A Letter That Changed History

Once upon a time, people wrote letters. People actually used to put a pen to paper and write to one another. And there are letters that changed history.

A letter killed Charlotte Braun. Charlotte who? Charlotte Braun was a pushy version of Charlie Brown in the



classic Peanuts comic strips. She was introduced to the comic strip in November 1954, prompting a fan to write a letter to the creator of Peanuts, Charles Schulz. She was complaining about the obnoxious character. So, Schulz killed the character – literally! On January 5, 1955, Charles Schulz wrote a response to the fan which included a drawing of Charlotte Braun with an axe in her head. [Look it up]

A letter connected Annie Oakley to the President of the United States. The famous sharpshooter believed that she could be of service to her country. She wrote a letter to President William McKinley offering her services, and that of fifty lady sharpshooters in the Spanish-American War. McKinley never responded, but Oakley's letter might have helped to open the door for women in military service.

A letter rearmed James Bond. In 1956, a fan named Geoffrey Boothroyd wrote Ian Fleming, the creator of James Bond, and criticized him for putting "a lady's gun" in Bond's hands, a .25-caliber Beretta. Fleming responded by rearming Bond with a Walther PPK, and he took on Boothroyd as an arms advisor. He also created a new character in his Bond novels named Major Boothroyd. All Bond fans know him as "Q."

And there is a letter that names us all "children of God through faith." In his letter to the Galatians, our Second Reading for June 22nd, the apostle Paul changed history by arguing that we are made right with God through the faith of Jesus, not through religious law. He was writing to a group of Greek-speaking converts to Christianity, who wondered if they needed to add Jewish religious practices to their new faith in Jesus. After receiving Paul's letter, they realized that there was "no longer Jew or Greek … slave or free … male or female." Instead, all were one in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:28).

History was changed in small ways by letters to Charles Schulz, President McKinley and Ian Fleming. But it was changed big – by Paul's letter to the Galatians.

Before Paul put pen to paper (really it was pen to papyrus), people were "imprisoned and guarded under the law." The religious laws of the Bible restrained, and also protected people, preventing them from hurting themselves and others. That's why Paul wrote his letter when he did. He insisted that "the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith." Once Christ died and rose from the tomb, no human action is required except that we put our complete trust in him.

Paul writes that we are "justified by faith." In other words, we are made right with God by the faithfulness of our Savior, Jesus. But our faith has a role to play as well, as we say yes to what God has done by putting our trust in Jesus.


Personal faith. Christ's faith. Together, they form the Christian faith. And now that we're in a state of faith, we no longer live by the law. That's what Paul says to the Galatians in his history changing letter.

So, what's the result of being justified by faith? For Paul, it means that all followers of Christ are now "children of God." Before writing this letter, the term "children of God" had been reserved for God's chosen people, the Jews, and naturally applied also to the first Jewish followers of Jesus. These disciples continued to practice circumcision and follow many of the religious laws of the Old Testament.

But now, writes Paul, "in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith." The circumcised as well as the uncircumcised. The keepers of the law as well as those who know nothing of the law. The Jews as well as the Greeks – all are children of God through faith.

For Christians today, this letter speaks of the power of faith to create a new family called "the Children of God." It doesn't matter if you have both a father and a mother. It doesn't matter if you are from a good

neighborhood. It doesn't matter if English is your first language. It doesn't matter if you have a job, or a car, or a house.

What matters is FAITH. The faith of Christ and our faith as well. That's what makes us Children of God. God has destroyed the barriers that divide Gentile and Jew, slave and free, male and female, from each other. Our greatest contribution to history might be the creation of a community in which barriers fall and people are no longer separated by religion, culture, nationality, economics, or gender. If we are truly "one in Christ Jesus," we should be able to overcome the divisions that have driven us apart. There is more to unite us than there is to divide us if we "belong to Christ."

In God's eyes, unity does not mean uniformity. As Christians, we can show the world a new kind of unity, one that includes people of diverse backgrounds, conditions, languages and lifestyles. We have Paul's history changing letter. Now it is our turn and our time to respond in faith.

Portrait of a Biblical Giver - Where Your Treasure Is

The six biblical stewardship values -intentional, regular, generous, first, proportional, cheeful – answer the question, "What does a biblical giver look like?" or perhaps more accurately, "How does a biblical giver act?" encouraging these values in givers is one of the tasks of your stewardship leaders here at St. Andrew Lutheran.

To stress the importance of these biblical values, let's return to Luke 12:32-34, which we looked at briefly a few months ago.

Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Many people have misread these words of Jesus and imagined that they say, "For where your heart is, there your treasure will be also." I have even heard people say, "We have to change people's hearts, and then their money will follow." I suppose that could happen, but we need to recognize that this is not what Jesus says.

Jesus says that where your treasure is, where you put your money, that is where your heart will be. If this is true (and who am I to disagree with Jesus?), then we can say that as people grow in their giving to Christ's church, they will grow in their relationship with Jesus. We are talking about a cause-and-effect relationship here. Giving more to Jesus' work will result in growing closer to Jesus. Are we overstating the case if we follow the logic of these verses saving:

- Sell your possessions
- Give alms
- Have treasure in heaven
- Have your heart grow closer to Jesus

Another way to think about what Jesus says here is to talk about "acting your way into a new way of thinking," as opposed to "thinking your way into a new way of acting." If Jesus said, "where your heart is, there your treasure will be also," then he was talking about the need to first change people's hearts. He was talking about trying to think your way into a new way of acting. On the other hand, since what Jesus says here is "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also," then he is talking about the need to first change people's actions. He is talking about trying to act your way into a new way of thinking.

I am convinced it is far easier, and far more lasting, to act your way into a new way of thinking. It is far more effective if my actions lead my thoughts, than if my thoughts lead my actions. If, on the other hand, I trust in God's promise, and simply start tithing, I will find that my attitudes toward giving will quickly change. My actions lead my thinking far more effectively than my thinking leads my actions.

What this all means is that what God's people do with their money has a profound impact on God's people's relationship with their Lord. To put it as directly as possible – you have God's promise that if you grow in your giving, you will grow in your relationship with Jesus.

The six stewardship values and Luke 12:32-34 have shown a direct correlation between biblical stewardship practices, especially generosity, and a growing relationship with Jesus. The goal of your

stewardship ministry should be for people to live these stewardship values, to increase their giving, not so that your church might have more money, but so that God's children might grow in their relationship with their Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Giving intentionally, regularly, generously, first, proportionally, and cheerfully will lead a giver's heart to Jesus. Stewardship leaders have the privilege of asking, "How can we help people become this kind of giver, so that their heart might be drawn closer to Jesus?"

The Season of Pentecost

The Day of Pentecost (also called

Whit Sunday) is a Christian holiday which takes place on the 50th day after Easter Day. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31). Pentecost is a Festival in the Lutheran Church. Since its date depends on the date of Easter, Pentecost is another one of those "moveable feasts".

The events of Acts Chapter 2 are set against the backdrop of the celebration of Pentecost in Jerusalem. There are several major features to the Pentecost narrative presented in the second chapter



of the Acts of the Apostles. The author begins by noting that the disciples of Jesus "were all together in one place" on the "day of Pentecost". The verb used in Acts 2:1 to indicate the arrival of the day of Pentecost, carries a connotation of fulfillment.

There is a "mighty rushing wind" (wind is a common symbol for the Holy Spirit) and "tongues as of fire" appear. The gathered disciples were "filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance". Some scholars have interpreted the passage as a reference to the multitude of languages spoken by the gathered disciples, while others have taken the reference to "tongues" to signify ecstatic speech.

In Christian tradition, this event represents fulfillment of the promise that Christ will baptize his followers with the Holy Spirit. Out of the four New Testament gospels, the distinction between baptism by water and the baptism by Christ with "Holy Spirit and fire" is only found in Matthew and Luke.

The narrative in Acts evokes the symbolism of Jesus's baptism in the Jordan River, and the start of his ministry, by explicitly connecting the earlier prophecy of John the Baptist to the baptism of the disciples with the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. The timing of the narrative during the law giving festival of Pentecost symbolizes both continuity with the giving of the law, but also the central role of the Holy Spirit for the early church. The central role of Christ in Christian faith signified a fundamental theological separation from the traditional Jewish faith, which was grounded in the Torah and Mosaic Law.

The Season of Pentecost tells the many stories of the lives of people living their faith through the Holy Spirit. This year, the Season of Pentecost ends on Christ the King Sunday, November 23rd.

The liturgical color of the Day of Pentecost is **RED**. We invite everyone to try and wear something **RED** to worship on June 8.

My Question Is

Q – I am relatively new to the Lutheran Church. Actually, I have two questions. First: I've heard the stories about Martin Luther and that he is the "Father of the Protestant Reformation." So my question is this: Why, when reciting the Creed, do we say, "I believe in the holy catholic church . . . and not the holy christian church?"

Second: Also with the wording of the Creed, why do we say, "he descended to the dead" and not, "he descended to Hell"?

A – These are such excellent questions, that comes up quite often every several years.

The quick and the easy answer to the first question is this: the words **catholic church** (with all lowercase letters) means the **universal church**, and not one specific church group. The use of the word **catholic** – groups all christian churchs (churches that believe in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior) together. We are united in our faith in Jesus Christ, despite the fact that some of these Christian churches have different doctrines. Our one common denominator is our faith in the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who died on the cross, paying the price for our sins. What different faiths are we declaring to being united with?

Again, the answer is: we are associating ourselves with all Christians who worship our Triune God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

All of the Creeds that the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) uses in worship have the word catholic with lowercase letters.

With regard to your second question: "He descended to the dead" in Christian theology refers to a period between Jesus' death and resurrection, when his soul visited the place of the dead, often referred to as Hell, Hades, or Sheol. Jesus' descent means his soul, (separate from his physical body which was in the grave), visited this place of the dead. He proclaimed his victory over death and sin, offering salvation to those who had died before him. It's important to understand that "hell" in this context doesn't necessarily refer to the eternal place of punishment, but rather the abode of the dead, including the righteous and unrighteous. The descent to the dead signifies Jesus's complete humanity and his victory over death, providing hope for those who have died in faith.



Studying God's Word



Where's the Bear?

Marty, the fiberglass bear, has taken up residence at St. Andrew Lutheran! The artist finished all the work



needed to make the bear look like Martin Luther, the Father of the Protestant Reformation.

You have probably noticed that the plot of soil near the front entrance to St. Andrew Lutheran Church has been dug up in preparation to become the permanent site for our "BEAR" to stand.

Marty made his debut to the people of St. Andrew on Sunday, May 18th to a rousing round of applause. Until he is transported to his permanent "den" at the front entrance to the church building, Marty will be standing in the Narthex by the front doors to greet everyone as they enter for Sunday worship.

So, why the expense of a bear when there are always other costly concerns? The Congregation Council entertained several suggestions of how we could honor the 75th Anniversary of St. Andrew's ministry here in New Bern. They chose to get a bear. Why?

Because the bear would be a permanent and very visual expression of who we are at St. Andrew. Also, Marty, paying tribute to the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther of Germany in the 1500s, connects to our powerful Lutheran heritage. It will be a visual "teaching tool" with which to tell our unique story.

The bear will be dedicated on Reformation Sunday, October 26th – the day that Martin Luther's nailing the 95 Thesis to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg in 1517, which started the Protestant Reformation.

Are there some additional expenses, you ask? Of course there are. The plot of soil that will become Marty's Den needs work; rocks, a concrete slab, etc. There are solar-powered security lights that still need to be purchased.


