




O.T.T.S. Monthly Club Hunt

Location: Gabriel Park, SW 45th Ave & Vermont Street, Portland, OR 97219



General Information: Acquired 1950

Historical Information: October 1950, the Parks Bureau purchased an 87-acre (350,000 m2) tract of land featuring two small creeks and wooded areas between Vermont and Canby Streets for \$120,000. The land had been bought in 1890 by a Swiss immigrant named Ulrich Gabriel, who farmed this land and operated the Pine Creek Dairy as well.[3] In July 1995, Portland Parks & Recreation offered a 1.75-acre (7,100 m2) dog offleash area on a six-month trial basis in Gabriel Park. The Southwest Community Center was funded by Measure 26-10 and opened in June 1999.

- 4 Special Grab Bag Tokens = 2 out of 4 found good for a chance at the grab bag


