This is a free performance that tells the story of the night the Three Kings, following the star to Bethlehem, stop for shelter at the home of Amahl, a poor, crippled shepherd boy who lives with his widowed mother. Inspired by the Wise Men’s tale of a kingdom “built on love alone,” Amahl offers his own simple gift to the Christ Child. And then a miracle happens. . .

The Remedy, a talented local band that has played at several of St. John Center’s annual fundraisers, will perform at the Skybar located inside Saints Pizza & Pub in St. Matthews (131 Breckenridge Lane). Catechism Corner: What is Purgatory?



Purgatory is a state of final purification after death and before entrance into heaven for those who died in God’s friendship, but were only imperfectly purified; a final cleansing of human imperfection before one is able to enter the job of heaven (**CCC Glossary**) All who die in God’s grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death, they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. (**CCC**

1030) The Church gives the name *Purgatory* to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The tradition of the church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire. (**CCC 1031**) From the beginning, the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead. (**CCC 1032**)
