PLANT NAME: DRACAENA

Lighting:

Dracaenas prefer bright, indirect light. While they can tolerate lower light conditions, they may not thrive or grow as vigorously. Avoid direct sunlight, especially intense afternoon sun, as it can scorch the leaves.

Watering:

Allow the top inch (2.5 cm) of the soil to dry out before watering. Water thoroughly, and ensure that excess water drains away. Dracaenas are susceptible to root rot if the soil remains constantly waterlogged. Temperature and Humidity:
