

When I was growing up, we used to gather in a circle for stories after our evening meals. An older woman would come and share with us tales and stories about animals. Most of the tales were about lions and human beings. While some of them

were awe-inspiring, lots of those were scary and enough of us would lack sleep that night. Yet, those stories were informative and used as ways to help young children learn. When I was introduced to movies with animation, talking toys, and animals, I was already used to stories where lions speak human languages.

One particular story I remember was about a tortoise, a Bald eagle, and a marabou stork. It was during the dry season when ponds and lakes were accessible for fishing. Birds of prey would frequently roam to the ponds to catch their meals. One day, a marabou stork spotted a tortoise and attacked it. However, the tortoise cleverly hid its head inside its shell, rendering the marabou unable to harm it. The terrified tortoise pleaded, "Please do not hurt me!" Touched by the tortoise's plea, the marabou felt sympathy and from that moment on, they became friends. Whenever the marabou came to the pond to hunt for fish, the tortoise would assist by diving into the water and locating the fish's hiding spots.

On another day, while the tortoise was by the pond, it noticed a Bald eagle perched on a nearby tree. Curious, the tortoise greeted the eagle with a simple "hey." To the tortoise's surprise, the eagle replied, "It's ok!" Over time, the two became friends. When the Bald eagle would visit, they would engage in friendly conversation while the eagle patiently waited for an opportunity to spot fish in the open waters. Every time the eagle left; the tortoise would witness a grand display of many eagles dancing in the sky.

However, it has been a few weeks since the marabou stork has been absent from the lake. His absence has brought about a period of bullying, harassment, and attacks directed at the tortoise by other marabou storks. The situation around the lake has become unstable and dangerous, causing the tortoise to yearn for a break from the chaos. One day, he spotted his friend and turned to the Bald eagle, and asked if it could accompany the eagle during its mesmerizing dance in the sky. The eagle, unsure how the tortoise could join without the ability to fly, questioned its plan. Undeterred, the determined tortoise insisted, "I can hold on to your claws with my fingers and my teeth." All right, if you say so, then I can take you," said the eagle. Relenting, the eagle agreed to take the tortoise, but warned it, "But please, I beg you, do not utter a single word while holding onto my claws. If you do, you will surely fall."

With an agreement in place, the two embarked on their journey into the sky one afternoon. They joined a formation of flying eagles, circling, and dancing gracefully. Those who witnessed the tortoise in flight were amazed and began to shout excitedly, "oh yeah the tortoise is flying" spreading the news of the tortoise's airborne adventure. Forgetting the eagle's warning and caught up in the excitement, the tortoise also joined in, excitedly exclaiming, "Yes, the tortoise is flying! Yes, I am flying!" In an instant, he lost his grip and fell back to the ground. Unable to move, the tortoise's shell shattered into pieces. Fortunately, it was his loyal friend, the marabou stork, who discovered him first in his

vulnerable state. With the tortoise's soft skin now exposed, he became an easy target for storks and other birds at the lake.

However, his best friend, the marabou stork, diligently rearranged the pieces of the tortoise's shell, saving him from further harm. And that is why, from that time on, the tortoise's shell has unique square shapes instead of being smooth. "When children ask why the tortoise's shell is square-shaped, tell them the tortoise had fallen down from the eagle's dance." "The end of the story," the woman would end the story.

This moral story teaches valuable lessons about hiding in a safe zone, the importance of friendship, and loving one another. Despite enduring harassment around the lake, the tortoise found solace in his safe place, the lake where he could dive into the waters and hide from birds. Similarly, like in the story of Easter morning, the two disciples strayed from Jerusalem in search of a peaceful environment in Emmaus, inadvertently putting themselves in further danger as darkness settled (Luke 24:29). However, through their encounter with Jesus, listening to his voice, and recognizing him, they were compelled to return to Jerusalem. In the story, it was only through the intervention of his friend, the marabou stork, that the tortoise was saved from his miserable fall.


Peter reminds us in scripture that we were once like sheep going astray but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of our souls (1 Peter 2:25). It is safe with Jesus, our Good Shepherd and with fellow Christians. Scripture emphasizes the importance of persistence, faith, and trust in God during times of suffering. As Christians, we are called to fellowship and assist others because we all face trials in different ways. And Peter encourages us to treat everyone with respect and wholeheartedly love one another. Just as the Bald eagles, marabou stork, and the tortoise supported one another, may we also remind ourselves to support and celebrate each other, serving as one body with various gifts as we joyfully celebrate Pentecost.




Dr. Rev. Owar Ojulu's Installation on April 14, 2024















Last fall the Reachout Committee hosted the Autumn Leaf Cruise at Moraine State Park. The Advent season brought the advent wreath building event.


