Life Lines Community Arts Project

Students from MS 821, Sunset Park Prep, and MS 136, Charles Dewey participated in Life Lines Community Arts Project which is a free, nationally-recognized arts and leadership program in Sunset Park, Brooklyn serving 700 youth, ages 10-21. Life Lines includes an afterschool arts program and summer camp, traveling theatre/dance troupes, high school internships, original productions, and an in-school interdisciplinary partnership designed to promote student achievement. Based at M.S. 136/821 and Sunset Park H.S., Life Lines is a component of the Center for Family Life, a neighborhood-based social service program.

Each spring, "Life Lines" participants and staff aim to create a production that brings to life the challenges and resilience of young people and families in their neighborhood. Through character development, creative writing, community research, dance, music, and visual art, members share with staff their ideas, feelings, and experiences -- these are integrated into original pieces for the production.

During the rehearsal process, members are encouraged to explore a range of issues / dilemmas / interests but are not permitted to act out their own personal life situations. As the characters evolve, they are linked together in scenes and ensembles. There is no written script for the actors, only a skeletal outline of scenes. The characters play out their situations in improvised dialogue that changes from performance to performance.

"TAKE CARE" presents a glimpse into the lives of 20 teenagers and adults trying to manage the stresses and strains of life in these tumultuous times. Throughout the show we meet a family in conflict due to financial instability and immigration status, a 12th grade student preparing to be the first in her family to attend college, a student with her mother and teacher trying to address her learning challenges, and groups of teens finding relief through humor, creativity, and peer support. This year's production also highlighted youth activism to protest intolerance, discriminatory policies, and systemic oppression. The songs, dances, scenery, and ensemble acting pieces illustrate the ways in which we care for ourselves and our community, while trying to promote a more just and inclusive world.

This year's original production, "TAKE CARE" which ran in early May offered opportunities for special matinee performances for school audiences as well as evening performances for the Community. The cast of 80+ participants included students from all over Sunset Park, as well as from other Brooklyn middle and high schools.

PS 58 has been granted \$500K for its Play Yard redesign

We are thrilled to announce that **PS 58** in Carroll Gardens has been granted \$500,000 from City Council for its Play Yard redesign.

The purpose of this project would be to provide more seating, more shade and more natural/green elements to the existing space while preserving plenty of open play space.

Specific features:

- Addition of between 6 to 12 tree plantings
- Addition of between 2 to 6 benches for seating under and/or near the trees
- Upgraded fencing to provide more privacy
- A barrier of plantings between the fencing and the play area to provide an additional buffer from the sidewalk
