

THE CITY

Milan was founded by Celtic tribes around 600 B.C. When the Romans conquered the city, it was renamed "Mediolanum" — the land in the middle. Thanks to Milan's strategic location in the middle of the fertile Po River valley, it quickly became an important centre for trade in the Roman Empire. Later, it also became its western capital.

Today, Milan is the second largest city in Italy. Almost everything in Milan revolves around the fashion industry. Most famous designers and fashion houses tend to be located in the city — the area around Via Monte Napoleone and Via Della Spiga is the heart and home to many fashion industry flagship stores. Centro Storico is where many of the city's famous sights are located, including the Duomo and La Scala Opera. Navigli, by the canals, is another exciting neighbourhood famous for its nightlife, while Brera is an artsy enclave.

The best way to understand how Milan is laid out is to take a ride on one of the trams. Route 1 runs from the main train station, via Piazza Cairoli, to Castello Sforzesco and is probably the best choice. But many other routes also offer good views of the city, so jump on and let it take you on a tour of the city's best sights and attractions.

Il Duomo



The cathedral is the symbol of Milan.

Construction began in 1386 and was not completed until 500 years later. Duomo di Milano is

a late Gothic masterpiece, made even more interesting by the fact that this style can't be seen anywhere else in Italy. Towering over the Piazza del Duomo, the marble building is marked by 135 spires and countless statues.

Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II



Right next to the Duomo di Milano (the Milan Cathedral), you will find Italy's oldest active shopping gallery. Named after the first king of the

Kingdom of Italy, Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II is an upscale shopping arcade housing luxury brands such as Gucci, Prada and Louis Vuitton as well as restaurants, bars, cafes and even a hotel.

The Galleria's central glass dome has a stunning mosaic representing the continents of Africa, America, Asia and Europe, while its floor is decorated with mosaics portraying the coat of arms of Rome, Florence, Milan and Turin. Representing Turin is a bull, and according to the legend, if you spin around three times with your heel on the bull's genitals, it will bring you good fortune.

Enjoy some time out in one of the city's greenest and lushest parks. You can find something for everyone in Parco Sempione: play areas and

train rides for the children, football fields and a roller skating rink, and green lawns with free Wi-Fi to relax after a busy day.

Escape from the heat in the Civic Aquarium, whose building was constructed for the International Exposition back in 1906. Get a bird's eye view of Milan by taking a lift up Torre Branca. At 108.6 metres high, it is one of the tallest structures in the city. Have a romantic moment on the Ponte delle Sirenette — a little bridge dedicated to all lovers.

Bosco Verticale — Porta Nuova District



Milan's architecture is not only neoclassical promenades, Gothic cathedrals and posh villas — Porta Nuova district is the new and modern

revitalization project that has drastically changed the city. Take a walk around the Diamond Tower, the Unicredit Tower and many other glass and steel structures. The stars of the show here are the two skyscrapers known as Bosco Verticale (Vertical Forest). Featured in all major architecture outlets, these residential towers have actual live trees growing on its facade. They look marvellously lush in the spring and summer and totally enchanting covered in snow and frost.

Take a Day Trip: Bernina Scenic Train & Lake Como



When you want to escape from the busy city streets and enjoy some natural beauty of Lombardy, consider hopping on the scenic Bernina Express

train. Stroll along Lake Como, make a stop in the historic lakeshore village of Varenna and ascend the Alps on the UNESCO-listed train — it'll make a stop on top so you can take a short walk enjoying summit views.

The iconic red train starts its journey from Tirano — a sleepy town close to the Swiss



border, about 3 hours away from Milan. Some package tours include transportation from and back to Milano Centrale. The train journey itself takes about 4.5 hours from start to finish and runs through 55 tunnels, 196 bridges and viaducts.

Villa Necchi Campiglio



Villa Necchi Campiglio is an architect-designed villa that functions as a museum with decorative arts, paintings and period furniture. This

architectural gem with a gorgeous private garden and a swimming pool was completed by Piero Portaluppi in 1935 for the Necchi Campiglio family — part of the flourishing middle class of Milan in the 30s. After WWII, the villa underwent some changes: the linear modern architecture was softened with design elements from the 18th century and those in the style of Louis the 15th of France.

Villa Necchi Campiglio gained popular fame after appearing as Tilda Swinton's character's opulent home in Luca Guadagnino's 2009 hit film I Am Love.

Milan Linate Airport (LIN)



Linate Airport is situated a mere eight kilometres from Milan city centre. Buses and taxis are available to transport you to and from the airport. A

taxi to Milan's main train station should take about 20 minutes and will cost you 40 Euro. This airport is mainly used for domestic and short-haul international flights.

Passport & Visa



Citizens of European
Union (EU) and European
Economic Area (EEA)
countries do not need a
visa to enter Italy, only a
valid ID. Many other

countries, including the United Kingdom, United States, Canada, United Arab Emirates, Australia, and New Zealand, benefit from visa-free entry for short stays of up to 90 days within a 180-day period.

Visitors from visa-exempt countries must hold a valid passport and, starting in late 2025, will need to apply for an ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorisation System) authorisation online before travelling.

For those requiring a visa, such as travellers from some Middle-East, African or Asian nations, a Schengen visa must be obtained prior to arrival. All travellers should ensure their passport is valid for at least three months beyond their intended stay.

Best Time to Visit



Summer temperatures tend to rise very high, so unless you thrive in smouldering heat, aim for late spring (April-May) or early fall, when

temperatures are still comfortable. Of course, Milan's cuisine and cafes can be enjoyed any time of the year.

Another factor to keep in mind for your trip to Milan are the sales. The summer sales start on the first Saturday of July and last until the end of August. The winter sales begin after the end of the festive season — the Epiphany on the 6th of January — and last until the end of February.

FAQ



- What does Milano mean? The etymology of the name Milan (Milano in Italian) is still uncertain. One theory holds that

the Latin name Mediolanum comes from the Latin words medio (in the middle) and planus (plain).

- Is Milan safe?

Milan is a very safe city, although some heavily trafficked areas attract pickpockets. Some scams are possible at the center of the Duomo where people will ask you for some money. During New Year celebrations the square in front of the Duomo becomes a joyful battlefield, where small fireworks explode everywhere. Lots of fun, but not the safest.



- What does AC in AC Milan stand for?
 AC Milan, in full Associazione Calcio Milan, also called Rossoneri (Italian: "Red and Blacks") is an Italian professional football team.
- How expensive is Milan?
 Prices in Milan are similar to those in other major European cities. Be prepared to pay around €100 per night at a good hotel. You can get a decent dinner for €15 and a coffee will be somewhere between €1-2.
- What can you not wear in Milan?
 Milan is a fashion capital, but there is no fashion police patrolling the streets. Just remember that it can get extremely hot in the summer wear light fabrics. For going to restaurants and to churches, shorts (especially very short ones) might not be the best idea.
- Is Milan a walkable city?

 Absolutely! There is nothing better than getting lost in the winding network of small cobbled streets and strolling down gorgeous avenues, admiring neoclassical facades, Gothic churches and modern airy constructions. Grab a seat on one of the many cafe terraces or stop for a quick espresso when you need to give your feet a little rest.
- How much do I tip in Milan?
 Hourly wages for servers are higher than in the US, so are not expected to leave a massive tip for your meals. Leave 10-15% for outstanding service and you're good to go. In cafes, you can round up your bill. Fancy restaurants call for more generosity, of course.
- How to order coffee in Milan?
 You can ask for a quick espresso any time of the day. Locals call it "un caffé". Ordering a

- cappuccino after 11am will mark you as a tourist

 the Italians believe that drinking milk after the
 morning will mess with your digestion. Ask for
 cappuccino, caffé latte, caffé macchiato or a latte
 macchiato. Be warned that if you ask for "latte"

 you'll only get a glass of milk.
- When are museums free in Milan?
 Milan's state-run museums offer free admission on the first Sunday of each month. You can visit Villa Reale, Gallerie d'Italia, Casa museo
 Boschi-di Stefano, Museo archeologico di Milano, Museo del Risorgimento and many more institutions for free and save your money for aperitivo.
- When does Milan have sales?

 The winter sales generally run from early
 January through early March, and the summer
 sales from early July through early September though check online for the exact dates, which
 vary slightly each year and are announced about
 one month before. Sale prices can be up to 70
 percent off the original, making it well worth a
 trip.






