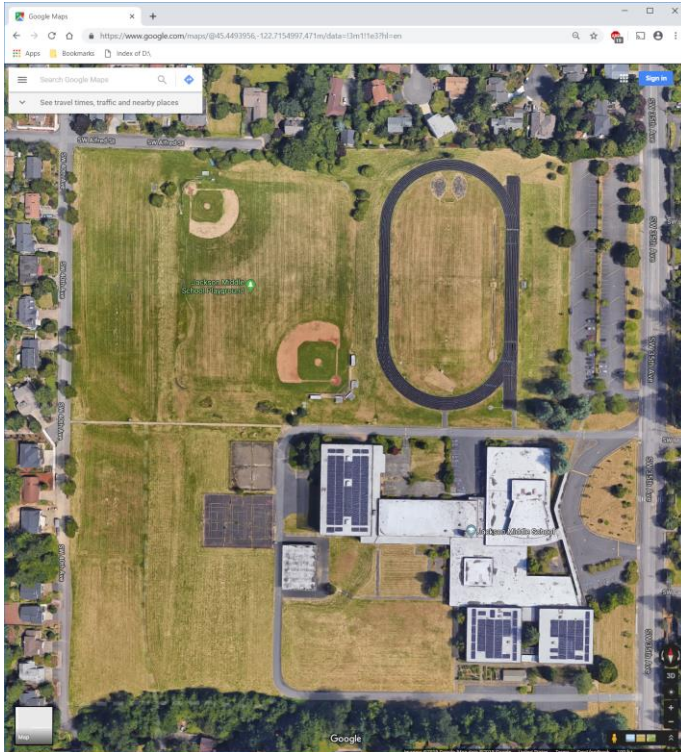

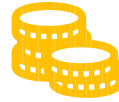
Total in clad found: \$35.74

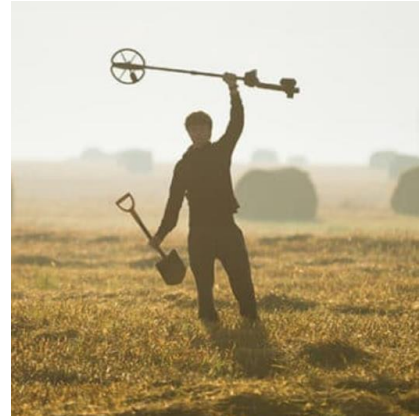
Code of Ethics
