- Mentoring program for new breeders

The Wensleydales featured in these photos were part of my original breeding up project while I was in 4-H. I started this breeding program with low 80% ewes and continued for about 8 years before they were considered full Wensleydales at 96%. Because

the Wensleydales are a unique breed to the United States I had many difficulties during the years trying to find rams that would work well for my flock. And like any other, I encountered many unfortunate setbacks. Overtime my flock developed better traits, and soon held titles of supreme champions at local county fairs. After graduating high school I unfortunately had to part with my flock in order to focus on college. The wonderful wensleydales now live with two amazing families of the same 4-H club who continue to care, develop, and learn about their unique qualities of this beautiful British long-wool sheep.

This is my 13th year showing Wensleydales at the Western Idaho Fair in Boise, pictured is the 2018 1st place "All other long course wool" flock. My Breeder's young flock which included the 2 spring ewes and a spring ram (not in the picture) was 3rd place out of 14 breeds shown at the fair. Pictured is my husband Larry, Me, my daughter Alisha, my BFF Felicia and my mentor and long time Wensleydale breeder Susan Ohman.

My first challenge was getting my husband on the Wensleydale band wagon. My friend Felicia's husband knew that I liked the Wensleydales and in 2005 he purchased a ewe from Susan Ohman and gave it to me for a birthday present. My flock just took off from there. My husband has come around and he likes the Wensleydales for their size and body conformation and correctness.


The Wensleydales do quite well at the fairs and have even placed as the Supreme Overall Ewe. I have been showing sheep At the Western Idaho Fair for 14 years and at the Eastern Idaho State Fair for 4. There is a lot of work that goes into getting ready for the shows, we start about a three weeks before and wash and clip all the sheep. I show Hampshires, Suffolks, Merinos, Natural Colored Merinos, Wensleydales and Natural Colored Wensleydales. This year we took 38 sheep to the fair.

I have been lucking with the help of Susan Ohman starting my Wensleydale flock. Susan and I own half interest in rams and we work together to improve our flocks. I started raising Wethersire Hampshires and Suffolks over 20 years ago, I knew what I wanted in my Wensleydales as far as body type, conformation and correctness. My biggest challenge, was the fact that I had no knowledge of fleeces or wool. Over the years I have learned from good sheep and wool Judges in the show ring what to look for in a fleece. I bought my 1st spinning wheel 5 years ago and I have never looked back. Next to raising sheep, spinning is my passion.
