

Following Trump's re-election, she was named a senior advisor and special government employee in February 2025 within the newly established White House Faith Office (<u>WhiteHouse.gov</u>).

Her rise to these influential positions highlights Trump's long-standing regard for her as his personal pastor and spiritual advisor—a relationship that has endured for over two decades.

The White House Faith Office: A Platform for Service or a Stage for False Teaching?

The White House Faith and Opportunity Initiative is an important advisory office that helps shape policies related to religious communities, faith-based organizations, and social initiatives.
