FROM PASTOR AND FIRST LADY GATES,

I often forget how many things I have to be thankful for. It is much easier for me to let the worries and frustrations of life overshadow all the blessings I enjoy. But doing that often enough only produces a spirit of ingratitude. So how do I fight against those tendencies of ungratefulness?

First off, I have to remind myself routinely to let go of the negative. Do not focus on those things that cause you to forget about who you are and whose you are. Besides, nothing good comes when I daily choose to focus on all that is wrong with our current state of affairs in society. But an even more powerful strategy is to meditate on the concept of thankfulness. And the source that I constantly turn to for that encouragement is God's word, also known as the Holy Bible.

One of the greatest desires of any Pastor is to see a transformation of lives based upon the preaching of God's word. There are some members who get offended by the preaching or proclaiming of the word, but I need to remind everyone our foremost responsibility to preach not our opinions, but the infallible, righteous, life changing, word of God. Paul reminds us in the book of Hebrews 12:4, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" According to Webster, a two-edged sword is something that has or can have both favorable and unfavorable consequences. From a biblical perspective, the word of God has proven itself to be sharper than any two-edged sword. It separates the truth from the lie by sharply cutting to the quick. It can cause someone to sharply change the direction of their life when its admonition is applied in one's life. Just as a sword can save a life so can the application of bible truths. For these seven (7) years of pastoring this church, that has been my desire. To see lives changed, and souls saved by this powerful word of God.

First Lady Gates and I cannot thank the Pastoral Services committee, mistrial staff, program participants, officers, and the entire church enough for a wonderful Pastoral Celebration. Your gifts, whether it was words or monetary, your calls, cards, text messages, whatever you did we graciously appreciate it. FROM THE HEART OF THE PASTOR.....

“For we walk by faith, not by sight!” II Corinthians 5:7

“Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written, “For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered. Romans 8:35-36

When you look at these two (2) scriptures, it epitomizes our relationship with Jesus Christ. Remember a couple of weeks ago I preached a message about “Religion or Relationship” There is a distinct difference between the two (2) and how easy it is to get caught up not realizing you are practicing “religion” versus establishing or re-establishing a relationship with Jesus.

In II Corinthians, Paul has written that Christ's death for sin has changed the way he regards people. Instead of looking at each person as a mere human being, he must view those who are in Christ as something entirely different. Those who are "in Christ" are those who have faith in Him, credited with Christ's righteous life, and their sin forgiven by Christ's death in their place. Such people are new creatures. Those "in Christ" have become something they were not before. Their identity has changed from being the fallen version of themselves, to being associated with the righteousness of Christ. That is who they are now. In fact, the old version of a Christian, who they were before they were "in Christ," is not recoverable. The old is gone, Paul writes. The new has come. All the old dreams and ideas and agendas and purposes have ceased to exist and have been replaced by Christ's ideas and agendas and purposes in an entirely new creature called "Christian."

In Romans, Paul has indicated that those who are in Christ can look forward to a future of sharing in God's glory. At the same time, we are not there yet. For now, we suffer along with the rest of sin-ravaged creation. We groan in longing for our home with the Father. We patiently wait for the hope to be fulfilled. Paul urged his readers to understand, however, that though suffering continues, God is still for us. He has been for us since before the foundation of the world, and He has proven His love for us by sacrificing His own Son to make it possible to adopt us as His children. Paul writes that we must never interpret the darkness of earthly life as evidence of God's lack of love for us. Nothing we do can keep Christ from loving us, and nothing that happens to us can mean that Christ no longer loves us. Paul builds a list of some of the worst things that can happen in this life, including trials, hardship, persecution for our faith in Him, hunger, lack of clothing or shelter, physical threats, or death by violence. None of this can separate us from Christ's love. None of this means Christ does not love us. Just the opposite is true. He loves us enough to bring us through these things during life.

For me, yes, that is what genuine “FAITH AND LOVE” is.....!
