Beth Roelfs participated as a panel member in a statewide on-line training session provided by the Nebraska Community Foundation. The session topic was Transferring Abundance. She shared stories of Diller's success in harnessing charitable gifts for the community's improvement through its Unrestricted Endowment and General Funds. The session also explained what the transfer of wealth is, what it means to Nebraska hometowns, what it means to "Leave 5 to Thrive" and why Nebraskans should care.

Park Progress: More Fun Coming!





A great deal of progress has been made to update and renovate the Diller Park in 2021 and 2022. Phase 1 of the project was completed in 2021 with a new Tot Zone for ages 2 - 5 which included new playground equipment and re-purposing some existing equipment. Phase 2 consists of a new spin zone with equipment purchased in part from the Big Rock Grant awarded by Exmark Mfg. of Beatrice in the amount of \$25,000. Employees of Exmark also assisted with assembly and installation of the equipment in the fall of 2021. Finally, the walking path around the park perimeter and to the playground area was completed earlier this year. The Diller Community Foundation Fund awarded a grant of \$15,000 in 2022 to complete the last section of the walking path. Thank you to John Ebeling and LCC for their part in making this happen. The sidewalks have made the playground area more accessible for children to use and has provided a safe walking path for all ages. In addition, the Diller-Odell National Honor Society students will be painting new court lines on the basketball court which now has four new standards and backboards. The full court set is at regulation height and the half court pair are set at a youth height.

The third and final phase of the park improvement project is the "Motion Zone" and comple-

tion of the courtyard area. The projected cost for this phase is approximately \$70,000. The committee will continue to seek grants for funding as well as donations to support this phase. Donors will be recognized (if desired) on the current monument located in the park through three levels of giving: Patron - \$500-\$1,999; Benefactor - \$2,000-\$4,999 and Grand Benefactor - \$5,000 and Over. Funding for the new equipment was possible through donations to Jefferson County Health & Life. Roelfs named to NCF Board of Directors | Diller Fund Meets with County

Beth Roelfs has joined the Nebraska Community Foundation's board. Roelfs and her husband Dean are lifelong Diller residents living in rural Jefferson County. As a family, they raise livestock and farm. Roelfs taught 24 years at Odell and Diller-Odell Public Schools until her retirement in 2020.

Roelfs has served as an AmeriCorps member and with Blue Valley Community Action Head Start. Beth is an active volunteer within the community and serves on the Fund Advisory Committee for the Diller Community Foundation Fund, which is an affiliated fund of the Nebraska Community Foundation.



Fund Advisory Committee members for the Diller Community Foundation Fund had the opportunity to present information on several topics to the Jefferson County Commissioners in January. Kendra Weers gave a brief history and background of the fund as well as some of the highlights and accomplishments that have been achieved.

Beth Roelfs presented information from the youth survey completed by Diller-Odell students in the Spring of 2020. Highlights of the survey indicate that 62% of the students consider a small community an ideal place to live and raise a family and over one-third were likely to live in the area that they live in now. Good schools and quality healthcare, parks and outdoor recreation and entertainment were important to them for an ideal community.

The Nebraska Community Foundation recently released its 2021 Transfer of Wealth study for the State of Nebraska. Tammy Weers provided information from the study pertaining to Jefferson County. Over the next 10 years, it is estimated that \$580 million will transfer from generation to generation in Jefferson County. Some of these funds will go to taxes. Most will go to heirs. Due to outmigration, many of those heirs no longer live in the area and may no longer feel connected to our communities. Once wealth leaves our communities, the opportunity for give-back becomes more and more unlikely. Therefore, now is the time to encourage generous Nebraskans to give back today and consider their community in their estate plans for tomorrow.

have generously donated | Fed From the Farm strives to provide healthy, and nutritious beef/pork to the students of Diller Odell schools 1-2 times per week. Students learn about healthy eating habits along with how animals are raised and how crop production practices are used to raise feed for animals. The program has been providing locally produced meat for 3 going on 4 years to the school. Fed From the Farm is run completely on monetary and live animal donations from the community including the grant from the Diller Community Foundation.

Recycling Trailer

The Village of Diller has had a recycling trailer in town for a number of years. Previously, there had been no charge for dumping the trailer at the Beatrice Recycling Center. After the City of Beatrice purchased the center, there was a substantial charge for this service. The Diller Community Foundation Fund granted money to assist the Village of Diller with this expense. The village was also able to get a grant through the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality to help pay this expense.
