The Devils Day - Halloween

Growing up in the church, I was taught that Halloween was the Devil's Day. Every year, we would turn off our lights, close the shades, and dare anyone to knock on our door. We began preparing treat bags filled not only with candy but also with scripture verses, gospel tracts, "I Love Jesus" bracelets, and the message of salvation. And perhaps, as a child enjoys their candy, they might turn to their parents and ask, "Who is Jesus?"
