Updates from Committee Shedquarters:

A number of plot holders have mentioned that the main entrance onto Locksway Road often has large vans parked right up to the lane, restricting visibility. Les will contact Portsmouth City council about putting up a mirror on the post opposite the entrance to make turning on to the main road safer.

There is a new PCC Allotment Inspector, who recently toured Eastney Lake, Hope Cottage and Milton Piece sites with Les as part of a formal inspection. Liz met Gail Baird from Food Portsmouth who is setting up a new project at the Community Allotment on Milton Piece, organising Allotment Buddies.

Stock in the shop has been selling very well – compost, bean poles, seed potatoes, onions and shallots. Helen has taken on the role of Shop Rota Manager and has already started meeting some of the volunteers that run the shop on Tuesdays and Sundays.

In May data protection laws are changing and the changes will affect the Eastney and Milton Allotment Holders Association. Contact details for members will have to be held securely. The National Allotment Society has produced some advice and templates for privacy policies that will be communicated out to members.

There will be an Autumn Show in September. It has been decided to concentrate on smaller scale show just for plot holders to show their produce in classes under RHS rules. Judging and prize-giving will take place on the day. Responsibility for different aspects of organisation would be taken on by Committee members. A schedule of classes will be available on the notice boards, in the shop and on the website.

Top Tips:

Making good compost

You can't have a big enough compost bin. If you can, make it as big as possible with planks or pallets. Insert green ingredients, garden/kitchen waste, chopped, including egg shells. Add to this mixture some spent hops (if you can get them), leaf mould, old grow bags, nettles (before they go to seed) comfrey, soft wood cuttings, grass cuttings, used bedding plants, seaweed – all chopped. Egg boxes, loo and kitchen rolls, cardboard, paper bags etc. All ripped up. Spent coffee grounds/tea leaves (not the bags as they are plastic and don't rot down). The more you can chop and mix the ingredients the quicker it will all break down. Check fortnightly and keep your heap moist, that way worms will stay there and do their job. You don't need to turn you heap as that's the worm's job!

Carrot Fly

Grow your carrots in a raised bed if possible as Carrot Fly only fly along the ground. Apparently the fly can detect the smell of carrots from quite a distance. If you wet the row before and after thinning this also helps to lessen the scent. When thinning get rid of all your thinnings, don't leave them on the bed as this will attract the fly.

After thinning, firm the soil along the row and draw the soil over the shoulders of the carrots. The main period of damage is May, June and July. Parsley is also a member of the carrot family and will also attract and suffer from fly damage.

Site security

There is a book in the shop for entering any vandalism or theft from the allotments. If anyone has had produce stolen, please record it in this book.

It is imperative that the gates are closed and locked when entering or leaving the allotments. This will make it harder for any opportunistic thieves. It doesn't take a moment to do so.

Luckily after the last spate of sheds being broken into it has been fairly quiet.

Recipe suggestion:

Soda Bread

This only takes a few minutes and is delicious served warm with lashings of butter and chutney/jam from last year.

Ingredients:

250g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

2 tsp salt

 $2 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp bicarbonate of soda

250g wholemeal flour

150g jumbo oat flakes

1tbsp clear honey

1 tbsp black treacle

500ml buttermilk (or milk)

Method:

Heat the oven to 200c/390F/gas mark 6. Line a baking sheet with baking parchment.

Mix all the dry ingredients together in a bowl. Make a well in the centre, then pour in the honey, treacle and buttermilk, working the mix together lightly to obtain a loose wet dough. With floured hands, shape into a round and lift on to the baking sheet.

Mark a cross in the top with a knife and bake for around 45 minutes or until the loaf sounds hollow when tapped on its base. Transfer to a wire rack, drape with a slightly damp cloth and leave to cool.
