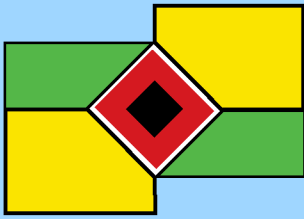
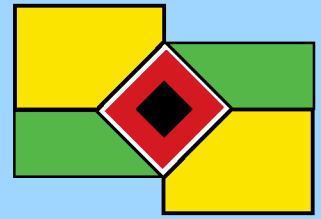


17th Annual Native American Studies Celebration
