



Goal 1: (Priority 4)


By June 2025, BKNHS will partner with industries to offer authentic work-based learning experiences, enriched by industry and academic partnerships informed by student voice and choice, where students are ignited by rigorous, dynamic hands-on experiences in 21st century, technologyinfused classrooms, that inspire them in their pursuit of passions and goals reflecting a 4-point district increase of students participating in career connected pathway, and a 16 point increase of students that have a post-secondary pathway of interest documented in STARS.

Goal 2: (Priorities 1, 2 & 3)

By June 2025, all BKNHS will provide a physically and emotionally safe high-quality student learning experience that is literacy based, culturally responsive and sustaining, includes standards-aligned curricula with formative assessments for progress monitoring, ensures that all students learning needs are met and integrates highly impactful instructional and SEL practices, whereby district incidents and suspensions decrease by 3%, the average district ELA and Algebra 1 Regents scores will increase 3-10 points for all students and college & career readiness increase by 6 points, and overall increases in district graduation rate.

Goal 3: (Priority 5)

By June 2025, district parent involvement will increase 4% where all BKNHS will create or expand their parent engagement plans to increase family involvement in our schools through collaboration and partnership with community stakeholders, empowering parents to be supporters, monitors, and advocates to sustain and advance student academic outcomes and personal success.





Goal 4: Chronic Absenteeism (Priority CA)

By June 2025, the district chronic absenteeism rate will decrease by 3%, and overall attendance will increase by 2% with an interdisciplinary attendance team that includes school stakeholders (counselors, administrators, school partners); structures for data monitoring and analysis, evaluation and assessment; and opportunities for meaningful stakeholder engagement.

BKNHS Implementation (2023-24)

- Tiered support district leads, Equity & Rigor partners (Dr. Dickey, HMH)
- 26 out of 47 schools implemented HMH Into Lit

2023-24 DCEP Goals (by June 2024):

- ELA Regents exam passing rate will show a district average increase 5% from 56% to 61%.
- ELA Regents college career ready district average, will increase 5% increase in college and career readiness from 35% to 40%.

Impact of Implementation:

- We exceeded our goal of an increase in ELA Regents exam passing rate by 3%, resulting in an 14% increase to 70% (source: Superintendent's Dashboard).
- We exceeded our goal for ELA College Career Readiness scores district average by June was 45%
- PSS 73% of schools (19 out 26) who responded indicated they received at least "Just Enough" support.

2024-25 Goals (By June 2025)

- District average score for all students, as measured by the ELA Regents exam, will show an increase of 5 points from 61.5 to 66.5.
- District average ELA regents scores for SWDs will show an increase by 3 points from 57.7% to 60%.
- Average ELA score for M/ELLs will increase by 5-11 points from 44.7 to 49.7-55.7.

Action Plan:

- Support Schools with interim assessments for progress monitoring; teachers to use data to monitor student groups and inform differentiated instruction
- Provide training teacher teams in identifying high leverage standards to tailor instruction according to students' needs.
- Provide additional support and coaching for schools receiving services from district literacy partners.
- Support teacher of ELLs/SWD with scaffolding grade level content in ELA for these populations of students.
- District common assessment MAP all grades; support teacher teams to analyze data and using it to inform instructional decisions.
- Analyze district MAP data from September, December and March to monitor progress based on MAP growth reading assessments that align with Next Gen English standards assessed on the Regents exam.



DCEP Priority 2: All students are physically and emotionally safe

2023-24 DCEP Goals:

- The number of level 4 and 5 district incidents will decrease by 3% as measured by the OORS reports.
- There will be a 10% increase of district students reporting in the NYC Survey that "there is time to process feelings and emotions in school."

Impact of Implementation

- BKNHS proudly met the goal of reducing level 4 and 5 incidents by 9.8% 3 times the goal we had set for the district
- Intentional focus on identifying intersection of social and emotional learning in classrooms, ensuring adults support their needs, progress, and success.
- Meaningful student leadership opportunities such as MBSK, the Aspen Challenge, and college tours, trips, and activities.
- NYC student perception survey showed an increase in favorable responses for students to process feelings and emotions in school

2024-25 Goals & Action Plan

Priority 2:

- The number of level 4 and 5 district incidents will decrease 3% from 1465 to 1421(level 4) and from 299 to 290 (level 5) as measured by the OORS: Power BI reports.
- The number of district school suspensions will decrease by 3% from 1310 to 1270 (Principal) and 323 to 313(Superintendent) as measured by SOHO;
 Power BI reports.

Action Plan

- Review/analyze all OORS level 4 /5 incidents/SOHO suspensions weekly and review with school ILT monthly to support progress monitoring.
- Collaborate with Borough Safety Directors to conduct a fall and spring assessment for top 15 schools (incidents/suspensions) to support intervention strategies and goal implementation.
- Provide monthly professional development for guidance teams, deans, parent coordinators to customize cohort student plans to ensure that there are tiered 1-3 interventions.
- Provide monthly School Counselor meetings and joint meetings twice a year with Parent Coordinators to support communication and awareness of intervention strategies to reduce incidents and boost student wellness.

Note:

At this time, the district is trending down after an increase in incidents at the start of the school year. By October, we were +22% compared to last year. As of today, we are trending back down by 4%. We will continue to work with schools to identify conditions leading to poor choices to constantly reflect and revise systems & structures to support students.

Note:

Related to incidents, suspensions reflect an increase in incidents at the start of the school year. As of today, we are trending back down. Superintendent suspensions are most in our control and we are proud that there have been limited increase since last year. We are working with schools to ensure students have a reentry plan to fully restore them to the school community and reduce the risk of them being suspended again for similar choices.

NYC Solves – DCEP Priority 3

All students have a high-quality academic experience

BKNHS IM Implementation (2023-24):

- 40 out of 47 schools participated in Phase 1 implementation with teachers and school leaders engaging in professional learning sessions throughout the year
- Tiered support provided through coaching partner New Visions, district Math leads/instructional specialists, partner (STEM strategies)

2023-24 DCEP Goal 3:

- Average passing rate for the June Algebra 1 Regents exam will increase by 4% to 50%
- District average Algebra I Regents score will increase by 3.2 points to 64.3

Reflection on Implementation:

- Although teachers and school leaders were provided with yearlong PL and job-embedded implementation support, there was a 9% decrease in passing rate to 37% overall (39% for 9th graders) and a decrease in Algebra 1 average Regents score by 2.5% to 58.6%.
- PSS highlights 92.3% of schools (24 out of 26) responded favorably about Math Support.

2024-25 Goals & Phase 2 Implementation

DCEP Goals: District average Algebra I Regents score for all students will increase by 5-8 points, from 58.6 to 63.6 - 66.6. The District average Algebra I Regents score for SWD will increase by 3-6 points from 54.2 for to 57.2-60.2.

- 45 Brooklyn North High Schools will implement IM this year and all schools have a math CEP goal which we will progress monitor as a district
- Teachers and school leaders will receive ongoing, year-long PL alongside in-school job-embedded support (New Visions and district team math specialists)
- Monthly Office Hours sessions for school leaders who support our math teachers implementing the curriculum -- facilitated by district team math points
- Selected schools will use EDIA (16 schools) and PrismsVR to support improved student outcomes
- IM coaching will focus on talk routines and scaffolding strategies to support ELLs with access to the curriculum
- District points will support special education teachers in effectively using specially designed instruction (SDI) with in-school and virtual team meetings
- District points will support special education teachers in appropriately using MAP growth results to develop IEP goals and to inform math instruction


College & Career Readiness

All students graduate college and career ready and have a strong plan and pathway to economic security.

BKNHS Implementation (Prior SY 2023-24)

- The college & career readiness index (according to the new measures) continues to trend upwards, increasing from 56% in 2022, to 57% in 2023, to 60% in 2024.
- The percent of students enrolled in AP/IB courses has increased <u>15</u>% from 30% to 45%, more than double our goal of 6%.
- The number of New York State Seal of Biliteracy awardees in Brooklyn North High Schools, increased from 160 to 182 - a 13.75% increase, exceeded our goal of 10% by 3.75%.

2024-25 DCEP Goals for June 2025:



- 4-point increase in all students participating in a career connected learning pathway (FRNYC, CRMYA, CTE) from 6% to 10%.
- 6.5-point increase in all students enrolled in all advanced course offerings from 63.5% to 70%.



Progress Monitoring Data Point (as of 2/27/2025): **18 Brooklyn North High Schools** have registered to offer the New York State Seal of Biliteracy this year.

District plan of support:

Chronic Absenteeism:

- By June 2025, the district average year to date attendance will increase by 2% from 88% to 90%
- By June 2025, the district chronic absenteeism rate will decrease by 3% from 36% to 33%.

Action Plan


- District Monthly Meeting To review data trends, CA planning, and share attendance resource tools
- Review CA Success Mentoring strategies
- Identify students from older cohorts who are not engaged and are long term LTA to explore alternative placements
- Develop task force team with district attendance teachers to support targeted schools to review CA plans, make home visits, and review data
- Meet with attendance teams to review success mentoring strategies.
- Support schools with tracking and monitoring OTC student admits as CA rates rise in the spring due to the lower CA threshold to be absent 10% of total
 enrolled days.






Attendance & Chronic Absenteeism: Miss a Day, Miss a Lot

Meeting the Moment – DCEP Priority 5

Creating safe, meaningful, and inclusive spaces for students

2023-24 DCEP Goal

- Parent involvement will increase by 5% showing that at least 75% of families in Brooklyn North high schools will respond favorably that they are involved in schools as reported in the NYC school survey.
- The district team will collaborate with stakeholders, including students and families, to reimagine at least 1 campus to attract more students.
- 10 district schools will have engaged in a Future Classrooms initiative to innovate curriculum and the learning environment to attract students.

Impact of Implementation - all goals were exceeded

- The 2024 School Survey showed that 76% of families in BKNHS responded favorably that they are involved in school.
- Brooklyn North High Schools successfully implemented a merger of FDNY High School and School for Civil Rights; as well as opened Bard Brooklyn offering a high-quality alternative for in District 19.
- 16 schools are actively partnering with LINC to effectively integrate technology to enhance pedagogy in classrooms (160% of our goal of 10 schools); 5 schools have invested in classroom modernization projects.

2024-25 Goals & Action Plan (By June 2025)

- Favorable responses to parent involvement questions will increase by 4 points to 80% of families, as measured by the NYC school survey.
- 10 additional district schools will have transformed at least one student space to align with the district vision for a reimagined 21st century STEM infused learning environment.

Action Plan

- Monitor district PCAR data and support increasing family involvement; monthly training for PC, APs, and counselors
- Updates & strategies at principal's meetings; monitor SLT agenda and minute uploads to iPlan portal.
- Support schools to optimize resources to support these initiatives and share strategies to increase parent involvement.
- Support schools to engage with appropriate partners to modernize a learning space and/or curriculum; and support with enrollment.
- Support teachers to evolve pedagogy to reflect the modernized environment and highlight future ready classrooms to school community.

- 100% of BKNHS Title 1 schools have completed SED required tasks re. Title 1 Informational Meeting,
 Parent Advisory Council Elections, and submitted T1 Parent Engagement Spending Plans.
- 100% of BKNHS schools have entered engagement activities in PCAR
- In collaboration with Brooklyn South and the BKHS Presidents Council, BKNHS provided a governance workshop for Parent Association Executive Board members.
- Launched BHSPC Website for Parent Leaders
- Held 2 family events: 10/19 <u>BKNHS Fair</u>; 11/07 <u>Orientation for 9th grade & prospective families</u>
 - ongoing FAFSA workshops for families
 - early April Financial Literacy workshop hosted by Maxwell CTE HS

Next Steps:

Modernizing the Learning Environment:
