

"1963: South Carolina's 'Year of Decision' - Racial Desegregation in the Palmetto State: Part I - the Clemson Agricultural College of South Carolina"

In January 1963, Harvey B. Gantt, an African-American student from Charleston, broke down South Carolina's racial barriers in higher education by enrolling at Clemson College. Unlike the experience of other Deep South states, South Carolina did so without bloodshed, violence, or the presence of federal force. This lecture looks behind the scenes to examine how the Palmetto State accomplished what one contemporary observer called, "Integration With Dignity."
