President's Message

I have received more chatter about the FOPs past support of HB1202, which was portrayed as a bill that eliminated qualified immunity for cops. In fact, when I meet with individual deputies on the fence about FOP, it is the number one thing they tell me that keeps them from joining.

So let's talk about HB1202 and how the legislative process works. First of all, in its inception and original form, no law enforcement groups supported it. In fact, it wasn't until legislators worked with the FOP to make it stronger protection for us than similar bills in any other state that our state lodge even commented on it. Notice how there's no "support". There is only praise for legislators being willing to listen and work with police representatives to better a bad Bill. In fact, Washington FOP brought in Colorado FOP experts to help the bill sponsors on this legislation, as they had been living it for over a year and had unique insight into the possible consequences of 1202. No other law enforcement groups in Washington had that capability. Other state FOP lodges called ours and asked how we dialed back the original bill because the same language was being introduced in their state. New Mexico was the only state that passed it last year, and they did not reach out to us.

Last year, for example, was one of the lowest bill clearance rates in Washington State history. Many ideas die before they ever see the governor's desk. Bills are sent to committees before the full house or Senate sees them. If the chair of a committee refuses to even hold a hearing for a bill, it's dead. If the chair holds a hearing but the majority of the committee refuses to come back to a vote on the bill, it's dead. If the committees votes but in the negative, it's DEAD.



Superior service and transparency, for all

WACOPS supported only one of these people in the primary. All of those opposition candidates running against these legislators were destroyed soundly in the recent primary election. What chance do you think a WACOPS supported bill has to see the light of day in the most important committees to law enforcement bills in Olympia? What influence do you think they have in blocking bad bills from being heard?

WACOPS has very little if any influence in Olympia. They cannot get the votes to pass a single piece of legislation that matters to cops. They are about as irrelevant as COMPAS was before it went out of business.

FOP doesn't claim to be perfect, but keep open relationships with both sides of the aisle for one big reason: they actually know the legislative process and how the majority party plays into that. They want to make our profession better than they found it and they don't publicly burn bridges with people who are firmly entrenched politicians.

Washington State FOP Procedure for Critical Incidents Spans the State

In light of recent events, your board wants to remind you that you are free to utilize all legal defense you have access to in order to represent yourself when you are involved in a critical incident.

That being said, we recognize that after such an incident, the last thing you want to think about is who is coming to represent you.

We have vetted Dan Thennell and his law group as our preferred local attorney. Dan has recently taken up OIS investigations against officers in Yakima and in Benton County, and has established a good procedure to ensure you are provided an <u>individual</u> attorney per officer involved in the incident. As the Office of Independent Investigations continues to be developed and planned, various independent investigation teams operate across the state. Eventually, this process will be made uniform under one entity... whether that entity ends up under the Attorney General's office or the Executive Branch is still up for debate.

Regardless of where this process ends up, it is now more important than ever that you have legal representation for all civil and criminal coverage both on and off duty when you act under the color of law. Regardless of where you get it, make sure you are protecting your family, your freedom, and your future.

PERC Rulings: Ben Franklin Transit, Decision 13550 (PECB, 2022)

Ben Franklin transit supervisors are represented by teamsters local 760. On an unrelated matter to this, they filed an unfair labor practice complaint in July 2021 against the organization.

Prior to this ULP, Ben Franklin Transit had purchased new Ford Rangers to replace the aging fleet of Taurus sedans used by their supervisors. The vehicles were actually purchased in advance in 2020. After the ULP, these vehicles were suddenly dropped from exclusive issuance to supervisors and issued at large to other employees.

Local 760 filed this ULP on the grounds that Ben Franklin Transit engaged in unlawful discrimination based on their members previously executing their rights against unfair labor designated by RCW 41.56.

Ultimately, the arbitrator in this case

VP Zielinski and I will be able to answer your questions and coordinate legal representation when you need it if you currently utilize the FOP Legal Defense Plan. 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ruled that the agency engaged n discrimination and ordered the trucks to be allocated to supervisors per the original agreement.

This ruling serves as a good reminder to employers that retaliation for the filing of valid ULPs by bargaining units does have consequences and that PERC has authority to exercise its authority to override this type of activity when warranted.
