Mackenzie Roark and the Hotpants is an Americana rock band from Richmond, Virginia, known for energetic and engaging live shows that bridge the gap between Americana charm and rock 'n' roll grit. With a voice that carries the weight of lived experience and lyrics steeped in raw storytelling, Roark crafts songs that explore love, loss, resilience, and the search for meaning—all wrapped in the kind of gritty, roots-driven melodies that feel as timeless as they are urgent. Known for their powerhouse performances, the Hotpants round out Roark's dynamic songwriting with the fiery tones of fiddle, electric guitar riffs, funky basslines, and tight harmonies. They have been working on songs for their first full release under the "Hotpants" moniker since the formation of the band in 2023, and have completely self-funded and self-produced this project with the help of Red Amp Audio in Richmond, and Infrasonic Sound in Nashville.

#### **HISTORY**

Mackenzie Roark has been playing music in and around Virginia for over a decade, not only on big stages and at festivals, but also in dive bars, breweries, wineries, barbecue joints, coffee shops, and wherever else has live music programming. Raised on a mix of songwriters like Bob Dylan and Leonard Cohen, and classic rock icons like ELO, The Rolling Stones, and Heart, Roark's songwriting walks the line between Americana, alt-country, and rock and roll, channeling an energy that's both fiery and introspective. With degrees in both English and Creative Writing, she's applied her education to her songwriting, placing high importance on the integrity and meaning of the songs themselves, continually working towards that elusive "masterpiece" – the lifelong pursuit of all true artists. After years of working her way into prominence in Richmond's thriving music scene as a solo artist and as part of many other bands, she formed Mackenzie Roark and the Hotpants (MRHP) in 2023 to bring her songs to life in a live setting.

Leaning more heavily into traditional country and folk sounds, Roark's songwriting prowess is clearly seen in "Rosalee", a heart-wrenching story song inspired by the songwriting style of John Prine, Townes Van Zandt, and Emmylou Harris.
- Rollin' High, Feelin' Low (2022) A solid debut album showcasing Roark's blend of Americana grit, honky-tonk swagger, and folk-rock storytelling. The record features standout tracks like "Highway I've Been On" and "Little Pills", solidifying her place as a rising voice in modern roots music.

# INTERVIEW WITH MACKENZIE ROARK

# Q: Can you tell us a bit about the journey leading up to this project? How long have you been working on it?

A: This album has been in the works for a while. When I formed the band in 2022/2023, after the release of *Rollin' High*, it wasn't long before our sound really started to take shape as something separate from my solo work up to that point. We realized we were more of a rock band than a country band, and we've been eager to show the world these songs as long as we've been playing them. The oldest song on this album, "Cigarettes and TV Dinners", came about in 2017 when I was going through my first divorce, and the newest, "Ghost of Rock and Roll" (the song), was finalized in late 2024 after working on it for 2 or so years. So the whole thing spans several years of my life.

#### Q: What was the overall vision or concept behind this album?

A: We wanted to make something that felt fresh. I hear so much music that just sounds like copies of each other (boring electro-indie-Billie Eilish voice?), and we've always known that we offer something a little different. Older folks love our music because it reminds them of the type of stuff they grew up on, so we wanted to lean into that and create a rock and roll renaissance album that has modern day relevance. We took that into the recording process as well and tried to do the whole thing as closely to a classic live album as possible.

# Q: How would you describe the evolution of your sound from previous releases to this one? How did the recording process differ from your past projects?

A: Before the formation of the Hotpants, I was lost in a bit of identity crisis. My previous album could maybe be described as "bright indie country" which was what I had always been comfortable making. But with this sort of commercialized resurgence in country music (both good and bad), I knew that I needed to change course. I'm always looking to do something that hasn't been done a million times over. And while classic rock is nothing new, I wanted to make something that would allow me to unleash my inner rockstar on stage. It's hard to feel that same energy while playing quaint country tunes, so this album has more of an edge.

# Q: How do you feel about the role of live performance in your music-making process? Given the album's focus on live instrumentation, how do you feel it translates to a live setting?

A: For me, live performance always reigns supreme over recorded work. They're both important, and people love and value recorded music they can listen to at home, but I'm way more of a live performer than a studio musician. I don't even think I could count the amount of shows and gigs I've done over my career, but it's a HUGE part of my life, my livelihood, and my passion. Live performance has informed these recordings in a major way. We pretty much figured out how to best play them live first, then went into the studio. Of course, in the studio, we were able to zoom in and fixate on little moments throughout the songs and really tighten them up, which has only enhanced how the songs sound live. But in short, these songs translate to a live setting very easily because that's where they originated.

# Q: What do you hope listeners take away from your new album once they've had a chance to sit with it?

A: I hope they walk away feeling charged up. I hope they feel heard. I hope that the emotions and experiences explored in this album - frustration, yearning, fury, defeat, lust, searching, waiting, dreaming - are felt on a personal level for each listener. But I also hope that they somehow feel empowered, and like they aren't alone. The point of art is to connect us - to awaken the Divine within - and I hope that in some small way, this album does that for a few folks.
