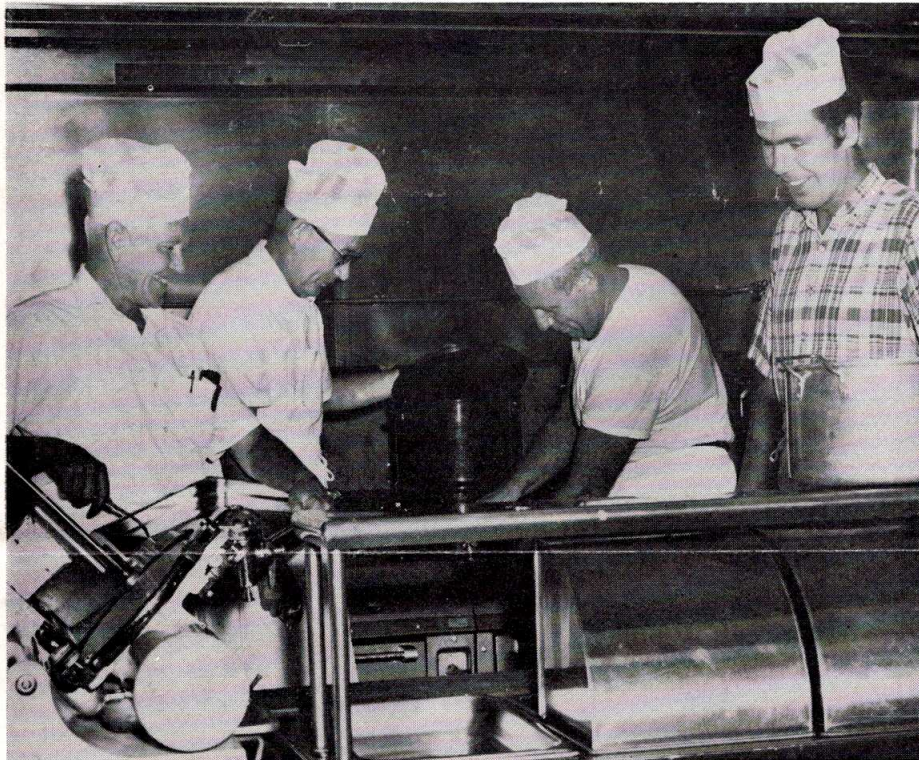

'OLD' VETS GET TOGETHER

Six years ago 71 Veterans of WW1 in the Tri-Village area decided that the winters were becoming too severe for night driving to Post meetings. These men in their 70s and early 80s who were friends for many years decided to experiment with a luncheon idea and to set the second Tuesday of each month to meet at the Elsmerian Restaurant. There was to be no organizational methods used, with dues, officers and other formalities. The get together was merely to continue the spirit of comradeship which

they had exemplified over the years.

Of the original group, 22 are now deceased and four have taken up residence in Florida. Without any notices or urging, the average attendance at these affairs each month over the years has equated 80 percent of the total number.

Win Robinson, one of the organizers and first Commander of Blanchard Post, says this well demonstrates the great feeling of comradeship which existed among those who served their country during 1917-1919.

DELEGATES REPORT OF 53rd ANNUAL CONVENTION

The 53rd Annual Convention of the American Legion, Department of New York was held on July 14-17, 1971, at Rochester, N. Y. Headquarters were at the Holiday Inn. The sessions were at the Rochester War Memorial Auditorium. By their own choosing Delegate Woehrle was housed at the Mariner Motor Inn and Delegate Burns at the Downtowner Motel. Albany County headquarters were the Holiday Inn.

Apart from the four-hour parade on Friday evening our time was spent at three morning sessions from 9 a.m. until noon and a Third District caucus following the opening session. Murray Wallach of Sullivan County was elected District Chairman, a post he has previously held. Colors for the District, presented to retiring District Commander John J. McKenna by Past Department Commander Edward R. Delehanty on behalf of Albany County's 30 Posts, had their break-in at the Department Convention Parade.

The Convention was called to order by Department Commander Raymond T. Wellington on Thursday (7/15/71). At the opening session several resolutions were presented and approved. Of direct interest to our Post is the increase in dues by 25¢ to \$1.50 for that portion of the dues that is allocated to the Department. The Department will release the list of approved resolutions at a later date.

Addresses were delivered by (1) Mr. Ward, an official of the New York State Narcotic Addiction Control Commission; (2) National Security Council Advisor Donald C. Brewster, who gave a truly descriptive clarification of the United States involvement in the Vietnam Conflict; (3) William L. Beaudin of Clinton County, winner of the 1971 Department of New York Oratorical Contest; (4) U. S. Army Major James N. Rowe who described his experiences as a Vietnam P.O.W. before he escaped from his captors. His experiences are described in his book, *Five Years to Freedom*. The book was well recommended for reading by many of the speakers and officials; and (5) National Americanism Commission Chairman of the American Legion, Daniel J. O'Connor who discussed several topical issues.

At the opening of the second session Department Commander Wellington expressed his opposition to the announcement made by President Nixon in a nationwide television-radio broadcast on July 15, 1971, that he (President Nixon) was planning a visit to Peking and other parts of China mainland before May of 1972. Many of the delegates responded to the commander's remarks with a standing, roaring ovation of approval. However, in conversing with several other delegates, opposition to the Department Commander's stand was noted. Delegate Woehrle, in a conversation with Commander Wellington at Department Headquarters in the Holiday Inn, expressed his personal disfavor to Commander Wellington. Mr. Woehrle was advised that the Department Commander's opposition was based on his deep distrust of the Communists—a distrust presumably shared by every Legionnaire.

Delegate Woehrle was surprised to hear Department Special Activities Chairman James A. Capasso of Ballston Spa, give a report in which awards were made to a district and several posts. Woehrle, County and Third District Chairman for this activity, were led to believe that there would be no reporting forms this year. He attempted to resolve the matter with the Albany County Commander but the matter was left unsettled as the County Commander told him that he had not received any.

It was announced at the sessions that the Department Membership has climbed about 2000 in the past year.

Many awards and citations were made at the Convention. Among the notable recipients was the chairman of the Cortland County Board of Supervisors who started and very successfully completed a project known as, *Home For Christmas*, in which 16 Cortland County GIs were brought home for a Christmas furlough from Vietnam. Two members of the Royal Canadian Legion were cited for their many years of service to Veterans.

The social aspects were indeed pleasant with many County and other groups having hospitality functions which, due to their very large number, your delegates could not attend all—although good effort was made to miss as few as possible. We had a very enjoyable visit and meal at the Doud Post which is located outside the Rochester city line. It is an impressive building with a large dining room. The post has a commercial license and serves daily luncheons. During the Convention they served an exceptionally good steak dinner which was reasonably priced.

The elected Department Commander is Robert W. Garlinger of Chautauqua County. He is the Assistant Postmaster of Jamestown, N. Y., and is a member of the Lakewood Post.

For the honor and privilege of being your delegates for this Convention, we express our warmest thanks.

TEN COMMANDMENTS OF SHOOTING SAFETY

1. Treat every gun with respect due a loaded weapon.
2. Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely; keep the safety on the weapon until ready to shoot.
3. Unload guns when not in use, take down or have actions open; guns should be carried in cases to shooting area.
4. Be sure barrel is clear of obstructions, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the weapon you carry.
5. Be sure of target before you pull trigger; know identifying features of the game you shoot.
6. Never point a gun at anything you don't want to shoot; avoid all horseplay.
7. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
8. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water; at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.
9. Store guns and ammunition separately, beyond reach of children.
10. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.
