




One of the largest events of 2020 was spread over two days and involved Bill O'Neal commenting on and signing his book, Billy and Olive Dixon on September 18 and on September 19, The Red River War Forum. That event involved several presentations on various events during the final attempt of the U.S. Cavalry to clear the Native Americans from the area.



In 2020-2021, seven campus tours were conducted for approximately 380 participants. In 2021-2022, 18 groups have been scheduled and will involve approximately 920 participants.

White Deer Land Museum partnered with the Freedom Museum as students from Kindergarten through High School. Students from





Press Release: Production Announced

Wichita, Kansas, September 10, 2021—The White Deer La Museum Foundation and Fall River Productions announc that filming has begun on The Contested Plains, a docu-drama set in the 19th Century American West.

Written by Ken Spurgeon and Deb Goodrich, and directed by Spurgeon, the film stars Buck Taylor, Darby Hinton, McDonough, and R. W. Hampton. Featured historians include former Texas State Historian Bill O'Neal; Michael Grauer, McCasland Chair of Cowboy Culture, National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum; and Gordon Yellowman, Director, Language and Culture Program Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes.

Locations include Wichita, KS; Logan County, KS; and Gr County, TX. Tom Clavin will make a return trip to the panhandle November 13, 2021. His book, Lightning Down, is the story of a World War II fighter pilot and his quest for survival in the infamous POW camp at Buchenwald. Books will be available at the museum for purchase and author's signature. Current "Friends of the Museum" may attend at no charge.



ody Guthrie Museum to join WOWW (Windows on a Wider World), a program that provides educational opportunities for amarillo, Bushland, Wildorado, Shamrock, Wheeer, Memphis, and White Deer visited the museum last school year.

The Contested Plains recounts the story of John and Lydia German who left Georgia with their seven children in 1870 headed for a better home in the West. The family collided with a Cheyenne raiding party, warriors who were survivors of the Sand Creek Massacre and the attack at the Washita, with tragic results. The search for the four captive girls grabbed headlines throughout the nation and made household names of Native leaders and military officers. Taylor (Yellowstone, Gunsmoke) was cast as Rufus Brown, Missouri farmer and uncle to John German who tries to persuade his nephew not to venture farther west. John German is portrayed by Darby Hinton (Texas Rising, Daniel Boone) and Mary McDonough (The New Adventures of Old Christine, The Waltons) plays Lydia German. Western singer/actor R. W. Hampton is Gen. Nelson Miles. Other cast will be announced in the coming weeks. Anticipated release date is 2022.
