IMPORTANT NOTICE

The following resolutions affecting the Constitution and By-Laws will be presented at the first Post meeting in January, 1973, and will be voted on at the second monthly meeting of January, 1973.

RESOLUTION (1)

BE IT RESOLVED that paragraph 1 of Article I of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

"1. In accordance with the Certificate of Incorporation of the Post, the Board of Directors of the Post shall consist of 11 members of this Post in good standing. The Board of Directors shall act as and perform all the functions and duties of the executive committee of the Post whenever the executive committee is referred to in the Department Constitution or By-Laws. One of such directors shall be the Post Commander; one of such directors shall be the Finance Officer; and after June 1, 1973 one of such directors shall be the retiring Post Commander whose automatic term of office on the Board of Directors shall be one year. The remaining directors shall consist of the present directors whose terms of office have not yet expired and two directors to be elected at the 1973 Annual Meeting of the Post for three year terms to succeed those elected directors whose terms of office expire in the then current election year. Each year thereafter three directors shall be elected to serve three year terms except that on each successive third year two directors only shall be elected for three year terms so that the Board of Directors shall consist of 11 members at all times."

RESOLUTION (2)

BE IT RESOLVED that paragraph 3 of Article III of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

"3. Any officer of the Post may be removed from office for disability, neglect of duty, or for conduct unbecoming a member upon two-thirds vote of the members of the Post Affairs Committee and ratification of their action by two-thirds of the members present at the next regular meeting of the Post held after such action of the Post Affairs Committee. The vacancy created by such action, or by the death or resignation of any officer, shall be filled by the Post Affairs Committee for the unexpired term of the office so vacated, with the exception of a vacancy in the office of Commander which shall be filled by the Senior Vice Commander who thereupon shall automatically become the Commander for the unexpired term of his predecessor."

RESOLUTION (3)

BE IT RESOLVED that paragraphs 1 and 2 of Article IV of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

"1. The officers shall consist of the Commander, a Senior Vice Commander, two additional Vice Commanders, an Adjutant, and a Finance Officer, who shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Post and shall hold office for the ensuing year or until their respective successors have been chosen and shall perform the customary duties pertaining to their respective offices. The officers shall be ex-officio members of the Post Affairs Committee. The Commander shall also be an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors.

2. The Commander, and in his absence, the Senior Vice Commander, shall preside at all meetings of the Post and of the Post Affairs Committee. In the event of their absence such meeting may elect their presiding officer."

STOP THAT CAR THIEF!

Within 30 seconds after you begin to read this, another car will be stolen. This year stolen cars will likely be over one million. Unless you follow these precautions, your car may be among them.

- Take the key with you when you park, even if you leave the car unattended for only a few minutes.
- Roll up the windows and lock all the doors if car is to be unoccupied. Use this same procedure even when you park in your own driveway or unlocked garage.
- Remove car keys from coat pockets when checking your coat or hanging it in a public place.
- Remove all keys but the one for the ignition when parking attendant takes your car.
- Put packages, briefcases, cameras, clothing and any other tempting items out of sight don't leave them in full view on the car seat.
- Keep doors locked when driving; desperate thieves won't stop at attacking a driver when he stops at an intersection or traffic light.
- Be extra careful when parked near theaters, movie houses, bowling alleys, night schools, etc. Thieves can easily figure out how long you will be gone, making it even simpler to drive away in a car that was left unsecured.

Do people heed advice such as this? A lot of them don't: the latest figures show three out of four stolen automobiles had been left unlocked, and in over 40% of them trusting owners had gone off leaving the key in the ignition.
