Proposed Change to By-Laws

The Constitution of Blanchard Post mandates that written notice be given to each member of proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws prior to such proposals being voted upon, at a regular or special Post meeting.

Article II, Section 4, of the By-Laws now reads:

4. The Board of Directors may make such expenditures from funds other than those set aside in the Post Affairs Fund as it shall deem advisable for the conduct of the business of the Post and the maintenance or replacement of its physical properties or facilities, provided, however,

it shall make no expenditure or incur no obligation in excess of \$300 without the approval of the membership at a regular Post meeting.

The Board of Directors has now passed a resolution to be presented to the membership for their consideration and vote requesting that the \$300 limitation be increased to \$750, to be more realistic in view of the greatly increased costs of building repairs since the \$300 figure was established.

A second publication of this proposal will appear in the November issue of the 1040 Times with a notice of the date to be voted upon.

THE 1040 TIMES GAINS NATIONAL HONORS

As shown on top of the front page, the 1040 Times is a member of the National American Legion Press Association (NALPA). Each year prior to the National Convention the Press Association makes its awards for excellence to Legion publicatinationwide. In July of this year, 1040 Times was honored with an Honorable Men Award in Category 2 (Posts with fewer than 2000 members). We were thus on nine publications (three winners and six honorable mentions) out of better than 1000 to be so honored. In addition, your Editor was one of five nationwide to receive an Honorable Mention for Best Editorial. Incidentally, the three winners were Department publications, namely, Georgia, Texas and Arkansas.

This is a great tribute to our Post and was made possible through the loyalty and

hard work of our contributors. Thanks to all of you.

The following is the editorial from our February 1977 issue which is the basis for the Honorable Mention Award for best editorials, and is reprinted herewith as a matter of interest to the membership.

PLAINS, PEANUTS AND PARDONS

The following resolution was adopted by the 58th National Convention of The American Legion two days after President Carter's appearance before that Convention, an appearance during which he displayed poor judgment and bad manners, to put it kindly. Using the rostrum of the Legion Convention, where he was by tradition an invited guest, to insult those present and every veteran who has ever honorably served this nation, was as totally unbelievable as requesting forgiveness of Adolph Hitler before a convention of B'nai Brith.

58th NATIONAL CONVENTION OF THE AMERICAN LEGION SEATTLE, WASHINGTON, AUGUST 24-26, 1976

RESOLUTION 434 COMMITTEE: National Security SUBJECT: DRAFT EVADERS AND/OR DESERTERS

Whereas, young men throughout the history of the United States have patriotically answered the call of their country and defended its lands and ideals; and

Whereas, hundreds of thousands of those young men volunteered for, or accepted, duty in Vietnam and served with honor and distinction; and

Whereas, thousands of these young men lost their lives, or were gravely wounded; and

Whereas, thousands were captured by the enemy and were imprisoned and/or tortured for long periods of time; and

Whereas, the question of amnesty for those who have fled the country to avoid induction into the Armed Services, or have deserted their as-

signed military units to avoid military obligation during the Vietnam conflict has been again raised; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by The American Legion in National Convention assembled August 24-26, 1976, in Seattle, Washington, that we reaffirm our opposition to general amnesty for draft evaders, draft dodgers and military deserters and urge that each case be tried on an individual basis, and each deserter be dealt with as prescribed by the Uniform Code of Military Justice; and, be it further

Resolved, that we urge the United States Government and its courts of justice to prosecute to the full extent of the law, all individuals charged with evading the military draft; and, be it further

Resolved, that all members of The American Legion are urged to publicize our stand on draft evaders, deserters and blanket amnesty.

Since it was clear at our press time that President Carter would move with all possible speed to effectuate a pardon for military draft evaders, it would be appropriate for him to fulfill another of his campaign promises, namely, to open the doors and windows to let fresh air in and to listen to the suggestions of American citizens.

Apropos of this, it would be most timely for the President to provide information on the qualifications and other background data on staff members who have been most active in pushing the pardons. This is very important since the leader of this movement appears to be a David Berg, who at age 29 is very much within the age group, and very likely of the same persuasion, as those to be pardoned. Just exactly what President Ford was accused of after the Nixon pardon—a lack of objectivity. Further importance is attached to the need to know who these people are because the press now says that they are pressing for pardons for military deserters.

In view of recent developments in the case of Mr. Lance, our suggestion in the above editorial that the President provide background information on members of his staff, particularly Mr. Berg in this instance but also on other staff members holding sensitive jobs, makes sense. There are many people in positions of power on the staff of every President whose appointments do not require confirmation by anyone but the President himself. As the Indian says, "If you speak with a forked tongue, men will learn not to believe you."

RECENT NEWS ITEM

(Chicago Daily News)

Q. What do 26 governors, 57 U.S. senators and 293 congressmen now in office have in common with every President since Harry Truman? A. They are all members of The American Legion.

It may have been fashionable recently — especially among liberals and the young — to "yuck" at the sight of a Legionnaire proudly wearing his blue overseas cap with gold piping.

But it hasn't been true of most politicians. They still smile warmly at the sight of Legionnaires, especially when there is more than one around.

And when a politician speaks to a group of them—if he's entitled—he puts on his Legion cap before he opens his mouth. It's almost like putting on a yarmulke before entering temple.

You remember, over the years those news pictures of presidents and presidential candidates—caps on head, arms outstretched, addressing Legion conventions? They all did it—from Truman

right down to Carter.

They couldn't afford not to, even though the Legion's political clout has slipped considerably from its heyday after World War II, when its membership peaked at 3.3 million. But after an early drop from that high, its membership has held fairly steady. Its low was in 1960 when membership dipped to 2,679,000. It now has climbed to 2,715,000, despite a drop in big city membership and a loss of half a million members by death. (The death loss now runs 60,000 a month.)

According to Legion figures, its 2.7 million members include 615,000 of the nation's 7.8 million Vietnam veterans, 500,000 of the 4.7 million Korean vets, 1.3 million of the 13.2 WW2 vets and 205,000 of the 825,000 WW1 vets. The average age of today's Legionnaire is 50. By wars, the average ages of Legionnaires—and all veterans—are: WW1 82, WW2 57, Korean 45, and Vietnam 29.

As always, the Legion has remained strongest in the Midwest and South, but has lost membership in New England and California. (Before World War II, the Legion claimed about 45% of California veterans. Now it has about 5%.)

Its biggest loss of members has been in larger cities where the Legion failed to follow the shifting populations to the suburbs. In Chicago, for example, membership was at a record high in 1947 of 90,000. Today it's down to 47,000.
