Sugarloaf Mountain is the biggest and best ski resort in the state of Maine. Saddleback Mountain is Maine's third biggest ski destination. It is in Rangeley, Maine, very close to Sugarloaf. This ski area has been around since the 1960s and has been named "Maine's Best Mountain" by Down East Magazine three years in a row. Sitting atop a 4,120-foot mountain, Saddleback offers premier skiing, alongside other winter activities like ice skating, snowshoeing, and snowmobiling. Additionally, the surrounding areas offer great dining and places to explore.

If downhill skiing isn't something you're up for, some cross-country style skiing might be more your speed. **Friends of a Fierce Chase Cross Country Ski Trails** is located right in Monson, Maine. Don't let the fierce name fool you, this network of groomed trails involves nothing but peace and tranquility. Miles of trails await to be explored by not only cross-country skiers but also snowshoers and hikers.



Most people disregard Maine once the summer season ends, but boy are they missing out. While the coastal cities are packing up and closing down, the smaller towns in Piscataquis County are ramping up for the winter. These year-round towns know how to keep the winter scaries away. There are plenty of snowy adventures and indoor activities to keep you entertained on those chilly days. With less people crowding around, fun things to try, and plenty of local charm, Maine might be the winter wonderland you need. If you're looking for a unique vacation, or if you're a local Mainer looking for something new to do this winter, check out these ideas:



Snowmobiling is an exciting experience for people of all ages. Maine has an extensive network of trails, including both local and state trails. There are thousands of miles of trails to explore. You can stay local and still never get bored, or you could venture into different towns. You can even hop from restaurant to restaurant. You can get to about anywhere through the snowmobile trails. The trails tend to be well-groomed and taken care of by the local snowmobile clubs, and signs are posted, so it is easy to stay safe. There are local companies that rent snowmobiles and supplies, such as **Northwoods Outfitters** in Greenville. You can grab a sled, grab a map, and hit the trails to take in some breathtaking views of the Maine wilderness.

Ice fishing is a popular Maine winter pastime. You can fish by yourself for some peace and quiet or bring company for more fun. A few lakes in Piscataquis County that offer great ice fishing are Moosehead Lake, Sebec Lake, and Lake Hebron. Many towns even host ice fishing competitions during the wintertime.

Ice skating is a great winter activity because you can skate outdoors, or you can go to an indoor facility. The **Piscataquis County Ice Arena** is a newer rink in Dover-Foxcroft. They offer skating open to the public and equipment rentals. They occasionally have pick-up ice hockey games and ice-skating lessons as well!

If you don't want to be outside at all, you should visit our local breweries. **Turning Page Farm Brewery** in Monson, **Two Knights Brewing Company** in Sangerville, and **East Outlet Brewing** in Cambridge are a few breweries that are very close to The Guilford Bed & Breakfast. They all offer unique brews and yummy food. Checking out the breweries is also a good way to meet fun people or catch events like trivia nights or live music. If you want to venture out a little further, head south and hit a few of the bigger-name operations. **Mason's Brewing Company in Brewer**, Bangor Beer Co. in Bangor, and **Marsh Island Brewing** and **Orono Brewing Company** in Orono would all be fantastic options. Hit one or hit all of them. You're bound to have a good time either way.

If you need to exhaust some energy or simply just want to enjoy Maine's beauty, give **snowshoeing** a try. Many outdoor sports businesses offer rental equipment, as well as some local libraries. With an abundance of hiking trails, you're sure to be in for an adventure. Just make sure to bundle up first!



When all else fails, there are always a number of local events going on in the winter that are open to residents and visitors. Swing by the farmers market at the **Piscataquis County Ice Arena** on Saturday mornings for handmade treasures and organic goods. See what live productions or movie showings are taking place at the **Center Theatre** in Dover-Foxcroft or stop by **Pat's Pizza** in Dover-Foxcroft for live music or The **Lakeshore House** in Monson for open mic night. And for fun times and good food near The Guilford Bed & Breakfast, there is always **Red Maple Inn**, Spenser's **Bakery** and **Whittle Bird Cafe**.

Whatever you do, don't sit at home this winter and wait for the cold to go away. Venture out and have some fun. Piscataquis County has plenty to offer to keep the winter blues far, far away. You might just like Maine more in the winter.

FROM OUR KITCHEN

These treats are the perfect, hardy breakfast dessert any time of the year. We make these in the summer/fall months when we harvest fresh raspberries from our garden, but we also make them with fresh berries from the market. You can make large or small batches and they freeze well for later consumption.

RASPBERRY OAT CUPS

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Cups of Quaker Oats
- 1/2 Cup of Pure Maple Syrup
- 2/3 Cup of Creamy Peanut Butter
- 1Cup of Fresh Raspberries
- 1/2 Cup of Chocolate Chips

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Mix the oats, maple syrup and peanut butter in a large bowl
- Generously spray a mini muffin tray with butter spray
- Fill each muffin mold with the oat mixture, filling 3/4 of the mold
- Use your thumb or a spoon to create an indentation in the center of each mold to form a cup/bowl shape with the mixture
- Bake for 12 minutes or until golden
- Remove from oven and let cool 15 minutes
- Mash the raspberries in a medium bowl with fork or spoon
- When the cups are cool, fill the center with the mashed raspberries
- Melt the chocolate chips over low heat or in the microwave and poor over the top of the molds
- Freeze for 20 minutes
- Yields 20 mini cups
