope"*

On this First Sunday of Advent, we enter the season of hope, embracing the vivid prophetic picture of anticipation that invites us to look forward to a future where peace, justice, and divine guidance reign supreme. Isaiah envisions the mountain of God (Deuteronomy 32:4), where nations will gather to learn His ways and walk in paths of peace and unity—that Rock is Christ (1 Corinthians 10:4).
