What is the Return to School Survey

The Return to School 2020 Survey was administered from June 12 to June 30 by the NYCDOE to compile feedback from families and students regarding the 2020-21 school year as we explore various options for re-opening our school buildings.

The feedback collected through this survey will be used by the NYCDOE and individual schools to inform their re-opening plans. Please note that this survey represents perspectives of families and students at the time of the survey. Family and student perspectives may change towards the start of the school year depending on rates of COVID transmission over the summer.

Families

- Students and staff regularly wash hands.
- Hand sanitizer is provided in each classroom and frequently used.
- The school is thoroughly cleaned at least once a day.
- Materials shared among students are cleaned in between use.
- Visitors and volunteers are limited on campus.

Students

- Hand sanitizer is provided in each classroom and used during the day.
- Students and adults wash hands with soap and water during the day.
- The school is cleaned at least once a day.
- Bus driver and attendant wear masks.
- Visitors and volunteers are limited at school.

if schools are not open every day for in-person learning for all students, we need to consider

Families

Instruction in core content areas like reading, writing, math, science, and social studies (82%)

Activities that build social-emotional skills like communication, collaboration, empathy, etc. (67%)

Classes like art, music, physical education (P.E.), and electives (59%)

Supports for students struggling in reading or math (35%)

Support services like counseling and/or therapy (11%)

Going to classes like art, music, physical education (P.E.), and electives (81%)

Learning about reading, writing, math, science, and social studies (76%)

Participating in activities that help you learn how to communicate and work with others (43%)

Getting extra help in reading or math (39%)

Meeting with your counselor and/or therapist (26%)
