- Post- presidency, in 1982, Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter founded and built The Carter Center in Atlanta in partnership with Emory University
- Their fundamental commitment is to human rights and the alleviation of human suffering
- The Center seeks to
 - prevent and resolve conflicts,
 - enhance freedom and democracy,
 - and improve health

The Carters also helped raise awareness of the work of Habitat for Humanity

- 1984: President Carter and Rosalynn Carter joined Habitat for Humanity's efforts and the first Jimmy Carter Work Project was completed in New York City,
- 1999: The largest Carter Work Project in the Philippines drew 14,000 volunteers from 32 countries, building 293 houses
- Together with Habitat, the Carters have completed 36 weeklong projects around the world, and have built/renovated/repaired more than 4,300 homes, working alongside more than 100,000 volunteers
- Habitat now works in all 50 states in the U.S.
- And in more than 70 countries, Habitat has helped more than 35 million people achieve strength, stability and independence through safe, decent and affordable shelter





Meanwhile, back in Plains, GA...

- While still advising the staff of The Carter Center, the Carters are turning their attention to their home community
- They have identified 25 families who live in substandard housing
- In March 2020 an effort was launched to raise funds, receive in-kind donations, and recruit volunteers to help renovate/rebuild these homes
- A 501 (C) (3) organization was created, The Carter Plains Foundation

23 homes desperately need renovation



2 homes require demolition and new construction

- Progress to date:

 - Poured concrete footers for 2 new homes
 - HVAC systems for all 25 houses
 - Kitchen and bath cabinets
 - 14+ roofs




