Announcements & Information

A start for new members to OTTS: Detecting Videos & Training and other thoughts. As a metal detectorist you never stop learning. From your first detecting experience to your last you are learning about yourself, your machine and researching sites. While instruction from others is part of that process your most critical element is your own efforts to seek out information to educate yourself. A prime resource for this is the Internet.

Look for videos that that are specific to your machine and/or detecting skills you want to learn.

- Start with an online search for "metal detecting videos". Look for videos about your machine.
- YouTube.com is a great source, but look through the extensive list you found.
- If you fail to find videos on your specific machine don't fret. You can still learn plenty watching other instruction videos. Look for videos teaching techniques, skills and areas of interest.
- Get out and hunt frequently. Dig every signal for at least your first 60-100 hours. To make your signals easier to retrieve get a good quality pin-pointer and digger. This will save you hours of fruitless effort and frustration. And remember to refill your holes to as close to how you found them as possible.
- Settings Most machines, new or relatively new have factory settings, or programs. Makers have developed these programs to make their equipment ready to use out of the box. We recommend you use stock settings until you feel comfortable with your abilities.

Holiday Club Hunt Details

Monthly Club Hunt Report Date: January 5, 9am-lpm

Location: Harney Elementary & Edgewood Park, Vancouver, WA



Results: 33 members, including 2 brand new members, and 1 guest turned out for the Christmas club hunt. Ron and Jackee hid half the tokens at the school and Ryan hid the other half in the park. A total of 50 tokens made up of forty one Shell's Mr. President game tokens and nine gold painted clad were hidden and good for a silver quarter. If that wasn't enough, also hidden were ten OTTS stamped tokens good for a dime, five Barber silver half dollars, and three special tokens. Lauree and Clark brought snacks to count out which was great for all the hungry hunters.

For a Christmas themed hunt with lots of tokens hidden about, members actually turned out the best natural silver coin day in quite a while. Having a silver coin found at a club hunt is rare, but it does happen. The club found four silver dimes and a silver quarter between Harney and Edgewood Park. Since I began running club hunts in May of 2021, this hunt was the second most productive in terms of face value of silver, narrowly topping a six dime club hunt at Pier Park. What was the first most productive for face value silver? I'm glad you asked because that would be when Scott pulled a Morgan dollar at Fernhill! (cont.)

Club Hunt Details (cont.)

At this hunt Lee found a 1926-S Mercury dime, Jackee found a pair of Roosevelt dimes, and Fabian found his first silver coin ever, only realizing at count out that he had found a silver Rosie. Harold added to the total with a 1940s Washington Quarter he found 30 minutes before counting out. Lee's 1926 Mercury also won the oldest coin on the day, despite some wheat pennies also being found. For jewelry, Brian found a silver ring and Richard found a very nice tiger's eye ring handmade with silver wire. An oddly large amount of aluminum arcade tokens were found as well, along with the usual odds and ends.

At count out, Ron, Jackee, Ryan and Tim announced they had each found a hidden silver half dollar, with Jackee finding two. As far as the special tokens went, Brian won the Morgan Dollar and Harold won a loz silver round.

Everyone who didn't find a token was awarded a silver quarter. Then members with found tokens turned them in, some members had up to seven tokens good for a quarter! Astoundingly, all 41 Shell game tokens were turned in, and about half of the gold clad. 4 club tokens and one special token were not recovered. Extra member draws were held for each natural silver coin found on the day. So five additional silver coins were given out to members by random draw.

Pull tabs were collected and will be donated to the American Legion.

For the membership drawings, Harold and Ashely won half dollars. The top places in the competition hunt were:

1) Harold 135 points Prize: silver quarter

2) Jackee 120 points Prize: silver quarter

3) Tim 94 points Prize: silver quarter

4) Lee 76 points Prize: silver dime

5) Ryan 73 points Prize: silver dime

6) Brian 61 points Prize: silver dime

Total clad found: \$46.22

Trash collected during the hunt: 21 lbs! (this is about twice our average)

As a general reminder, anytime you go out, but especially when there is a large group like at a club hunt, everyone needs to make sure that holes are filled with care. Multiple members reported to me that some holes were being left unfilled, causing them to go and fix the situation themselves. Yes hand diggers can be more difficult to utilize, but that's no excuse for leaving a patch of soil looking worse than before you dug.

Next Club Hunt: OTTS will be hosting the next monthly club hunt on Saturday, February 1st. The meeting location will be announced soon, check the club calendar for updates. We will start at 9am and count out at 1pm. Be there by 8:30am! Nonmembers are always welcome.
