COMMITTEE THAT CARES REPORTS

Last month Commander Costigan named a committee to make a program that would let the members of the Armed Forces in Viet Nam from the Town of Bethlehem know that their neighbors and friends were thinking of them. Chairman of the Committee is Earl S. Jones, World War I vet and a past Blanchard Post Commander.

Taking a phrase from an Albany TIMES-UNION editorial praising the committee appointment, the committee determined to have for its name the "Committee That Cares".

There are now seven Bethlehemites serving in the Viet Nam war zone to whom the committee is giving its attention. They are: Army 2nd Lieut. Charles A. Carroll of Delmar and 1st Lieut. John D. Crysler of Elsmere; Navy Ensign Fritz Kass, Delmar and Seaman Thomas Burleigh of Elsmere; Marine Corporals Colin P. Clark of Elsmere and Roger Kibbey of Delmar; and SeaBea Francis J. Murgace of Glenmont.

As other names and APO addresses become known to the committee, the names will be added to the roster which is receiving the committee's attention.

Arrangements have been made for a meeting with other civic and service organizations of the Town of Bethlehem to

prepare a program that will extend until the shooting war ends.

The Committee That Cares has already released two mailings to our men in Viet Nam. "This letter received from Lieut. Crysler should bring to all Blanchard Post Legionnaires a feeling of personal participation in the cause for which Lieut. Crysler and his brother-members of the Armed Forces in Viet Nam are committed" said Chairman Jones:

"Dear Mr. Costigan,

I would like to thank you and the efforts of your newly formed committee for their thoughtfulness of the Americans now serving in Viet Nam.

Delmar's SPOTLIGHT and, may I add, the package of Kool Aid were certainly a delightful treat. It is always enjoyable to read about the local happenings in Delmar.

Presently I am assigned as an assistant battalion advisor to a Vietnamese Ranger Battalion. We are now stationed in the tactical zone which is in the Delta region. When not on operations we are in a small town not far from Saigon.

Again I would like to thank Earl S. Jones, Alexander J. Woehrle and Eugene F. FitzPatrick for their work in connection with this project.

Best of luck to you, Mr. Costigan, and all the members of the Blanchard Post in the coming year.
