Surprise, Surprise

Vast Upsets Across the 2A Football Landscape.

ever take anything for granted. Even a wounded dog can bite.

The 2A football landscape changed dramatically last week. Some were upsets, others knocked potential top eight teams into the loss column.

Or as Lynden coach, Blake Vandalen said, "Well, we messed up the 2A bracket. Sounds like Prosser did too."

The two games he is referring to was the Lions' 7-3 win over Archbishop Murphy and the Mustangs' 26-7 victory over previously unbeaten Othello.


If there was a message, it was: "Take nothing for granted." Especially when two football programs with such a rich history is involved.

Lynden 7, Archbishop Murphy 3

Lynden, fresh off two close wins (31-30 over Sehome) and (36-30 over Squalicum), appeared to be the underdog in this game, despite their 5-1 record.

The previous week, Archbishop Murphy (6-1) beat defending champion, Anacortes 34-28. (It was the first loss in 18 games for the Seahawks.)

Back on top under second-year head coach, Joe



Lynden made a statement in their 7-3 win over Archbishop Murphy. Three NWC teams now have one loss and another has just two.

Cronin, the Wildcats were rated among the top 2A teams in the state and a possible final four favorite.

But the *pride* of the Lions was not to be overlooked

"Honestly, I thought this was our best week of practice all year," noted Vandalen. "The boys were dialed in and focussed all week on assignment football."

"I felt like our kids were prepared for a battle," he explained. "When faced with adversity the previous weeks we stayed focussed and persevered." With poor weather and field conditions that weren't ideal for either team, Vandalen noted: "We embraced the opportunity once again to get better."

The Lions defense held the powerful Wildcat offense to 107 total yards along with 5 three and outs.

Despite only scoring seven points, Vandalen felt his offense was consistent as well. Lynden ran for 145 yards, had 116 yards in the air and no turnovers.

Individually, sophomores Malachi Koenen and Landon Tolsma led the team with 14 tackles a piece.

6-6 quarterback, Brant Heppner (Sr.) rushed 19 times for 82 yards and threw for 119 yards. (Accounting for 2/3 of the Lion attack.)

This week, Lynden hosts Lakewood (2-5) and finishes at Burlington-Edison (4-3).

Archbishop Murphy finishes at Sehome (5-2) this Friday.

If there is a three-way tie for first, their placement will depend on the seeding committee.

"I'm very happy we made it tough on them," said Vandalen. "Our kids fought hard and earned the opportunity to be a high seed." •



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Vikings on the Rise Again

North Kitsap Earns Tie for First Place with Win Over Bainbridge

fter climbing to the top of the mountain, Lthings got a little rough for North Kitsap football this year.

Two years ago, the Vikings narrowly lost to Lynden in the state championship game 31-24.

Last year, they beat the Lions 34-28 in overtime but lost to Tumwater in the state semi-finals 19-17. (Since 2014, the Vikings are 93-17.)

But this off-season started with tragedy.

Long-time and beloved assistant coach, Dave Snyder, passed away at age 54 during the Central Washington football camp in mid-June.

He not only taught history at NK, but he was also the track coach and defensive-coordinator/ assistant head coach for the Vikings.

In addition, Snyder was the assistant coach for the girl's flag football team.

"Many kids were struggling to have fun." noted North Kitsap head coach, Jeff Weible.

Add in injuries along with other factors and it looked like a long year for the defending Olympic League champion.

"I feel like we've done something to upset the football Gods," said Weible earlier this September, who is also the school's head baseball coach.

North Kitsap opened the

year, losing to W. F. West 40-7, Lynden Christian, 15-26 and rival, Olympic 12-27 for an 0-3 start.

But, they rebounded to win their next four games including key wins over Sequim, 30-7, and 1st place Bainbridge 14-7.

The victory last week, on the road, vaulted them into a 3-way tie for first place with Bainbridge and Olympic.

Since all three teams have beaten each other, should they win out, all three will advance straight into the round of 32.

"We have gotten a lot of injured players back that we were counting on who weren't available the first three weeks," explained Weible.

"Our younger players have also gained valuable experience and are now playing like a varsity

player should play."

The rough start and inexperience caused the coaching staff to pivot and refocus on getting better.

"We simplified our offense and defense so the younger, less experienced players could play faster without thinking.

They also focussed on fundamentals along with the small details. Now, the coaches are beginning to add some things back in.

Also helping are seniors like linebacker/guard, Conner Nauta.

"He has stepped up his play," noted Weible, "Along with his leadership to make a huge impact."

Quarterback, Dawsyn Anderson has began making better decisions and the determination of running back, Carter Dungy has helped the resurgence.

Dungy, who broke his hand in week three, has had to play with a big club on his left hand since then. "He has run even better than he did before the injury," Weible said.

Another improvement has been the offensive line, who is finally 100% healthy.

With all the injuries North Kitsap had this year, they had to move players around to different positions.

"We had to try and find a combination of kids that gave us the best chance to be successful, said Weible adding, "I think we are on our fourth set of corner

Adversity has helped make North Kitsap a key opponent as the postseason looms.

Whether they make the top 16 is unknown, but they will be in the round of 32.

> "I strongly believe if we had this team available when we played Olympic in week three, we would have won the game,"

> > stated Weible. "If you look at the top 20 teams in 2A, we by far, have the

toughest opponents' schedule along with our opponents' win percentage," says Weible.

East Valley (3-2): Wins over Toppenish and Selah put them in a good spot. Their schedule favors them and many consider this the most talented team in the CWAC.

Ellensburg (0-4): League play resumes this week at Prosser and they finish hosting East Valley. They could play a spoiler role, but four league losses are against them.

Ephrata (1-3): A tough loss last week puts their backs against the wall. They are pretty much in a must-win situation this week against Selah.

Grandview (0-5): Got their first league win (40-15) over Quincy last week. A non-league game this week and finish with Ephrata.

Othello (3-1): Upset last week at home, but are pretty much guaranteed one of the four lostseason berths. However, a loss against Toppenish could mean a 4-5 team tie for first place.

Prosser (2-2): Rebounded for an impressive 26-7 victory over Othello. In reality, they are only 3 points away from being unbeaten in the CWAC.

Quincy (0-4): They finish with two playoff-hungry teams. Their chance at their first CWAC win in years faded with last week's loss to Grandview.

Selah (1-2): They must win one of their final 2 games. They feature the league's lowest scoring defense.

Toppenish (2-2): A win this week at Othello would throw a tie into first place and would guarantee the Wildcats a playoff

Mustangs Rebound

After Tough Loss to 1A Royal, Prosser Upsets Unbeaten Othello

fter two games, Mustang nation was in revolt. The chatter among parents and fans was not kind.

But, to be fair, the team had a new image and were trying to find themselves. The fact they had lost two close games hurt, but it allowed the team to fine tune and determine their focus.

Losing 15-14 against Ephrata in the opener followed by a 23-21 loss at Toppenish normally would be crippling. But, this year, the new playoff format gave them hope.

"The round of 32 really promotes that mindset," said head coach Corey Ingvalson.

"Having the possibility (of making the playoffs), despite our early struggles helped, I think," he added. "Keeping hope alive, that if we figure it out and play well, we can still have a shot at the post-season."

Things didn't get any easier in week three, facing what many still believe is the most talented team in the league, East Valley.

Although it was a dogfight, Prosser emerged with a 36-35 win. "I believe East Valley is a talented. and dangerous team," stated Ingvalson.

A key that week was finding a new offensive identity. In the off-season, the team was going to feature a ground-oriented attack.

But, in the opener against Ephrata, senior Jacob Rainer (ray-ner) showed

glimpses of greatness. Featuring a lightning-quick release and Houdini escapability, the passing game took center stage.

Against the Red Devils, Rainer had 396 yards in the air. Senior wideout. Aaron Gonzalez, (10 catches for 268 yards, 3rd best all-time.), also found his stride.

The Mustangs followed with two consecutive wins (Grandview 29-13) and Quincy (58-0) highlighted by Rainier who had 7 TD passes against the Jacks, one short of Kellen Moore's record. (To be fair, he would should have had an 8th, but it was dropped twice in the end zone.)

Next up was 1A powerhouse, Royal who dominated Prosser in a 52-8 win. Ingvalson put it in perspective, though.

"I told the kids there's no shame," he said. "They've lost one game in seven years and they've beaten 4A teams.'

The Knights are 51-1 since 2019 and 116-2 since 2014.

Last week, Prosser loaded up the bus one more time and headed to CWAC leader, Othello, just over 20 miles from Royal.

"It takes a lot of plays in football, (but there are) usually a few less when playing Othello at Othello." stated Ingvalson.

"We knew we would have our chances," he added. "But, I felt, it would come down to execution and doing our job," he said.

The result was a 26-7 Mustang victory that opened eyes and it seemed like every player on the field came up with big plays.

"I'm not going to understate how important it was winning," explained Ingvalson. "But, all three of our games, including Othello, to finish the season have the same value for us.'

"We know we need to play well in those to give ourselves the best shot of getting into the post-season," he explained.

"We have another league game with rival Ellensburg this Friday that will present another challenge and playing our best game of the season will be needed."

If Prosser takes care of business against the Bulldogs at Art Fiker Stadium this Friday night, it will still come down to the final contest against Selah.

'It's a coin flip league," said Ingvalson about the CWAC.

That sums it well. ◆



Washington 45, Eatonville 40

t seems like every year, **Washington** is a dark horse to make the playoffs and then they finish strong.

This fall, the Patriots were 0-4 and then winning kicked in. Their 45-40 victory over the Cruisers was unexpected and part of last week's state-wide upsets.

With nothing to lose, they came out with a totally new look offensively which confused Eatonville.

The Patriots were led by the efforts of senior wide receiver, **Kai'Lee Hale** who passed for a 38-yard touchdown, ran once for 31 yards and caught an 18-yard TD pass.

Running back, **Leland Sulusi** rushed 19 times for 162 yards for 2 TD's and caught three passes for 25 yards.

Eatonville was led by wideout, **Riley Hill** who had six receptions for 111 yards and 3 scores. Quarterback, **Cole Fowler**, completed 24-of-41 passes for 407 yards and 5 touchdowns.

Despite the impressive win, Washington lost this Thursday to Orting 41-7 to drop them to 3-3 in league and 3-5 overall.

Eatonville (3-2, 5-2) hosts Steilacoom on Senior Night and finishes the year at Orting.

Looking at the SPSL, if the Cruisers beat Steilacoom Friday and Orting next week, they would be the SPSL second place team.

Franklin Pierce secured the league title with their win Thursday over Clover Park due to their head-to-head win over Orting.

The top four teams in the league advance to the round of 32 while the fifth place team plays the #5 from the Olympic League for the ninth berth. Steilacoom (3-2), Eatonville (3-2), Washington (3-3) and Fife (2-3) are all in the mix. Even if Orting loses, with two losses, they would be no worse than third.



After running for over 1,300 yards and 18 TD's last year, Woodland's Elijah Anderson, moved to quarterback this fall and has over 1,400 total yards of offense, 15 rushing touchdowns and 8 more TD's in the air.

Chief Sealth 34, Nathan Hale 20

With nine teams split over four divisions, (Sultan is independent), the five playoff seeds will be interesting.

Chief Sealth pretty much solidified a berth into the round of 32 with their Metro Sound victory over Nathan Hale.

The Seahawks, under the guidance of head coach Daron Camacho, play in a combo league featuring four 3A schools and one 4A school.

The only 2A schools are Sealth, Nathan Hale and Cleveland.

East Valley (Yakima) 31, Selah 22

In a key CWAC matchup, the East Valley Red Devils traveled to Karl Graf Field in Selah for a 31-22 victory.

Cody Gasseling, ran for 191 yards on 20 carries while teammate, Braden Albrecht added 81 yards on 15 carries.

It was a see-saw affair. Selah got on the board first with a 9-yard run by QB Colton Shea and he kicked the extra point to make it

Tied 10-10 at the half, East Valley took a 24-10 third quarter lead after a Gasseling score and an 84-yard interception return by Greyson Stevens.

Selah battled back with a 37-yard run by Clayton Bucknell but missed the extra point.

Tucker Stevens of the Vikings had a 100yard interception return for a touchdown to cut the lead to 24-22. But the 2-point conversion failed. The Red Devils then road the legs of Gasseling to secure the victory.

Both teams are tied with Prosser at 4-2.

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Allocation Issue

a s the new 24-team format for 1A dawns in a couple weeks, the new District 5 saw their potential allocations change.

When the WIAA released their normal berths for them, the district (SCAC and Caribou Trail) received 4 berths for this year and 3 for next fall.

It was originally thought that number would double under the new football-only playoff format.

However, because the number of 1A football schools across the state dropped from 44 to 43, it went from a 32-team field to 24.

At first, it looked like D5 would get 7 berths, but then that number changed to six for this year and 7 for next year.

Then, the question was raised how to seed the two leagues for the six berths.

The SCAC became a 9team league, welcoming Cashmere and losing Toppenish along with Quincy (to 2A) when the 4-year classification cycle began this September.

The Caribou Trail, who lost Cashmere to the SCAC, then became a three-team league.

So, the SCAC top four teams will advance to the round of 24 along with Omak, the CTL winner,

The sixth playoff berth will be determined on Monday, November 5 with a Kansas City Tie-Breaker between the SCAC #5 and the CTL #2.

Right now, Connell appears the favorite for the #4 seed and a win by College Place over Ki-Be this week would make them #5.

However, if Ki-Be wins and Zillah beats College Place next week, the Bears become the fifth seed.

In the CTL, Omak secured the league title Thursday with a 40-9 victory over Cascade. That sets up Chelan and Cascade next week.
