This I found on their website:

"In the late 1980's business had taken off at White's Electronics. The company wanted to offer something rare, valuable, and precious to very special individuals who had helped the company succeed. So the decision was made to commission a small batch of 25 Troy Ounce .999 Fine Silver Bullion Bars stamped with the legendary White's logo. Unlike other bullion bars, which are machined and processed, the White's specimens have a raw, freshpoured shape and finish, preserving the natural essence of the silver. With a fine luster like no other, these bars are highly sought-after by collectors around the world.

Through the following decades a limited few were given to certain individuals in the metal detecting community, but many were protected in the factory vault as the price of silver went up. This Christmas White's is offering up one 25oz bar from our private collection, and one very lucky customer will win it on December 23rd, 2016."_ update: an individual in Ontario, Oregon won this bar.

I have since learned there were a total of 1000-25oz bars made for this occasion. 500 were made in 1985, and the other 500 were made in 1987

Of the 1000 bars, only 747 were actually given away, sold or donated/prizes.

The other 253 have been transferred over to one of the White's family members as "personal property" from the company, and until the bars are transferred back to White's Electronics property, they are not for sale or available.

If anyone needs a repair on a Whites product, here is the information. I think it is in the old Whites factory. It is owned by Garretts.

Ryan P shared: First silver coin of 2025 and it's a Franklin half dollar kissed with rust. He was plucked from under an old apple tree in a park amongst lots of iron. Cool way to start the year! Found myself a buckle with amazing green patina from a site that also gave up a trifecta of eagle buttons which seem to be the pre civil war variety. One of them says Scovills Co. Super Fine and a really awesome signet ring with a J on it. Could be a real diamond, tests were inconclusive.









Jackee A shared: Favorite find is the Artillery Belt Plate from the Spanish American War!



Brian E shared: The last two months have been very exciting as I've begun to locate more exciting finds. The nicest ring to date, sterling and stones. Shotgun shells! I've become a big fan, did you know you can date almost all of them? Then I struck my first truly old coins, 35' & 37' buffalo, two in one hole! Days later in another location I hit on a 1913 buffalo! I was shocked. Then my first silver coin, 1942 war nickel, at a very popular Portland park! I feel the understanding of how my detector works has begun to deepen and pay off. At the club hunt I stumbled into a stash of bullets, pocketknives and old keys, that was a thrill. One final find, a small glass jar with paper and other objects in it. I've found several of these kinds of things and after digging a few decided to rebury and leave them be. Some can be pet graves and others occult incantations. I just decided to steer clear of these items because they are not

the treasure I'm looking for. U.M.C. Co. Majestic and with lines. Circa 1904-1908 My first silver coin! This might be a geocache or something else. You can see coins in the jar along with other artifacts and a paper. Regardless, not my treasure and water had gotten inside. My

Club Hunt Report



Date: February 1, 9am-1pm

Location: Wilshire Park, Portland, OR

Hunt Results: 19 members, including 2 guests turned out for the monthly club hunt. For this month's hunt Ryan hid ten regular club tokens, three special tokens and two grab bag tokens. The special tokens were good for one of: Washington silver quarter, .67 oz silver bracelet, and 1906 UK sixpence coin.

For the second club hunt in a row members had an amazing natural silver coin day. I can't recall two back-to-back club hunts that have been this productive for silver coins. Last month, the 33 members found 5 silver coins. This month 19 members found five silver coins. It just goes to show that silver is still very much out there in public parks! The club once again found four silver dimes and a silver quarter. Jason found his first Washington quarter, Jackee found a Merc and Rosie, and Lee and Ryan both found a Rosie. Sean found a 1918S wheat cent, the oldest coin on the day. Jeff found his second ever Buffalo nickel, sadly the date was wiped.

For other finds, Brian found 17 bullets and 3 pocketknives in one hole, but not much else of note, zero silver jewelry items which is a bit odd.

At count two of the special tokens were found by Lee who won the quarter and silver bracelet. The token for the 1906 sixpence was not found, and it will be put up for grabs at the next club hunt. Pat redeemed a grab bag token and pulled out a silver Merc.

Extra member draws were held for each natural silver coin found on the day. So five additional silver coins were given out to members by random draw. Pull tabs were collected and will be donated to the American Legion. (cont.)

2024 Annual Trash Report



Oregon Treasure Trail Society 2024 Trash Report

The Oregon Treasure Trail Society (O.T.T.S.) continues to demonstrate its commitment to environmental stewardship and community safety by actively removing trash from parks and schools during its organized club hunts. In 2024, the society conducted 12 hunts across various locations, including Portland City Parks, a Clark County Park in Washington, a Vancouver School, and a school in Orenco, Oregon. With participation ranging from 11 to 34 members per hunt, the society collectively dedicated 960 hours to clear a total of 186.5 pounds of trash, significantly enhancing the safety and cleanliness of these public spaces.

Locations and Trash Collected:

• Portland City Parks: 128 lbs

• Clark County Parks (Washington): 12.5 lbs

Vancouver Schools: 22 lbs
Orenco School: 24 lbs
Total for Year: 186.5 lbs

Dangerous Items Found: This year, an alarming number of vape pens and refill cartridges were discovered, highlighting a growing issue. All vape pens include a lithium battery inside. Members also unearthed broken glass, kitchen knives, box cutters, Bic cigarette lighters, drug paraphernalia (sharps), unfired bullets and batteries underscoring the critical role of detectorists in removing such hazards. Common items like nails, screws, and shredded aluminum cans were also collected and disposed of responsibly.

Participating in community clean-up efforts, like our monthly club hunt, plays a crucial role in environmental preservation. Each 5-gallon bucket filled with waste represents a commitment to reducing pollution and protecting wildlife from hazardous materials. Moreover, these activities foster a sense of community and responsibility, encouraging others to be mindful of their waste disposal habits. By removing dangerous items, your club not only beautifies natural spaces but also ensures they remain safe and healthy for everyone to enjoy. These efforts serve as a powerful reminder of the collective responsibility we all share in safeguarding our planet.


O.T.T.S. Club Metal Detecting Code of Ethics:
