The spiritual history of this land is deeply significant, representing the seed of consciousness. In the beginning, it was a dark, vast land inhabited by only one spirit, Keawe, the spirit of creation. Keawe manifested into the god Kane and his female counterpart, Hina. Hawaii faces significant economic and social challenges, including meth usage, homelessness, and the housing crisis. I believe these issues can be resolved through healing, community, and sovereignty over land, water, and food. I am consulting with political allies on various plans. Let this be a pathway to demonstrate how community, sovereignty, and healing can address social issues, not only in Hawaii but worldwide. While housing issues require strict changes to city planning and development restrictions, my plan emphasizes much-needed infrastructure investment.

A week ago, I moved to the Big Island and have been connecting with the land in new ways. I look forward to the next phase of funding and moving forward with the project.
