LEGION GETS PLEA FOR RECRUITING HELP

Brigadier General James E. Frank, National President of the Reserve Officers Association, was one of the several reserve officers who formed a panel to discuss defense needs before the American Legion's National Security Commission.

Among other points made, he cited the need for an accelerated recruitment program for reserve units.

The decline in all services has been particularly noted since even before the Berlin call-up in 1961, he said, and added:

"Maintenance of the required and authorized strength-levels of the reserves is below that necessary to assure the capabilities expected of our reserve forces.

"Youth today is less responsive to the 'hot breath' of the draft board, choosing

to play the odds; they are collectively totally unmoved by, even unaware of, any patriotic motivation of serving their country. Parents and our society as a whole have failed to inculcate them with real love and pride of country. Many segments of society, having contacts with our youth, tend to discourage any military experience rather than urging it. The values of citizenship, discipline, loyalty and devotion, respect for parents, and law and order so readily acquired or stimulated through healthy military training are not given sufficient weight in the upbringing of our children."

General Frank urged the Legion to join in a program to reverse this trend, and to urge young people to join in reserve training in order to equip themselves for meeting "the challenge of today and tomorrow".

MORE BLOOD DONORS

Added to the list of blood donors helping to raise the Posts Blood Bank Account at the Albany Medical Center are Julius Aupperle, Clarence Lephart, and Robert E. Mulligan.

For their action in this project, Blood Bank Chairman Warren Moessner, on behalf of Blanchard Post, extends a warm "Thank You, Buddies".

Warren's phone number for those who want to make arrangements to donate blood is HE 9-2288. Evenings and weekends are the best time to find him at home. Anyone who wants to do so, can call the Blood Bank direct at 462-7521 but be certain to have your donation of blood credited to the account of the Blanchard Post 1040 American Legion and call Warren Moessner to report to him that your blood donation has been made.

Even with the three new contributions, the Post's account is dangerously low. At least another forty pints is required to raise the account to a safe level—that

means of forty pints donated, half, or twenty pints will be credited to the Post account.

An example of the seriousness of this situation was made at the County Legion meeting in September when it was announced that ten pints were being sought for a member of Tamara Post, Albany County's only all-women's Post located in Albany.

Clarence Moessner says: "Certain hours are set by the Blood Bank for donating blood on every day of the week except Saturday. If you are unable to donate the blood, perhaps you can encourage members of your family or your friends and neighbors to contribute toward this great need. Basic requirements call for ages 21 to 60, weights of over 110-lbs. for females and 125-lbs. for males. Don't let the three dozen restrictions stop you from trying to donate blood. If you can't do it now, perhaps you can a month or so from now — or get someone to do it for you. If any event — Give!"

Vet's Benefits

Blanchard Legionnaire Bill Spaulding reminds us that among the benefits to which Veterans are entitled are:

- (a) \$250.00 toward funeral expenses.
- (b) An American Flag to be draped over the casket — which before being lowered into a grave — the Flag is removed and given to the deceased's wife or it may be turned over to the veteran's organization to which the deceased belonged. Usually the mortician arranges for the Flag details.

If you have any questions about your veteran's benefits, they should be directed to your Post Service Officer, George Sykes.

SILVER JUBILEE

Of the fifty-eight that began it, there are still thirty-four active members of the Last Man's Club which will have its 25th Annual Dinner at the Post on Saturday, November 9th.

Perhaps it was the ominous war-clouds of the approaching World War II that prompted the action of Otto de Heus and some other of his WW I buddies to bring about the "Last Man's Club" in Blanchard Post. The Post was not as yet a decade old. Within a set time the "Club" closed its books to any more than the fifty-eight that had signed up. Since that first dinner, members of the "Club" have faithfully joined together once a year, on a date close to the memorable November 11th. The occasion is ever one of joviality and high spirits—despite the ominous symbol that is placed in front of the "Club" president at the head table. That symbol is in the form of a cask of brandy which has never been opened and for the remainder of the

year rests in a safe deposit vault. In that symbol rest the past glories and sorrows shared by the members of the "Last Man's Club" during their active military careers in World War I and the togetherness they have shared since the "Club" was founded. The "Club" members know that some day the cask is to be opened. But until that day arrives, the spirit of life and friendship and the principles of justice, freedom and democracy enjoyed by Americans and emphasized by The American Legion are characterized in the Last Man's Club here and wherever they are active.

The President of the "Club" this year is Norman Bender. The Secretary and Treasurer is Clifford Whitney. As is the custom, the Post Commander will be a guest of the "Club". That distinction this year is held by Dick Dalton, whose wife Ruth, is the niece of Nathaniel Adams Blanchard, for whom our Post is named.
