#### **Priority 1: Literacy**

Priority 1 ELA

#### Met both goals



Goal 1: By EOY 2022-23 screener administration, we will increase the percentage of students meeting or exceeding Acadience Early Literacy screener benchmarks by 3%.

Evidence: The baseline from 21-22 was 55.7% of students that met or exceeded the Acadience Early Literacy screener benchmark.

In 22-23, 61.3% of students met or exceeded the Acadience Early Literacy screener benchmark, an increase of 5.6% based on Acadience Data.



Goal 2: By June 2023, the number of economically disadvantaged students scoring at Level 1 on the NYS ELA Exam (or whose EOY screeners show "well below grade level") will decrease by 3%.

Baseline from 2021-2022: Economically disadvantaged students at a level 1 on the NYS ELA exam was 36.6% 2022-2023 Economically disadvantaged students at a level 1 on the NYS ELA exam was 24.9% a decrease of 11.7%.



#### **Priority 2: Supportive Environment**

Priority 2 Supportive Environment Met 2 of 3 goals



Goal 1: By June 2023, 2% of students will identify feeling supported with mental health resources due to increased access by adults in their building through partnerships and direct support from the superintendent office as measured by the 2022-2023 school survey

**Evidence:** 73% of students identified as feeling supported with mental health resources due to increased access by adults in their building through partnerships and direct support from the superintendent office as measured by the 2022-2023 school survey. This is a 1% increase/decrease.

**Next Steps:** We will improve knowledge of access to students by hosting district parent workshops to inform of resources in schools. We will support school counselors with promoting communication around mental health supports at schools, and aligning our schools' comprehensive counseling plan to the American School Counseling Association National Model.



Goal 2: By June 2023, suspension rates of black males with disabilities will decrease by 1% due to professional development of counseling teams ability to implement PBIS strategies and supporting staff in professional development surrounding de-escalation strategies as measured by SEO Power BI.

**Evidence:** In 22-23 black males with disabilities were suspended 29 times (down from 37) which is a decrease of 8.3% as measured by SEO Power BI.



Goal: By June 2023, there will be a 2% decrease of students feeling harassed, bullied or intimidated through consistent bullying prevention education through 3 district parent workshops, partnerships (i.e. OYSD, office of school safety, etc.) monthly professional development (10 sessions) through our equity grant and district training facilitated by the student services team as measured by the 2022-2023 school survey.

Evidence: In 22-23, the percent of students feeling harassed or bullied as measured by the 2022-2023 school survey was 64% a decrease of 5%.



#### **Priority 3: Math**

Priority 3 Math Met all 4 goals



Goal 1: By June 2023, Level 1 scores on the Math State Exam for black students will decrease from 45.2% to 41.2%

Evidence: According to the 22-23 NYS Math State Exam, Level 1 scores on for black students was 29.7% a decrease of 15.5%



Goal 2: By June 2023, Level 1 scores on the Math State Exam for Hispanic students will decrease from 45.4% to 41.4%

Evidence: According to the 22-23 NYS Math State Exam, Level 1 scores on for Hispanic students was 30.3% a decrease of 15.1%



Goal 3: By June 2023, Math State Exam proficiency rates (level 3 & 4) will increase 3% from 29.8% to 32.8% (Black Students)

**Evidence:** According to the 22-23 NYS Math State Exam, proficiency rates (level 3 & 4) for Black students was 39.4% and increase of 12.7%



Goal 4: By June 2023, Math State Exam proficiency rates (level 3 & 4) will increase 3% from 34.7% to 37.7% (Hispanic Students)

**Evidence:** According to the 22-23 NYS Math State Exam, proficiency rates (level 3 & 4) for Hispanic students was 39.5% and increase of 12.9%



#### **Priority 4: Career and College Readiness**

Priority 4
Career & College Readiness

Met goal



Goal 1: By June 2023, ELL students will demonstrate an increase of 2.4 from 44.6 to 47 in their CCPCI index (students taking college level classes) at both Boerum Hill HS and Brooklyn HS for the Arts.

**Evidence:** Only 6 ELL students were measured through the CCPCI Index for 2022-23

For SY 2022-2023, the combined CCPCI index (students taking college level classes) for ALL HS Boerum Hill HS and Brooklyn HS for the Arts was 65.4 For SY 21-22, the CCPCI index was 44.6 (an increase of 20.8)

For SY 2022-2023, the combined average graduation rate for Boerum Hill HS and Brooklyn HS for the Arts was 93% (3.2% increase) for all students, 87.9% for SWD (3.2% increase), 66.7% for ELL students (19.5% increase), 92.5% for Black Students (1.7% increase), and 93.9% for Hispanic students (9.6% increase).



#### **Priority 5: Parent Engagement**

Priority 5
Parent Engagement

#### Met all 3 goals



Goal 1: By June 2023, every District Town Hall and family workshop has simultaneous interpretation available in 3 of the 4 preferred languages with a minimum of 3% of attendees using the service as measured by feedback and attendance.

**Evidence:** Every District Town Hall and family workshop had simultaneous interpretation available in 3 of the 4 preferred languages and 3% of attendees used the service as measured by feedback and attendance.



Goal: By June 2023, present topics most relevant to District parents at Town Halls and family workshops to increase attendance by 10%; to provide family learning and meeting spaces at the District office and two satellite offices.

Evidence: District parent attendance increased by 7% at District 15 Town Halls and family workshops to.



Goal: By June 2023, D15 will increase Parent Coordinator capacity to support immigrant families by providing structured professional development that includes curricula and materials designed for early generation immigrant families resulting in an increase of 3% of attendance at PC meetings, etc, as measured by attendance records.

Evidence: There was an increase of 4% in attendance at PC meetings, etc, as measured by attendance records

Summary of District Goals:

Priority 1 (Literacy): District 15 is using formative assessments to find our marginalized students and target the literacy needs of the students.

Priority 2 (Supportive Environment) Goals: Through professional development of counseling teams, support from the district team and utilization of grant funds, we will provide with mental health resources, reduce bullying and de-escalate more incidents.

Priority 3 (Math) Goals: District 15 is using formative assessments to find our marginalized students and target the math needs of the students.



Summary of District Goals (continued):

Priority 4 (College & Career Readiness) Goals: By providing resources and holding district-wide events, students and families with have access to career and college options beyond high school.

Priority 5 (Parent Outreach) Goals: Bi-monthly District family workshops will be held to educate, engage, inform and empower parents in their child's education. PA/PTA, CEC 15 and Presidents Council meetings will provide workshops for parent leaders.

Priority (Chronic Absenteeism) Goals: The district team will work with school attendance staff to utilize data and not trends to strengthen structures and address student and family needs to improve attendance.
