

During our conversation, about the black woman and entrepreneurship, we couldn't help but mention Madame C.J. Walker. Holyfield definitely is inspired by the mogul. "Her story is super amazing to me. And when we think about the spa industry, we don't think about black women. But I'm working to change that. I'm working hard... I want to be a spa legend."

As her platform grows, Holyfield is preparing for the "Oueen Spa Expo" which will be held in Atlanta this September. One major topic she will tackle deals with financial knowledge amongst spa professionals. She feels like a lack of financial knowledge and disciplined bookkeeping is why hundreds of black entrepreneurs aren't able to take advantage of the Payroll Protection Program offered by the Small Business Administration during the Covid-19 pandemic.

"My goal is to help more independent spa and beauty owners understand the business side of owning a spa. We all go to school to learn the tools and get licensure, but we are barely

taught the business side. So often we hear of a nail salon or spa opening in our community and then closing within six months. The business side of owning a spa is a major goal of the expo this year."

If an aspiring spa owner can't make the expo in September, Holyfield encourages them to visit her website for free e-magazines that are filled with knowledge or use the hashtag #spabosstribe on all social media platforms to learn more. "I want everyone to follow their dreams until something happens."

Licensed Esthetician and Beauty Business Accountant, Tanya Sanders Kelly, held on to her dream of owning a spa



"I started enjoying spa services at various spas across the country. ...But what I noticed was I almost always was out of town when I got these services. That one single thought one day sparked something in me that made me say to myself that I would love to own a spa one day in my area. I knew back then I would name it 'Body Party.'" Kelly and her staff offer a

wide range of spa services to a diverse customer base at her Wax and Beauty Studios in Pearl. Kelly has a long list of goals for her business multiple satellite locations, a product line, a training center

for her signature services, and business development within the beauty industry. In the meantime, she wants more women of color to "tear away" the idea that spa services are not attainable. "It's important that we stop thinking that the type of services that we offer are not for us. That couldn't be further from the truth! At my studio, I have been very meticulous in finding products and techniques that work best for our skin and service needs. I wish more women of color would understand that our bodies are important and sacred and should be taken care of as such, for ourselves more than for anyone else."



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
