



Laurelhurst Park- SE Cesar E Chavez Blvd & Stark St | Portland OR 97214



Club Hunt Details

General Information: Covers 30 acres. Acquired in 1909

Historical Information: In 1909, the land that is now Laurelhurst Park was purchased from the estate of William S. Ladd, who developed Ladd's Addition and twice was mayor of Portland. A spring-fed pond on the property had always been a favorite watering hole for cattle, as well as a favorite swimming hole for both children and adults. In 1911, seeing the potential for a park as part of the Olmsted Plan, the City of Portland bought 30 of the acres, including the pond. Laurelhurst Park is a perfect example of the City Beautiful Movement in landscaping. In 1919, the park was named the most beautiful park on the west coast by the Pacific Coast Parks Association.

Hunt Results: The OTTS October Club Hunt was held on Saturday the 30th. We met at the Whole Foods on SE 28th & Burnside. 19 members met between 7:15 and 7:45 am. The club left for the park at 8 am sharp. The air was cold but clear and windy at times. There was a blanket of leaves on the ground in many areas. Bottle caps were found in abundance, many members removed 50+ from the ground! Great job everyone on helping clean up the park.

Ryan P. and Matt N. hid 10 regular tokens and one special token. The club was only able to recover two of the regular tokens and the special token. Lee H. found the special token and won a 1957 quarter. The remaining club tokens are still in the park.

The top 6 winners at the hunt were:

1) Rick G. 99 points 2) Scott Jo. 94 points 3) Laura A. 84 points 4) Tim S. 82 points 5) Ryan P. 68 points 6) Matt N. 67 points

Honorable Mention: Lee H. 62 points, Bill B. 60 points, Steve E. 58 points, Jerry H. 54 points

Matt N. won the membership drawing, winning a 1963 Franklin half dollar.

The oldest coin was found by Matt N. - a very nice 1915 wheat penny with a nice green patina. He narrowly edged out Ashley W. who found a 1916 wheat penny. Scott Jo. found a 1919 wheat penny. Club members found a total of 14 wheat pennies on the day. Rick G. found a buffalo nickel. Other notable finds include a silver ring found by Steve E. and silver jewelry found by Lee H. Six foreign coins were found and 26 pieces of costume jewelry.

Three club members dressed up for the costume contest. Ashley W. won best costume by an overwhelming margin for his Army Mine Sweeper. He won a 1942 Walker half dollar. Matt N. was a scary viking and Ryan P. was a baseball player. Everyone that came in costume was awarded a Mercury dime.

Trash collected during the hunt: 25 lbs. Including a bbg grill, knife, and over 1,300 other items

Club Member's Experiences

Ryan P's AMAZING October find-14k solid gold pocket watch, circa 1902! The find of a lifetime and I still can't believe it!

I researched a new spot recently, and boy, did it pay off big. I was out with my Nox and stock coil running in Park-1, recovery 5, sensitivity 22 and this rang up 21-23 showing 2 bars deep. One scoop of dirt came out and there it was! My eyes got wide and I took a pic - it definitely looked like a pocket watch. But because I lifted it out bottom first the crown came off and got left in the hole (I went back the next day and got it). Looking at it in my hand without the crown suddenly it seemed liked more of a locket that maybe once contained a photo. I was definitely thrown off by the smaller size. There was no external markings to be seen indicating metal type. In fact this became my first legit solid gold item so I was by no means doing a happy dance I figured it was just gold filled, or something cheap dropped last week. I was optimistic it was old but I kept on detecting oblivious to the magnitude of what it was. It wasn't until I got home and got it open that I discovered what I truly had found. I opened the back case and saw the 14k stamp the happy dances begun!







This is an American Waltham Watch Co. model 1898, Riverside grade, size 6/0s, with 17 jewels, s/n 11519748. The total production of the Riverside grade was just over 12,000, and this one has an estimated production year of 1902. According to The Complete Guide to Watches No. 29 (I had to go to the Library) it has 17 ruby jewels, a raised gold setting and gold center wheel. All of the movement is in such rough shape, but I can confirm all the stamped lettering and serial number are in the correct places to confirm it's type. It's set in an American Watch Case Co. 14k gold case stamped 158336. The case features a hinged front lid, back lid and hinged Cuvette (dust cover) for a total of 3 hinges. They all have lips for opening them. The two exterior hinges were completely toast when I opened them, but to my surprise the dust cover protecting the movement still has a working hinge. The back has the fancy engraving "MOB." The dial is mostly gone now but it was fairly plain and featureless. Two hands, an hour and minute rotated around black Arabic numbers and red 5 minute marks. There is no second hand or mini dial near the bottom.


This find still hasn't sunk in. I tried scouring the internet to locate similar finds, they seem to be extremely rare. Apparently only 5% of pocket watches were made with solid gold cases...that's just, wow. I found this on public land and I'm just floored that it had been laying there for at least 100 years out in the open.

From Harold V-

I opened the jar. The note read:

"And the Answer is "George is in the Jar." I'm having fun and I like to metal detect. This is jar #86 of 100 (or more). Hope it was fun for you to find it."

Inside were several items. You can see the contents in the pics provided. The George reference is in regards to a dollar bill, which was registered on a tracking website. It allows people to see where a bill has been, if they register it and people visit the website.


