
Moon Tides and Fairy Dust






Barbara Kingsolver's fifth novel is a hymn to wildness that celebrates the prodigal spirit of human nature, and of nature itself. It weaves together

Pachinko by Min Jin Lee




National Book Award finalist

Deserted by her lover, Sunja is saved when a young tubercular minister offers to marry and bring her to Japan. So begins a sweeping saga of an exceptional family in exile from its homeland and caught in the indifferent arc of history. Through desperate struggles and hard-won triumphs, its members are bound together by deep roots as they face enduring questions of faith, family, and identity.

Paper Love: Searching for the Girl My Grandfather Left Behind by Sarah Wildman



Years after her grandfather's death, journalist Sarah Wildman stumbled upon a cache of his letters in a file labeled "Correspondence: Patients A–G." What she found inside weren't dry medical histories; instead what was written opened a path into the destroyed world that was her family's prewar Vienna. One woman's letters stood out: those from Valy—Valerie Scheftel—her grandfather's lover, who had remained behind when he fled

Europe six months after the Nazis annexed Austria. Obsessed with Valy's story, Wildman began a quest that lasted years and spanned continents. She discovered, to her shock, an entire world of other people searching for the same woman. In the course of discovering Valy's ultimate fate, she was forced to reexamine the story of her grandfather's triumphant escape and how this history fit within her own life.

Even though life has been hard on Addie French, all her protective instincts emerge when she meets a friendless young woman on a train from Kansas to New Mexico. But once Emma enters Addie's life, the secrets that unfold and schemes that are hatched cause both women to question everything they thought they knew.




All the Best, George Bush: My Life in Letters and Other Writings by George Bush

The Hunger Games (Book 1) by Suzanne Collins



Twilight (Book 1) by Stephenie Meyer



The Wedding by Nicholas Sparks (follow-up to The





meeting with area nonprofits, researching general and regional health systems, and compiling a list of resources for both mental and physical health issues. Feature Profile: Megan

What drew you to McLit as a site to complete your CHIP internship?

As I was looking through all of the different sites that the CHIP Program has to offer, the McLit site caught my eye. It explained how it is an education center for adult and child literacy as well as helping the underserved community, one of which was the refugees from Afghanistan. Being able to help all of these people caught my interest as this was not something that my hometown did.

What internship-related activities do you most enjoy doing, and why?

I enjoy going to all of the different outreach organizations to learn more about what they do for the community! What has been a struggle?

With our research project being on making a healthcare booklet, figuring out how to make the healthcare process easier has been a struggle. There are not a lot of resources all in one place that are not easy to read and with our group being young, figuring out all of this information for ourselves has been a challenge.

How will this experience help you reach your academic and career goals?

This experience will help me better understand the needs of my community and how I can help them. As I make my way forward towards my goals, I will have the knowledge on how to handle local issues that arise in the healthcare setting. On the academic aspect, learning about all of these organizations along with their members, I can apply this information to my public health classes. Feature Profile: Marilú, Assistant to the Director

What attracted you to McLit as a workplace?

In August 2021, I came to McLit to study English. I found that the people who work here want to help everyone who comes in and are very nice and polite. Our motto is: "Everyone is welcome."

McLit is a great job opportunity, it's what I like and know, I work and learn a lot every day.

Seeing the McLit activities and the professional way the McLit staff conducts these activities, I began to participate in some of them as a volunteer.

In March 2022, I received my Employment Authorization, shared my joy and showed it to all the McLit staff. A few days later, I was surprised when McLit's director, Connie, approached to me to see if I wanted to handle McLit's financial and administrative matters, as well as possible mentoring. I feel that thanks to God and McLit, I am working in my first job in the U.S.A.

How long have you been with McLit?

As a student, since the end of August last year. With my job opportunity, since mid-April this year.

What are your main roles and responsibilities?

My main roles and responsibilities are to record all income and expense transactions in Quicken (personal finance and money management software). I do the bank reconciliation. I do end of the month reports of bank balances. Participation in exhibitions where McLit is. Update and register students, tutors, and volunteers in the database. As well as any other activity inherent to McLit.

I hope to do accounting, internal control, taxes, asset control, payroll, among many other things that I am sure I can contribute to McLit. I would like to learn about tax, business, and accounting processes in the United States.

What unique talents/insights do you bring?

Well, I'm from Venezuela, and I graduated as a public accountant from the Universidad Santa María (USM) in 1992. In 1995, I was certified at the USM as a specialist in finance. In 2013, I received my degree in business administration from the same university.

Due not only to my academic preparation but also to the skills I acquired during my 30 years of work, among other responsibilities, as vice president of audit of the Industrial Bank of Venezuela, internal auditor of the National Superintendency of Internal Audit, administration manager in Telecommunications Movilnet, I think I could contribute to McLit's objectives. I have characterized myself by my commitment, responsibility and institutional loyalty.

What are some of your favorite memories with McLit so far?

My first day I arrived at McLit, I was very scared. I did not know how to say "hello" in English.



Thank God, Jodi (McLit tutor) received me with joy and understanding. She greeted me in Spanish. She gave me confidence and understood that I wanted to study ESL. Since that day, she has been my teacher. I am very grateful for Jodi's patience and attention, which has allowed me to learn, understand, write, read in English. I am aware that I am on the right track, little by little my hands that at the beginning were frozen by fear, now have been warming up with the affection that I receive every day at McLit.

For me it is important to talk about how I got to McLit. That day I walked from my son's house. I was very afraid of getting lost and not being able to return. I took courage and walked with a map on the screen of my old cell phone, and I had no Internet. That day was strange. My fears were mixed with my desire to study English, but Jodi's welcome gave me confidence, I already have nine months as a student at McLit!

What do you enjoy doing in your free time?

I like to read, walk, meditate, and do yoga.

What do you like to read?

I like to read books, I recently reread a book I had read some time ago, *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, in Spanish. I have read in English *Three Cups of Tea* by Greg Mortenson, suggested by my teacher Jodi. Also, at the suggestion of another one of my teachers, Ligia, I read *Yes! An update on McLit's new Spanish as a Second Language program

Spanish is the second most spoken language in the United States. According to 2019 Census data, the official Hispanic population in the U.S. is 60.5 billion (18.4 percent of the U.S. population), with predictions that this percentage will continue to rise.

Based on that fact, by the middle of January 2022, McLit set up Spanish as a Second Language tutoring (SSL). SSL classes are free and are taught by Venezuelan native Celin Mejias, who has studied both the French and English languages, including time spent in France. Mejias also has participated as an engineer in business meetings focused on fiber optic submarine cable systems in the United States, Europe, China, and South America.

At the beginning, SSL classes were scheduled from 9

a.m. to 11 a.m. Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Only one student attended the classes. Then two volunteers who were helping McLit with its Afghan refugee program liked the one-to-one method used by McLit to teach not only ESL but SSL too. So, two more learners were added to the classes, and by March, another two. Although McLit's first student couldn't continuously attend classes, he stopped by when his schedule permitted.

SSL tutoring continues to gain momentum and interest among community members.

The following table shows the number of students currently participating in SSL tutoring and total tutoring SSL hours/week (almost 20 percent of the tutor's activities).

METHOD:

Keeping students motivated has been one of the primary goals of McLit's SSL tutoring. Tutoring has focused on two strategic teaching objectives:

- Motivation
- Phonic Comprehension

Motivation: Based on Confidence and Fun

Confidence: How do you motivate students if you don't continuously promote self-confidence? No matter the level of Spanish language proficiency, you must

plant, water and nurture the self-confidence seed in each student.

Fun: How to make a class fun without the participation of the students, not only as learners, but also as teachers? Preparing recipes, books, dialogue performance, storytelling, and offering positive reinforcement is a fun and interactive experience in SSL tutoring.

Phonic Comprehension:

Unlike the English language, the vowels in Spanish only have one sound, no matter where they are placed in a word. On the other hand, the English language em-



phasizes consonants, and in general, each vowel has an unique sound. As a rule; however, the sound of the consonants in English and Spanish are very similar.

Amongst other things, to learn a foreign language is a matter of sound-repetition as well as comparison in some way with the native language.

Having said this, a continuous conversation, readalouds, and establishing a correlation between sounds and words (phonics) comprise the second scope of the Mc Lit's SSL Tutoring.
