TO THE COLORS

#### THOMAS JEFFERSON— A MAN FOR THE PEOPLE

Beside the Tidal Basin, close by the Potomac River in Washington, D.C., is an impressive colonnaded memorial in white marble. This monument is dedicated to the third President of the U.S., Thomas Jefferson. In the Black Hills of South Dakota the faces of four men have been carved into the rugged granite side of a mountain. One of those immortalized is Thomas Jefferson. Both of these monuments reflect a nation's way of paying homage to one man whose greatness defies description.

Although Jefferson's contributions to his country were many, he wished future generations to remember him as the "Author of the Declaration of Independence; of the Statute for Religious Liberty in Virginia, and Founder of the University of Virginia." This is the epitaph which appears on his tomb and

which he himself wrote.

Probably Jefferson's most remembered words from the Declaration of Independence are: "... all men are created equal ... they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights...among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

These mighty and oft-quoted words have thundered down through history They express Jefferson's opinion, as well as the opinion of his peers, who were about to break ties with a monarchy, which was far-removed from the territory it governed.

As a member of the Virginia House of Delegates, Jefferson drew up the Virginia Statute of Religious Freedom, that was intended to create a clear separation between church and state.

In 1819, when Jefferson was 75 years old, the University of Virginia was established in Charlottesville, Virginia. As its first rector, Jefferson took great interest in the academic, as well as the architectural, design of the Institution, which still bears his unique imprint.

As we celebrate our country's 200th birthday, if you should be traveling in the vicinity of Charlottesville, you might want to visit the University of Virginia, and Monticello, the beautiful hilltop home which Jefferson built.

# RECONSTRUCTING MILITARY RECORDS

As a result of a fire in the storage faility of the National Personnel Records Center at St. Louis, many of the approximately 18,000,000 Army and Air Force veterans at the time of the fire in 1973 have feared that they would be unable to obtain proof of military service. This loss of proof could result in loss of veterans' benefits to the persons involved.

However, the National Archives and Records Service which operates the St. Louis record storage facility has reassured everyone that there are alternate sources of information that enable them to reconstruct service record data lost in the fire. The nucleus of this effort are the microfilmed morning reports of all

Army and Air Force units.

Other sources of information include the Veterans Administration, Selective Service System, the State Offices of the Adjutant General and military payroll records. Experience has already shown that usually following communication between the veteran and the center, reconstruction of service data is achieved in a relatively short period. With proper information the St. Louis Center has stated that it is their sincere conviction the service data for any Army or Air Force veteran can be verified and that

#### AMERICAN LEGION 57th ANNUAL CONVENTION

Delegates from Blanchard Post were in attendance at all sessions of this most successful convention held in Rochester

on July 16-19, 1975.

It seemed like old times as the highlight of the first session of the convention was an address by former Governor Wilson. Judging from the response, I'd have to say the majority of those present still considered him as the Governor. In the State Commanders report, it was noted that this was the first year that the State Department Commander of the American Legion was unable to obtain an audience with the Governor of the State of New York. A rather sad situation to say the least.

On Friday, Senator James Buckley addressed the convention. Even though his speech was very good, he had to share the spotlight with this year's Governor of Boys State and also the Legion State Oratorical Winner. The poise and speaking ability of these young men is almost overwhelming and it makes you proud to think that you had some small part in programs that deal with young

adults of such high caliber.

Many meaningful resolutions were passed by the convention, a couple of which were to again attempt to get passed and signed veterans preference in Civil Service matters. This bill was passed this year by the Legislature but vetoed by Governor Carey. Another res-

olution of much interest to many is to have it mandated that the same percentage of exemption would apply in cases of reassessment of real property.

Friday night saw your representatives in attendance as the four and one half hour parade stepped off promptly at

7:30 p.m. in 90-degree heat.

Saturday morning saw the election of our new State Commander. He is Leonard Baxter, a Korean War veteran from Central Bridge, N.Y. As last year's membership chairman, he was very instrumental in causing the New York State American Legion membership to show a gain for the first time in three years.

Two men from Blanchard Post were honored by being given District Chairmanships. Al Woehrle was appointed to chairman of the District Americanism Committee and Bob Smith to chairman of District Special Activities Committee.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for choosing us as your delegates to the convention. While there is a lot of fun attached to a Legion convention, there is also a very serious side as well. We assure you that we participated in both sides to the best of our ability.

On September 9, 1975, the House of Representatives voted 410 to 6 to shift the Veteran's Day holiday back to the traditional November 11th date, following the lead of the Senate and sending the legislation to President Ford. This month witnessed two battles on widely separated fronts which changed the course of history, first in the decisive battle of Saratoga in 1777 culminating in Burgoyne's surrender, and then the battle of Yorktown, Virginia, in 1781 ending with the surrender of Cornwallis. Saratoga is considered one of the world's decisive battles, while Yorktown signaled the end of the war and assured our independence.

#### To the Colors . . .

#### EDWARD RUTLEDGE - YOUNGEST SIGNER

Edward Rutledge was 26 years of age when he signed the Declaration of Independence.

Born in 1749 in Charleston (earlier called Charles Town), South Carolina, Edward was one of seven children. His early education was by private tutors. However, when he was old enough, he gained a great deal of experience working as a clerk for his brother, John, who was a prominent attorney and politician in Charleston.

His more formal education was at Middle Temple in London, England, where he studied law. When he was finished, Edward was called to the English bar, but instead, decided to return home to practice law where he married Henrietta Middleton, the daughter of the wealthiest planter in South Carolina.

In 1775, Rutledge became a delegate to the second Continental Congress. In 1776, at the time Richard H. Lee of Virginia proposed national independence, Rutledge was still undecided how South Carolina should vote, and obtained a delay in the voting. Rutledge strongly believed that the colonies should first as-ciate with foreign alliances in order to rengthen themselves for the important ep of independence. So...when the voting took place, Rutledge disagreed with Lee's proposal, and South Carolina

balloted "no." He changed his mind the next day, and convinced the delegates of South Carolina to join the majority in the interest of a unanimous vote. Accordingly, on July 4, 1776, he voted in favor of the Declaration of Independence.

A month later, he was appointed by Congress, with John Adams and Benjamin Franklin, to confer with the British Commander Lord Howe concerning the latter's proposal for peace terms. The meeting took place on Staten Island, now part of New York, but negotiations came to naught.

As a militia captain in the artillery, Rutledge participated in a battle at Port Royal Island, South Carolina, where the British were defeated. In 1780, during the seige of Charleston, he was taken prisoner by the British, and was sent to St. Augustine, Florida. After almost a year in prison, he was freed in a prisoner of war exchange.

Following his return to South Carolina, Rutledge was elected to the State Legislature in 1782 — and every year thereafter for 16 years. Retiring from his law practice in 1798, Rutledge was elected governor of South Carolina. He died during his first term of office at the age of 50.
