### A Vísít Wíth Dr. John



"But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith He unto his disciples, the harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest." Mark 9:36-38

Let me talk about a few emphases from this passage of scripture. The first thing of note is that Jesus saw a world of need. He saw the multitude as people who fainted and we're scattered abroad. A better translation of these two words could be "as if the people were ripped and flayed," as sheep who had no shepherd to guard them against the mountain lions and wolves.

We must note that there were many spiritual Shepherds in Palestine during the time of Christ. Jesus is remembered in the gospels as having had arguments with lots of them about putting burdens upon the people rather than helping them to have a right relationship with God and a good life.

Verse 36 says that Jesus was moved with compassion on them. That phrase translates one single word in the Greek text. It sometimes is translated as "having bowels of compassion." The verb expresses the physical condition of the upper visceral area when a person sees a loved one who had a terrible accident or has a frightening or near death experience. At times, folk say, "my stomach turned over!" The words indicate that Jesus had that close, loving feeling for them as if they were all close loved ones. He was touched by them and the needs in their lives. I believe that the Lord loves people like that now. God so loved the world...!

Sometimes people talk about the *agape* love of God as simply a matter of the will, having nothing to do with feeling. Truly Jesus loved people and worked for their good whether they deserved it or not. This passage indicates to us that he is emotionally involved in trying to help us connect with God and have a better life.

He lived his life during his ministry helping people with their needs. He healed the sick. He raised dead people back to their grieving families! He taught them of God's love and the forgiveness they could have through repentance and faith in Him!

Jesus also urged His followers to pray for workers in the harvest. The harvest of people has to do with ministry and evangelism. Jesus is looking for people who are willing to join hands with God in His great ministry in this world. He desires people to join with Him in ministering to the many needs of people. He desires people to help the world know that God loves them and that forgiveness is possible through the merit of Jesus Christ!

Thank the Lord we still can be involved in this even in the midst of a pandemic or any other crisis the world will ever have! May we be more like Christ, feeling the needs of people around us, and acting as God's emissaries to alleviate needs and bring the gospel!
