

## PLANT NAME: STRING OF ...

String succulents, often referred to as "string of" plants, are a group of trailing or cascading succulents known for their long, slender stems and small, fleshy leaves. Some popular varieties include String of Pearls (*Senecio rowleyanus*), String of Bananas (*Senecio radicans*), and String of Hearts (*Ceropegia woodii*).

- **Light:**

- String succulents thrive in bright, indirect sunlight. They can tolerate some direct morning sunlight, but avoid harsh afternoon sun, as it can scorch their delicate leaves. A north or east-facing window is often a good spot.

- **Temperature:**

- **Pests and Problems:**

- String succulents are generally resistant to pests and diseases, but they can occasionally attract mealybugs or aphids. Inspect your plants regularly and address any infestations with insecticidal soap or neem oil.

- **Support:**

- Consider providing some support for your trailing string succulents if you want to encourage more upright growth or to prevent the stems from becoming too leggy. You can use small stakes or trellises for this purpose.
