Hello Everyone,

So far, this year we have maintained a no lost time injury work place. Van Maanen feels that safety recognition is integral to establishing a professional culture of safety, in which hazard awareness and risk management are ingrained elements of the work environment. Currently that is the culture Van Maanen has, and we'd like to keep moving in that direction.

To be clear, this safety incentive program is in regards to no lost time injury (LTI) and completion of all required safety courses. So, what does no lost of time injury mean? A lost time injury is an injury sustained on the job by an employee that results in the loss of productive work time.

So, what should you report?

- First Aid-Only Events
 - Minor cuts, scrapes, burns or injuries that happen on the job that don't require a trip to the doctor fall into the bucket of first aid-only events. In other words, health and safety services are administered on the job site.
- Medical-Only Events
 - A medical-only event is when someone seeks medical treatment beyond first aid, but it does not result in hospitalization, lost time from work or permanent injury. For instance, going to the doctor to see if you need stitches but being told they're not necessary.
- Recordable Events
 - Recordable events can be those that result in death, days away from work, restricted work, transfer to another job, medical treatment beyond first aid or loss of consciousness. Injuries and illnesses include any work-related diagnosed case of cancer, chronic irreversible diseases, fractured or cracked bones or teeth or punctured eardrums.
- Report-Only Events
 - Near misses are a common type of report-only event—they could have led to bodily harm and/or property loss but didn't (for instance, if a hammer falls from scaffolding and nearly hits someone on the head).
- Lost Time Events
 - A lost time event is when an occupational injury or illness prevents someone from being able to work their normal shifts. An example is someone who shatters their ankle after falling off a ladder and can't return to work for a month.

All accidents, injuries, or near-misses must be reported to your supervisor before your work shift ends on the day you are injured. Not all incidents/injuries result in lost time, which is why it is still important to report ALL incidents and injuries. If you have questions about LTI or would like further explanation, we'd be happy to provide that.

We have partnered with Red Wing Shoes to provide all VME and VMT full time employees with a voucher to use towards a new pair of safety boots. We only require that they are leather and have hard soles. We would also recommend against anything steel toe as we work with electricity. As a part of the program employees will also receive 15% off of their purchase at a Red Wing Shoe store. This incentive will be available after July if we, as a company, have NO LTIs.

Vintage Estates of North Liberty is an active 55+ adult community. It is a patio-home cooperative that sits on 8 acres and includes 30 individual homes meeting the Universal Design concept. Also, inside this private, gated community there is a clubhouse featuring an open entertaining area, full kitchen, fitness center, great room with fireplace, indoor pickleball court, office/conference room, outdoor BBQ station and fire pit.

The biggest challenge for Van Maanen on this project was the individual homes. Unlike any other development, this has 30 unique zero-entry homes, each with their own customization, leaving no two alike. Travis was diligent in pricing each individual customization and making sure that it was appropriate for the client and their budget. The team focused on making sure the work was personalized to each client and that the clubhouse was somewhere they could all gather. The clubhouse is over 9,000sq.ft. and each of the 30 homes ranges from 1,394sq.ft. to 1,989sq.ft. This development is strategically equipped with a private street and gated entrances for extra security.

SAFETY SPOTLIGHT

Ten Easy Ways to Improve Your Safety

Schedules, productivity, efficiency, and cost are important on the jobsite, but <u>safety</u> is our top priority. Let's discuss 10 ways you can improve your safety <u>NOW</u>. Let's face it, accidents happen, and even best-laid plans can go wrong. As the construction industry continues evolving rapidly to build faster than ever before, incidents can still occur on the most proactive of job sites. According to the National Safety Council and OSHA, in the U.S., a worker is injured on the job every seven seconds, and construction's "Fatal Four"—falls, struck by object, electrocution and caught-in/between—accounted for more than half of construction worker deaths in 2018. Let's not be those guys.

- 1. Come to work with a safety mindset. Before you start working, start thinking about how you'll do your job safely.
- Wear your personal protective equipment. Inspect it before each use. PPE is designed to protect you do not try to modify it.
- **3. Focus on the task at hand.** Avoid distractions and do not look at your cell phone that text can wait.
- **4. Make a pre-task plan.** Complete a job safety analysis before you begin a task.
- 5. Consider your co-workers. Look out for their safety when they are near or below you. Speak up if they are not being safe. Work as a team.

- **6. Keep learning.** Training can keep you safer and might give you the skills you need to get promoted within the company.
- **7. Conduct inspections.** Inspect the area and tools at the start of your shift used to do your job. Label damaged tools and take them out of service.
- **8. Keep your supervisor informed.** Report problems, unsafe, conditions, near misses, accidents, and minor injuries.
- **9. Make safety a daily responsibility.** Conditions on a job site change constantly. Re-check the site for hazards frequently.
- **10. Prevent falls.** Wear or use fall protection. Secure ladders, use stair rails, install guardrails around openings in walls for windows and doors and around holes for shafts, stairwells and skylights.

SAFETY REMINDER – when you ignore safe work practices, you put everyone's safety in jeopardy.
