O.T.T.S. President's Message

The Hazards of Hunting:

Many times I have been faced with difficult situations while detecting in the field. Whether it was a charging dog that seems Intent on causing a reaction, to someone taking pictures of you while digging a target and telling you that you are breaking the law. If you hunt a lot like I do, you will eventually run into a situation that causes a reaction by you. How will you handle this situation? Will you be combative and challenge the insulting party or animal to a dual? Are you one that is ready to whack an angry dog if he gets too close? Do you stand your ground? Or will you simply ignore the situation and hope it goes away? Trying to reason to someone who is intent on disturbing your existence can be difficult. I haven't had a dog yet try to bite me, but some have sure got my attention, and I was ready to defend myself.

Just the other day I was hunting with a friend in a park we have both detected in for years. My friend was confronted by someone representing the city, who did come from a nearby official building. He demanded that my friend leave and not to come back as there was an ordinance protecting the park from such activity. My friend tried to communicate with this person and even tried to introduce himself in a friend-ly manner which was abruptly discounted with a disapproving smirk and demanded he leave. There was no communication by this "official", just a get off my property approach. My friend agreed to move on, so we left. After meeting at the truck we discussed how this person had no skills in communication and didn't offer any proof of his authority, but how it was best to not cause an incident that could have gotten out of control.

I learned that many of these people, who approach you in anger or with questions as to why you are digging in the park, are the same people who; like an HOA board member who takes ownership to everything around them, believe only they are right in any situation. Clearly they have no tact or skills, only anger drives them.

Be careful how you handle a difficult person or animal in the field. In today's world you can be accused

of just about anything, and find yourself defending a situation that never even took place. Detecting in a group or with a friend is the best remedy for defusing or protecting yourself from a hazard from a person or animal.

At our next meeting I'm sure others would like to hear your story about a difficult or confrontational situation that has taken place while you were detecting. Until then; happy hunting.






O.T.T.S. Monthly Club Hunt

March 5th 2023

Location: Peninsula Park, 700 N Rosa Parks Way, Portland, OR 97217



General Information: None

Historical Information: The park was purchased by the city in 1909 for \$60,000 with funds raised in a 1908 bond measure. Originally owned by local businesswoman Liverpool Liz, it had been the site for a roadhouse and racetrack for quarter-mile horse racing. An autopark and campground were also included in the original parcel. Planned by renowned Oregon architects Ellis Lawrence and Ormond R. Bean, the park was a result of Portland's 1912 'City Beautiful' movement. Completed in 1913, much remains of the original features, including the lantern-style streetlights, the stone pillars, vast brickwork, and the nearly 100-year-old fountain in the center of the rose garden. Disc #4, a bronze sculpture by Jerry Allen, was installed in 1979 along the west side of the park.

Club Hunt Details

Hunt Results: 15 members turned out for the club hunt at Peninsula. Hidden on the day were 12 regular club tokens, four special tokens, two grab bag tokens, and 1 white zinc penny token. The hunt master offered a clue none of the tokens were hidden in the lower bowl of the rose garden. Included in the special tokens was one good for a 1942 Walking Liberty half dollar which was donated by a member.

For natural finds in the park, the club had a great day. Dan, Harold, and Tom found gold rings (Harold's wasn't marked but he tested it when he got home). Don and Tom found silver dimes, Don a 1949 D Rosie and Tom a beautiful 1920 S Mercury dime. Jackee, Tylor, and Willy found silver jewelry. A few wheat pennies were found by members, including a very nice green 1917 found by Scott H. Jackee found \$8.20 in clad, which is one of the highest totals seen recently. Tom found the oldest coin on the day, an 1896 V nickel, amazing that we were able to see the date on it!

At count out, the 1942 Walking Liberty was awarded to Harold who found the special token marked with an S. Tylor found the special tokens marked with A & B, winning a Standing Liberty Quarter and Washington Quarter. Nobody found the normal club special token and Ryan couldn't remember where he hid it, so it's still in the park. Dan got to try the grab bag, getting five seconds to reach in and pull out a prize. He pulled out a nice junk ring to much excitement. Club members turned in 11 of the 12 club tokens good for a silver dime each, the remaining token is still in the park and good for a silver dime at any club meeting. Ed found a white zinc penny token with a hat on it, winning a Nokta hat.

This was the second month of extra member drawing prizes!

Willy won the first membership drawing, winning a Franklin half dollar. Tom won the second drawing, also getting a Franklin half dollar. Bill won the third drawing for a Washington quarter.

Tom donated all of his silver wins back to the club for inclusion in the Summer BBQ event. This included a silver half, quarter and dime.

Once again, for the third month in a row, nobody found the normal special token. It must be a sign we need a new one and good thing because it's lost somewhere in the park! Next club hunt will feature two special tokens worth a silver quarter!


