

President's Message

Sometimes the best finds aren't the loudest ones. On a recent hunt, I was pulling up surface targets to open up some deeper signals, first a washer, then a bit of can slaw. Nothing special. But once I stood up and swung over the spot again, I knew I had revealed something interesting. A clean, crisp tone rang through, and out of the hole popped a fantastic green penny. I recognized the distinctive wreath of an Indian immediately.

I flipped it over in excitement, looking for a date, but instead I was greeted by a second wreath. It wasn't one coin at all, but two Indian Head pennies stuck together. As I carefully separated them, the dates came into view: 1902 and 1889.

I couldn't help but imagine them in someone's pocket over a century ago. In 1889, Portland had just replaced horse-drawn trolleys with electric streetcars, and the Morrison Street Bridge was still new. By 1902, the city was paving streets, installing electric lights downtown, and preparing for the Lewis and Clark Centennial. Those coins were part of everyday life in a city that was growing as fast as it was changing.

Finds like that remind me why detecting is so fascinating, you can uncover the past and bring history back into the light. I wonder about the person who lost those pennies: where they were headed, what their day had been like, and whether they even realized they were gone. That curiosity is what keeps me swinging, even in the heat of summer. With the ground baked and signals faint, early mornings, shaded spots, and careful attention to those "iffy" tones can make the difference between heading home empty-handed and uncovering a moment from 120 years ago.

Always dig responsibly and leave no trace.

MY NEW DETECTING PARTNER

Meet Daisy (the pig). She followed me all around during four hours of a July metal detecting adventure.

There's a guy who buys tokens from me off eBay that I have become friends with. I mentioned to him that I did metal detecting. He said six to eight years ago, his divorced daughter, "in a fit of mental instability", threw her wedding ring from a car in his driveway into a grassy area. He said I was welcome to come down and look for it, about an hour and a half drive away from where I live.

He showed me a fifteen foot square area where he thought it should be. I hunted that with no luck. I then hunted north of that with no luck. I then hunted south and found the ring about twelve feet away from the edge of where he thought it was. It's 10K white gold with nine small diamonds. I gave it to him and said he could now give it back to his daughter. He said he was estranged from her and asked me if I wanted it. So I said I'd get him a good token from his town in exchange for it. I also gave him the other items I found in his yard, such as the bird wind chime, a toy tanker truck, a hummingbird mold and an Indian rock.



Ryan hid a total of 10 regular club tokens and two special tokens good for big prizes. For natural finds in the park, Jackee and Brian found silver coins! Jackee found a Barber dime from 19xx as it had been cut twice missing the last two digits of the date, still a great pull. It's only the second Barber dime I have seen found at a club hunt. Brian got in on the fun and found a silver Roosevelt dime. The club as a whole found a good amount of wheat pennies as well. No silver or gold jewelry was found. Jackee's Barber dime was counted as 1916 (the last year made) and won the oldest coin on the day.

At count out Lorilee and Brian won silver half dollars in the member drawing, Scott won a

silver quarter.
