



One of the many things done by the American Legion Auxiliary is to see to it that veterans in VA Hospitals in New York State have the opportunity to select and send to their families, gifts at Christmas, at no cost to the veterans.

As Gift Shop Chairlady, she had to collect the monies from various auxiliaries and posts, buy the gifts, supervise the selections made by the vets, wrap and mail the gifts to the families.

Perhaps the magnitude of the job can be better shown by a few statistics. Of the over 800 patients at the VA Hospital, 661 selected gifts. The postage bill for these mailings came to \$436. A total of \$4,582, as well as many gift donations was collected from the Third and Fourth Districts. These districts cover 16 counties, 137 Auxiliary Units and many Legion Posts. About 135 workers contributed over 1,500 hours of hard work to help make the Gift Shop a success.

We salute you Barbara for a tremendous job well done, and speaking as veterans, thank God girls like you are concerned with our well-being.

P.S. If anyone was watching the Channel 13 news either at 6 p.m. or 11 p.m. on Thanksgiving Day, there were some interesting highlights about the Volunteer Program at the VA Hospital. 





"LET'S HEAR IT!" FOR U.S.

(In these days of unrelieved foreboding and gloomy news, all of us in this country could do with a little bucking up. It isn't often that we get a chance to see ourselves as a neighbor sees us-and be cheered by the image. Some time ago Gordon Sinclair, the Canadian radio and tv commentator, broadcast an editorial out of Toronto. Any number of people in the U.S. heard it or have since read it, as it has been widely reprinted in newspapers in this country. It was inserted in the "Congressional Record" and became the subject of many editorials.
