## NEW ELIGIBILITY PERIODS

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty are now eligible to join the American Legion provided their service began during one of the eligibility areas.

Two other changes extend the period of eligibility for World War II and the Korean War service. In both instances, eligibility dates were changed to agree with dates previously set by Congress for payment of wartime compensation rates.

The new eligibility periods are:

✓ For World War II: Dec. 7, 1941 to Dec. 31, 1946. (Previous closing date was Sept. 2, 1945.)

✓ For Korean War: June 25, 1950 to Jan. 31, 1955. (Previous closing date was July 27, 1953.)

✓ For Vietnam Era: Aug. 5, 1964 to Aug. 15, 1973. (Previous closing date was "cessation of hostilities as determined by the Government of the U.S.")

The Convention resolution calling for the changes in eligibility provisions recognized that American participation in armed hostilities in Southeast Asia were terminated on Aug. 15, 1973, by both Congressional and Presidential action.)

## TO THE COLORS

We in the editorial room thought it would be of interest to the members of the Post if we presented an article, or series of articles, on the philosophy and objectives of the American Legion, specifically as it relates to the Post and to activities encompassed in the program.

The National Americanism Commission of the American Legion was created by a recommendation made to and adopted by the national convention held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1919. The recommendation reads as follows:

"We recommend the establishment of a National Americanism Commission of the American Legion, whose duty shall be the endeavor to realize in the United States the basic ideal of this Legion of 100 percent Americanism through the planning, establishment and conduct of

a continuous constructive educational system designed to:

"1. Combat all anti-American tendencies, activities and propaganda;

2. Work for the education of immigrants, prospective American citizens and alien residents in the principles of Americanism;

3. Inculcate the ideals of Americanism in the citizen population, particularly the basic American principle that the interests of all the people are above those of any special interest or any so-called class or section of the people;

4. Spread throughout the people of the Nation the information as to the real nature and principles of American government;

5. Foster the teachings of Americanism in all schools."

It is the objective of the American Legion National Americanism Commission to translate Americanism precepts, principles and ideals in an understanding and practical manner to Legion Posts and other groups.
