


### Introduction

## McLit's English Language Learning+ Program picks up speed, expands

Whether it is learning a new language for professional, personal, or recreational reasons, the McLit English Language Learning Plus (ELL+) Program is going strong. In fact, recent months have seen the number of active students increase. Headed by McLit's Ligia Pineda and Jodi Schreier, the program's flexible approach allows tutor-learner pairs to work out their own schedules and curricula to best fit their specific goals.

"You can learn any language you want, if you have the ambition," Pineda says.

Read on to learn more about the nuts and bolts of the program, as well as the diverse group of tutors and learners who help make it a strong and thriving component of McLit.

#### • ELL+ Program Vision:

McLit's vision is to be a leading resource and champion for language learners in Wausau and surrounding communities.

#### ELL+ Program Mission:

To provide individual and group tutoring for peo-

ple learning a new language, or building upon their current skills, in order to help nurture cultural diversity, expand personal and professional opportunities, and improve quality of life.

#### ELL+ Program set up

The program is set up to work with the learner individually or in small groups based on personal preference. Classes are determined based on the learner's availability during McLit's weekday hours, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and by appointment on Saturdays.

The program works mainly with textbooks, computer programs, and informal conversation.

#### ELL+ Program Tutoring Philosophy

We believe that every learner brings a unique background that helps to shape personalized interactions with his/her tutor. This makes the learning process fun and informal.

Currently, McLit has a diverse group of 12 active learners, whose heritages span all seven continents. The program is comprised of two primary tutors; however, McLit is always willing to expand based on student interest, community needs, and accommodations to newcomers in the area.

## Ligia Pineda: ELL+ Tutor

#### • What languages do you speak?

I Speak my native language, Spanish, and English.

## What is your approach to teaching a new language?

I use an ELL textbook that tells the story of an immigrant going through different struggles in a new country (the United States), and from there I expand to teach pronouns, tenses, and conjugations as they apply to each individual student.

- What is special about the McLit ELL+ Program? The program is one-on-one, and tailors textbook basics to fit each student's unique learning style and goals.
- Favorite story from working with a student? I once taught a student English nursery rhymes because he wanted to recite them to his own child. He was a rural worker, and he particularly enjoyed Jack and Jill because it reminded him of his youth, when he had to get water from a well.
- What do you learn from working with students? I learn how people from everywhere have the same struggles and experiences.

## Discuss the challenging and rewarding parts of teaching

One of the challenges is that your life has to be balanced to transmit security and knowledge based in fact. A reward of teaching is that you feel useful and blessed to be a part of someone's future.

## • How can people interested in being a student or a tutor get involved?

They can come and learn about our program by talking to the tutors or executive director Connie Heidemann, and express their interest by filling out a tutor application, or choose a day and time to come for lessons.

#### How has the ELL+ Program expanded?

McLit will be open from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays for ELL students who might not have time during the work week. The "plus" in our program title also signifies that we can teach any language our students are interested in by connecting them with resources and individuals who can help them. We even have native English speakers learning Spanish.

Conversation groups will be open from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. every Saturday as an opportunity to practice English with, and get to know, other students.





#### Jodi Schreier: ELL+ Tutor

## • What is your approach to teaching a new language?

Start with the basics and expand from there. Make lessons fun and real world. Some fun topics that I have taught in the month of August include shopping, American money, and popular foods.

## What is special about the McLit ELL+ Program?

I love our *What's Next* workbook series where it puts you into the mind of an immigrant. Lessons on finding an apartment, learning English, and searching for a job are very important for our learners. I also think that our tutoring staff is very experienced and has a genuine passion for helping.

## What do you learn from working with students?

I have always loved learning about other cultures and languages so I thoroughly enjoy the exchange of vocabulary and customs.

## Discuss the challenges and rewarding parts of teaching

The only challenge I have initially is learning the student's personality. Once I know what learning style they respond too, it is easy to keep the lessons coming. The rewarding part is taking a shy, apprehensive person and making them feel comfortable with trying and making mistakes.

#### What does a typical class look like?

Class time will usually include a lesson from our *What's Next* workbook. It is a combination of reading, writing, listening, and comprehension. Beyond the *What's Next* lesson, each session is then tailored to a fit the individual personality. One student may want to practice restaurant words with the intention of securing a job as a cook. Another student may want help studying information for a citizenship test.

#### How has the ELL+ Program expanded?

McLit is always adapting to the flow and type of students.

Because our ELL+ Program has been so popular this summer, we have added a special Saturday group session for fall.

We can also match learners to a tutor who has special evening or weekend hours.

The new group lessons are a great approach for those

students who want to practice conversation and like to feel part of a community.

It can be great motivation to keep coming back when an entire group of learners is expecting to see your smiling face.

We also have connections for people who are looking to learn a foreign language. We have many learners who would rather learn from an actual person than be partners with a computer program. Person-to-person tutoring can prolong attention span and give helpful nonverbal clues.





## Carmen Fernandez: ELL+ Tutor

## • What languages do you speak? English and Spanish.

#### What is your approach to teaching a new language?

My approach to teaching another language is to teach everyday phrases and words to help the students better communicate with others in their communities.

## What is special about the McLit ELL+ Program?

The best thing about McLit is that it's free.

#### • Favorite story from working with a student?

This happens quite often, but seeing their eyes light up and the smile on their face when I explain why they must say a certain phrase one way instead of another, relating it to their language, makes me happy. I know it makes them happy to be able to connect the dots as to the "why's" so they feel more confident about the "how's" of the English language structure.

## What do you learn from working with students?

I learn so much from my students! They are so grateful and so eager to help me better teach them. Their eagerness to learn is contagious!

I find that sharing personal struggles and expeirences encourages students beacuse they know we care and want to get to know them so they want to learn even more as they get to know us as well.


## Discuss the challenging and rewarding parts of teaching

I feel the only time teaching can be challenging is when a student doesn't want to learn because you see no growth. When they do, and apply themselves to really try, they excel - now that's rewarding.

#### How has the ELL+ Program expanded?

We are now opening new hours for Spanish speaking students who can't make it during our 9-4 hours due to work. It's for conversational English classes. We also have group lesson opportunities in the making. We have done a few, Lydia (Fernandez-Wagner) and I, and find it to be very beneficial in learning to conversate with one another as well as encourage each other.

 Are there additional opportunities through the ELL+ Program?



Yes, Lydia is in the process of starting a Spanish class at 3 p.m. for those interested in learning Spanish as a second language. It's a conversational class to help tutors communicate with the Spanish-speaking students.

#### • Any additional comments?

I feel it is crucial for English-speaking tutors to learn Spanish as well. It's beneficial in communicating the reasoning for certain rules in the English language to their students so they can better understand. ■

## Lydia Fernandez-Wagner: ELL+ Tutor

#### What languages do you speak?

I speak English and Spanish.

#### What is your approach to teaching a new language?

My approach to teaching a new language is through learning the language's basic rules as well as phonics. Conversational phrases and vocabulary words as well as those words that are very similar to the Spanish words so it's easier for them to remember. I use fun activities such as scenarios, role play, simulations, and information gap activities to get them up and moving. These activities keep the lessons more relatable so they can better remember the words and phrases.

## What is special about the McLit ELL+ Program?

Everyone is welcome and can learn in a laid back, friendly atmosphere. The fact that it's free of charge keeps it open to everybody.

#### Favorite story from working with a student?

My favorite stoy from working with a student would be when I was teaching the sounds of vowels. Now since in Spanish, the "i" says the "e" sound, I've had to come up with creative ways to teach unfamiliar sounds. I teach them to wrinkle their noses like a bunny when they say the short "i" sound, which helps make the sound as well as serving as a visual. One of my "more seasoned" students did the short "i" sound first, then wrinkled her nose afterward. When she and everyone else realized what she had done, they all started laughing. It was the cutest thing. Especially coming from such a fun student that knows you're never too old to learn a new language.

## What do you learn from working with students?

What I learn from our students is what I've always known to be true in all my years of teaching; they all learn differently. I also learn about their cultures and countries, which is one of the best things I love about teaching English as a second language. The stories they share are absolutely phenomenal!

I often share stories about my life experiences as object lessons to help them remember certain phrases as well as my culture. Although our cultures are very similar, there are quite a few differences in each one.

## Discuss the challenging and rewarding parts of teaching

The only challenges in teaching have to do with time.



The time a student puts toward learning makes a difference. Some students either don't have the time to study what they've learned, or don't make the time. The ones who do really excel. Getting them to apply themselves outside of class is the struggle because that requires motivation on their part, not ours. The rewarding part of teaching is seeing those students excel. Knowing that I was able to help someone get ahead in life, because being able to bridge that language gap is crucial, is the most rewarding feeling ever!

#### How has the ELL+ Program expanded?

We have begun new hours on Saturdays from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. for our students who are learning English or Spanish to practice conversating in the language they are learning. Unlike the hours during the week, these are limited until the need grows. Also, we are only doing Saturdays by appointment for now. Group sessions are beginning next week for Spanish lessons in the afternoon. We are excited to have all our staff learning some conversational Spanish to be able to greet our Spanish-speaking students and direct them to the right place, as well as get to know them by name. I'll be teaching the class so I will be making it fun and interactive, which makes it memorable and easier to retain the information. Not only will everyone learn the Spanish language, but the cultures as well. Hope to see you there. :)

#### Any additional comments?

I would like to say that it is a privilege to volunteer at McLit because making a difference in someone else's life is the most rewarding feeling you will ever have. ■

## A Typical, Magical Fall Day at McLit by Jodi Schreier

One of our quietest students is an adult learner named Matt. He comes to the Marathon County Literacy Council every Tuesday and Thursday like clockwork. He loves sports and helps locally with some area teams. It is not unusual to see him in a sports T-shirt and a baseball cap. Since he is a regular tutee, he has his very own cubby hole at McLit where he keeps his workbooks. Our highest table is his favorite and sometimes Matt nonchalantly listens in on other lessons that are happening around him. After a few minutes he opens his workbook, picks up his pencil and begins his lesson of the day. Matt works diligently to perfect his printed letters. Word and sentence books help him practice spelling common words. He is excellent at working independently but we check in on him often to offer encouragement and suggestions.

Soon after we open, Carlos, a student visiting us from Guatemala, and a few other students from our English Language Learner Plus program enter. Carlos uses our largest table as his home base for online studying. He brings his own laptop and headphones and works for most of the day. The other ELL students head downstairs for a group session led by our worker, Lydia. Today they are playing a fun game of "find me a..." where they have to look around the room to point out the object, using English vocabulary. After the game, the lesson continues with vocabulary words found in common rooms of the house.

Around 10:30 a.m., our learner Travis, who is studying health through NTC, pops in. He comes to use our computers to take his chapter quizzes. A staff member or volunteer usually sits with him and we read part of his chapter together and help to keep him on track when he gets stuck on a question. Travis is very smart and has already completed his NTC health lessons with us. His end goal is an HSED.

Next, we get a youthful visitor who has been a part of our center for quite a while. Chris has been coming every Thursday and Friday for many months. He is a 20-year-old man, who lives in a group home and uses our center for basic adult education. His favorite subject to work on is math. Today he has news! He is relocating to another city here in Wisconsin due to a job transfer and he has a new apartment lined up. Chris says that he will miss coming to our learning center, but is excited for this new chapter. We have seen him grow up before our eyes!

Midday, a gentleman arrives needing help writ-

ing a letter to his girlfriend, who is in the Detroit Lakes Jail. Our volunteer Judy works with him to complete the letter and sends him off with a stamped envelope that he wants to walk over to the post office for safe delivery. Judy is then off to North Central Health Care: Community Clubhouse on North 3rd here in Wausau, where she assists with reading, math, and computers. We love to partner with area centers to spread our love of literacy.

Our day continues as Sandra wanders in to the Marathon County Literacy Council on a whim. She had been released from jail and had walked past our center a couple times and was curious about what we did. I gave her a tour and explained that we offered free tutoring and free computer use for community learners. She then asked if I would be able to help her research a few things. She wanted to find a safe place to stay as she was a domestic violence survivor. We printed out the contact information for the Women's Community and the Salvation Army. Sandra said that she would feel safer at a shelter around other people. She also wanted to learn about getting her driver's license renewed at the DMV. We looked together at the DMV website. After that, we moved on to court records.

Sandra stayed most of the afternoon listing off a series of to-do tasks for her new beginnings and together we plotted out a plan of action. We get her a folder, a notebook, a pen, and even a pair of readers from our lost and found. She says she feels 100 percent better, and is so glad that she has found such a wonderful resource hub in McLit. Her desire to create a better world for her 8-year-old daughter gives her the motivation to focus ahead on a better future. Her last stop while visiting us today was to browse our free book shelves (donated by community members like YOU), where she finds an inspirational quote book and a novel which she says will help her to relax.

Whether we are working with a long-term student like Matt, a visitor like Carlos, or even a one-time guest like Sandra, the Marathon County Literacy Council is happy to be a beacon for those in need. Some search for a quiet space to study, some need a helping hand with computer literacy, reading or writing, and others use us as a resource stop. We are many things to many different people, and each day we encounter a different learner with a different story. Each member of our community is valuable and we enjoy building up confidence and skill sets to make life journeys a little lighter.


#### ■ What do you enjoy doing in your free time?
